A 'HARRY' VICTORY

Cohn Hangs On To Defeat Newcomer Homer Hector

Todd Doucet Wins Intermediate

A lthough Chicago's Harry Cohn has been in Kent Goulding's Top 100 since 1992, this is the first year he's been auctioned off as an individual at the Michigan Summer Championships. Director Carol Joy Cole must have known something. Cohn's victory in the biggest North American Open event of the year (87 players) earned him over \$5,000 and vaulted him into the lead of the 1995 American Backgammon Tour.

More than 200 players attended the pre-4th of July Flint Area Backgammon Club bash (30 June-3 July), including 186 in the main events. Once again, the popular Novi Hilton Hotel was the venue.

Cohn had very few easy matches en route to the finals of the double elimination event. Trailing 9–6 in his 13-point first round match against Howard Markowitz, Harry narrowly escaped a match-ending doubled gammon to go down 11–6. Seven points later, Markowitz fell 13–11.

In the round-of-8, Cohn trailed Malcolm Davis 12–6 only to win 13–12. And against Paul Weaver in the semifinals, Harry was behind 8–2 before rallying for a 13–10 victory. Harry went on to edge Toni Wuersch (MA) and win the undefeated sheet.

The Atlanta Assassin

While Harry was tiptoeing through the minefields on his half of the drawsheet, a man by the name of Homer Hector was wreaking havoc with world class players in his bracket. Although he has played backgammon in Atlanta for 10 years, this was Homer's first regional event. It certainly won't be his last.

Hector combined good fortune and steady composure to compile a 9–1 record: enough to win the second chance sheet and earn a seat across from Harry Cohn in the finals. His incredible run included big wins over Malcolm Davis, Jeff Acierno, Frank Talbot, and the legendary Paul Magriel.

The Finals

To claim the first place glass dolphin trophy, Homer Hector would have to defeat Harry Cohn in back-to-back 15-point matches. Assuming equal competition, the true odds would be 3-to-1. In reality, oddsmakers put Hector's chances at no better than 6-to-1.

The players traded early games for a 3-




Harry Cohn extends a hand to Homer Hectorupon winning the Michigan Summer Championships.

all tie. Hector then won a doubled gammon to make the score 7–3. But Cohn fought back to even things at 7–all.

At 11–all in game 17, the following key checker play for Cohn arose:

15-point Michigan finals. Harry Cohn (Black) and Homer Hector (White) are tied at 11-all. **BLACK TO PLAY 6-3.**

STOPPOTS—A REPLY TO DANNY

Danny Kleinman is one of the persons, if not the person, that I respect the most in the backgammon community, especially when it comes to ethical questions and matters regarding tournament procedures. But even an individual like Danny is bound to make incorrect judgements every now and then.

In last month's "Ask Danny" column, Danny answers questions raised about StopPots, and in my humble opinion, he makes a few errors in his arguments regarding the pros and cons of Chris Ternel's popular invention.

Danny agrees that StopPots offer more flexibility than normal mini-jackpots, and everyone who has seen both would not hesitate to second that observation.

Then Danny speculates that StopPots might be impractical for the organizers. That might be the case. They do give the organizers some extra work. The question is: how much trouble should you go through as an organizer to please your

customers.

In many ways, StopPots are easier to run than jackpots. With normal minijackpots, the organizers have a lot of work paging players who are not available (due to tournament matches, dinner breaks, etc.). This work does not disappear with StopPots, but it does make it easier for all parties in that when a player signs up, he gets the "next available" opponent.

Danny has doubts about how he would rule if a player could not be provided opponents at the stake (round) he signed up for. The answer involves simple contract law. The organizers do not guarantee that you will be provided opponents. They simply provide a venue for your desires. Naturally, the organizers reserve the right to pay out the amount corresponding to the round that you have qualified for at any given time.

At the Nordic "Wide" Open, we had both mini-jackpots and StopPots, so players could choose the format they favored. This choice resulted in an "extra option" for the players attending the tournament. Not surprisingly, the vast majority chose StopPots.


Personally, I do agree with Danny when he rates the importance of tournament matches much higher than the moreor-less "insignificant" jackpots. The chase for fame and glory—that's me. However, the "votes" of the players tell me that

A RULES AND RULINGS COLUMN

SCORESHEET IS PART OF MATCH

Dear Danny: Recently I saw a player I respect keeping score for a match by writing not only the points obtained so far by each player, but also the points needed by each player. The scoresheet for a 7-point match between players Black and White might look like this:

I thought this was a good idea, so I started doing it myself. Recently a player at

the local club, who is quite knowledgeable about backgammon rules, told me that he thought this was a violation, since one is not allowed to write down anything which would assist you. Another player at the club disagreed, saying that you can write the score in any format you like, including the needs x, needs y format, or for that matter, in binary or with Roman numerals. I think there are good arguments for both sides, but for the time being, I have stopped keeping score this way. What do you think? —David Montgomery, Silver Spring, MD

DEAR **D**AVID: I agree with the first player at your club in objecting to writing the number of points needed for match victory on the scoresheet. Technically, it is a written aid, even if trivial. Using pencil and paper to tally or keep running pip counts would similarly violate the rules.

I believe there is a second, more significant reason for objecting, however. A scoresheet is not the private property of a player but a part of the match itself. An opponent has the right to examine and rely on it. Extraneous numbers may induce an error.

The rules presume (without explicitly requiring) that the score will be kept in the form of points already won using the common decimal notation: we need not

clutter up the rule book to say so.

I disagree vehemently with the second player at your club. If binary notation is permissible, then why not octal? When I run for Governor, conversion to octal will be a central plank in my platform, to be implemented by mandatory amputation of the finger Californians use so rudely to give the "bird" to their fellow mankind.

