have a conspiracy to report. I dialed 1-800-OLIVERSTONE, but once they learned I had no connection to the CIA they lost interest. So I will expose it here in the POINT.

Sunday, 2 February 1997 was the 17th annual Illinois State Challenge Cup. Eight teams from around the state converged on Peoria to battle it out. In a clever bit of scheduling, one of the "Springfield Series" tournaments was held at River Station Restaurant (the Challenge Cup site) on Saturday, February 1. (Congratulations to winner Cliff Mayoh, runner-up Ben Zemaitis, to 2nd Consolation winner Harry Cohn, and to my dice, who won the Consolation with little help from their roller.) Those of us who had come to Peoria a day early to enter the Springfield Series, had an entire evening to kill. This is when the dire plot was carried out.

Next to our Hotel, the Pere Marquette (a fine old place that just celebrated its 70th anniversary), is a gentleman's club known as Big Al's. One of the conspirators, in fact, was heard to remark: "What a great hotel. It's right next to Big Al's!" (Pere Marquette marketing department take note.)






MADONNA BETTER AT BACKGAMMON

Chicago Point Book Review

A Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the Four-Point ©1997 by Jake Jacobs. Published by ToBak Press. Spiral bound soft cover. 196 pages. \$36 plus postage. Available from Carol Joy Cole; 3003 Ridgecliffe Drive; Flint, MI 48532. 810/232-9731.

I have been asked to review a book where the cast of characters includes an enormous snake, an elephant, and a small woman dressed in "what might be described as a Martian bridesmaid's costume." (Photographs are included, perhaps to allay any suspicions that the author might have drawn his inspiration from a bout of *delirium tremens*.)

You'll encounter Dr. Frankenstein, Igor, and Renfield, all huddled around the, same operating table. There's Little Lamb and the Wolf, Joel Cairo, Brigid O'Shaughnessy, Captain Jacoby Rule, Scrooge and the ghosts, Captain Blood, the Answer Man, the Great Dane, Chick F. Araby, and an endless parade of bar girls, dancers, masseuses, gamblers, and assorted epicures.

The action takes place in Chicago, Memphis, Las Vegas, Costa Rica, Hong Kong, Seoul, Bangkok, the Genting Highlands, the Philippines, and Phuket (Phuket?)

"I know!" the cry rings out as a hand shoots up. "It's a screenplay for the Mel Brooks/Larry Flynt/Tobe Hooper remake of 'Around the World in 80 Days.""

"Wrong again," replies the Answer Man. "Captain Jacoby Rule was the giveaway. This is a backgammon book!"

It is, IN FACT, the collected backgammon writings of Jake Jacobs. Most of the material has been published before in the Chicago, Boston, Indianapolis, Memphis, and Flint newsletters, but there are a couple of new pieces and a considerable amount of introductory material and retrospective commentary. Altogether it makes for a nice blend of entertainment and instruction, resembling nothing that has been published since Lewis Deyong's Playboy Book of Backgammon 20 years ago. Even this comparison is a bit of a stretch—somehow I can't picture Deyong watching Ling Ling do her thing aboard the Shangri-La, or joining Fast Freddie's quest for genuine Dong Dong Ju in a series of Korean dives.


Jake plays well and writes well. In addition to the entertaining chouettefantasies and travel tales, there is a lot of good instructional material in *A Funny Thing...*, memorably presented. For example, faced with CHICAGO POINT Problem #167, a double-3s play with a confusing array of mixed blitzing and priming options, Jake cuts through the chaos by focusing strictly on the number of response rolls that prevent an effective cube turn, and then pronounces "Jockey Jake's touting report" on each "nag."

This is the sort of backgammon writing that sticks with you, unlike dry unadorned enumeration. Among other things, it teaches the important lesson that it is better to use a decision-procedure that "probably works" than to despair of finding the ultimate "right answer" and resort to vague intuitions and feelings.

The few errors in the book mostly result from the author's tackling theoretical problems without a complete mastery of the technical tools. Certainly you don't have to be a mathematician to play backgammon, but someone with a scientific background is more likely to grasp the mathematical *big picture* that lets you distinguish infallibly between things you know and things you only think you know.

Jake is quick to admit that when high school math came around, his main ambition was "to be a hoodlum," and that consequently he "don't know much about algebra." Nonetheless, in one essay, he takes on the general problem of the cubeless take-point at 4-away/3-away, and after some rather random number shuffling concludes that "It varies between 27–35%." That would seem to exclude the following bearoff position:


Match to 7 points. Black trails White, 3–4. Black on shake. **CUBE** ACTION(S)?



Here, the 4-away player can take, though it's a money drop with cubeless chances under 25%. In fact, this situation is typical for the score, and in long races, takes dip well under 24%.

OCCASIONALLY, THE ANALYSIS is a bit too casual for my taste:

Match to 13. White (Jake) leads Doug Roberts 6-4. WHITE TO PLAY 6-2.