The value of octal notation may not be apparent in 7-point matches, but it becomes clearer in 15-point matches. Suppose that my opponent, taking the cube at 2, glances at my scoresheet and sees me leading, "13" to "11." Accordingly, he redoubles immediately. Of course, my "13" in octal means *eleven*, and his "11" means *nine*: hooray for "New Math!"

If my opponent is "numerate" in base-eight arithmetic, of course, I'll have to vary my tactics by keeping score in Hebrew. Hebrew, I'm told, is a truly wonderful language in which HE is SHE, WHO is HE, and ME is WHO. That'll confuse 'em even if octal notation does not.—*Yours, Danny* Δ

Danny and I are not with the majority here. Tournament participants entered the StopPots in great numbers; but even more telling was the astonishing 200 players who came to the tournament *for StopPots only*.

Finally, it should be noted that Danny's article uses dollars when working out his example. At our tournament, we used Danish Crowns with an exchange rate of \$1 = 5.50 DKK. I make this point just so that nobody is under the impression that the Danish Backgammon Federation is "coining it in" on the low stakes player by forcing them in at the \$25 level straight away.

Indeed Danny, as you write, who is anyone to second-guess fashions?... so aptly put following your judgement of StopPots as "only a gimmick" and a "fad."

Based on the feedback we've had at the Nordic "Wide" Open, StopPots may be a natural improvement of the good old jackpot.—Erik Gravgaard, President, Danish Backgammon Federation, Birkeroed, Denmark

Chris Ternel informs us that Niels Haarbo (programmer for the Shareware program "Bearoff Solver") has developed a computer program for the management of StopPots. The Beta version was successfully demonstrated at the recent Monte-Carlo Cup. Next year's Nordic "Wide" Open (5–8 April 1996) will use the program and Chris is certain that this will significantly reduce player waiting time.—Ed.



Sensing that the time was right for escape, Harry player 24/18, 16/13. Homer responded with a 4-3, entering and hitting Harry on his 7-point. Hector eventually won an undoubled gammon to take a 13-11 lead.

Afterwards, a number of players felt that because Cohn was not that pressed to escape, the consolidating 16/7 was best. Others felt that slotting the 3-point (12/3)



was the big play. There's no doubt that the choice is close, although Cohn still likes his play.

Homer eventually grabbed a 14-13 Crawford lead, but Harry appeared to be rolling an easy win home when the following position (shown at left) came about.

One play prior, Harry had known what a double 6 could do, but he had no reasonR.I.P.


Recorded Game between Bob and Steve:

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

PROBLEM #214 SOLVED

Match to 9 points. White leads Black 7 to 6. **BLACK TO PLAY 2-2.**



This problem should not exist. Black should definitely have turned the cube before this roll. This would be a very sound money double with a clear advantage and plenty of strong threats. At the given match score, with White unable to use the cube once she owns it and with gammons helping Black but not White, it is doubtful if White even has a take. Thus, I will examine this problem ignoring the cube position and just look at the merits of each play.

Black has three main approaches:

(a) The pure play: 8/4(2)(b) The safe play: 22/20, 8/2

(c) The blitzing play: 6/2, 5/3(2)*

There are variations on some of the themes (e.g., we might play 22/20, 8/4, 6/4), but the above three seem to be the best way to carry out each theme. Let's stick with them and try to choose a winner.

The pure play (a) gives Black a very solid position. The main drawback, of course, is the blot left dangling on the 2-point. This is quite serious. Not only does Black lose a lot of ground if the blot is hit, but if it is missed, he still has the difficult problem of cleaning it up next roll. Purity is nice, but it may be that this play gives White too many good rolls: 2s to hit, and 3s to make the advanced anchor.

The safe play (b) leaves White little to shoot at, and gives Black good distribution with which to follow through if White is unable to anchor. The big downside comes when White does anchor on Black's 3-point. Suddenly ownership of the 2-point almost becomes a liability, as these checkers are

basically out of play. Just like the pure play, this choice gives White some rolls which definitely put her back in the game.

The ugly blitzing play (c) might not even occur to some players. It leaves a very awkward structure with no builder on the 6-point, four checkers on the 8-point, and the valuable 5- and 4-points left open. However, it has two very important things going for it.

First, two of White's checkers are on the bar. It is impossible to overestimate how powerful this can be, especially against a three point board. 25% of the time, White will flunk, and Black will be in great position to distribute his builders and move in for the kill. 50% of the time White will only enter one checker, and Black will still have pretty much a free hand to continue the attack. Only the 25% of the time White enters both checkers will Black really wish he hadn't made this play.

Second, White is prevented from making an advanced anchor. This is extremely important. After either the pure play or the safe play, if White rolls a 3, she is in the game forever with a very solid position. After the blitzing play, White will have to roll two good numbers to get the advanced anchor she badly needs.

Another hidden advantage of the blitzing play is that the checkers on the 11-point are suddenly activated as builders for an inner board point. As long as the 5-point is made, these checkers are somewhat out of play. However with the 5-point being a point Black is trying to make, these checkers are once again very important.

Putting it all together, it looks like the "ugly" blitzing play is the winner. The gains from sending the second checker to the bar and preventing White from making the advanced anchor appear to more than make up for the bad distribution and loss of the valuable 5-point.

This sort of switching play is often missed at the table. It is very natural to think that once the 5-point is made, you will want to hold it forever, so the switch isn't even considered as a candidate. Be on the lookout for such plays at all times, especially when a blitz is a possible strategy. They are often big winners. Δ