Jake writes "I reasoned that I would lose less than 1½% additional games with my risky play; surely I would gain more than enough gammons to compensate. According to *Expert Backgammon*TM, no I would not. While a hit is not a win for Doug, it is a gammon-saver. Also, in completing my bearoff, I have a good chance of wasting, costing me the roll I 'gained.'''

A few simple facts, none very hard to obtain, would have shed a great deal more light on this problem. If you know that (a) Jake already wins a gammon 75% of the time with the safe play; (b) the safe play results in getting hit 7% of the time vs. 14% for the risky play, and (c) the risky play bears off less than half a roll faster, then it becomes clear that Jake's position is past the point of diminishing returns for aggressive gammon-hunting.

For extra credit he might have told us how many men you have to add to the ace and deuce points to justify aggression (I think the answer is two, but I don't know for sure.)

Over ALL, THOUGH, compared with most other backgammon books, *A Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the Four-Point* is at least as accurate and vastly more entertaining. The book is well produced with a plastic comb binding and an attractive cover, and the text (including the 136 backgammon position diagrams) is crisply printed and easy to read.—*Walter Trice* Δ



beer and helping a deserving young lady pay for her college education. What the sinister cabal never dreamed was that overseas, my usual training regimen consists of staying out all night drinking beer and helping a deserving young lady pay for her family's water buffalo. As is well known, too much thought tightens up the muscles of the rolling arm, and by the next morning I was nothing if not loose.

As I stated, there were eight Illinois clubs participating in this year's Challenge Cup: Pub Club, Bar Point, Winnetka, Sangamon Valley, Central Illinois (Peoria), Bloomington-Normal, Prime, and the newest entrant from Chicago, Games People Play. The format this year allowed each team to face only six of its seven competitors. The six highest available master point finishers from each club comprised the teams. Players would face the other team members of like ranking.

Playing first board for the Pub Club, I drew Neil Kazaross, the Bar Point Club's "numero uno," as my first round opponent. Neil soon had me down 4–2 Crawford (all matches were to 5 points) and was closing me out for the kill when I entered with a 2-5, hitting, then closed out three of his men. Later in the game:

Position #1. White (Jake) trails Neil 2– 4, Crawford. BLACK ON ROLL.




Neil, a sweetheart of a guy, was kind enough to roll 2-1 here. I rolled 6-1, then he rolled another 2-1. I now rolled 5-1, which was just enough to give Neil a flicker of hope. This is what Bob Ebbeler calls "teasing the animals." Neil entered with 6-3 and was backgammoned for the match.

Besides being one of the world's best match players, Neil is a terrific sport, and was the first to shake my hand—after he got through breaking his board over my head.

NEIL WAS NOT THE UNLUCKIEST OF MY victims. That distinction belongs to Winnetka's Paul Friedman. But unfortunately (or fortunately for Paul's sake), whatever I did to him was so terrible, that even I have blotted out the memory. I do, however, recall this from my match with

downstater Dick Nelson:


Position #2. Double match-point. WHITE (Jake) TO PLAY 6-5.



I hope we all agree that the 5 should be played 18/13? Now it's just a choice of 6s. Most players, especially as they rationalize that it's double match-point and gammon wins are of no extra value, want to keep the 6-prime. This is hugely wrong for money, and is merely gigantically wrong here. The difference in win percentage is 78.1% for the timid play, and 83.5% for the hit. I hit. Dick rolled 1-1. Yikes!


Some time later things had improved for me all the way to here:

Position #3. Double match-point. WHITE (Jake) TO PLAY 4-3.




It is very tempting to run with 22/15, making an intermediate bid to escape. In fact, Dick's 4-1 would have left a double shot. However, I kept the anchor, which turns out to be best: 17.9% vs. 10.4%. I was rewarded with a 4-4 the next roll, but found I lacked a follow through:

Position #4. Double match-point. WHITE (Jake) ON ROLL.



I rolled a set. Dick rolled 5-1. I didn't roll a second set, but Dick rolled another ace. Hugh Sconyers' data base says that I had a 14.6% chance of winning the match from the position above, so next time you find yourself in this spot, you'll know. My LAST VICTIM was Games People Play director J.A. Miller. Trust me when I say that my having reached double match point was a miracle. Still, I have been in better positions:

Position #5. Double match-point. WHITE (Jake) TO PLAY 5-3.



It is natural to want to cling to the deuce-point, much like Ahab clinging to Moby Dick as it drags him under. It is imperative to break anchor here, for two reasons. First, once the board is gone, what good is hitting a shot? Second, leaving creates shot leaving numbers for Black. Sure, Black's 6-1 goes from horror shake to joker, but his 6-5 now leaves a double shot, and the other seven 6s now force a shot where there was none.

After splitting 23/18 with the 5, how should we play the 3? I closed the board: 4/1. JellyFish[™] gives the equity nod to 23/15 if we are playing for money (I make the assumption that at money, White owns the cube), but only by 0.002 on a 1-cube.

In win percentage, the choice is clear: close the board. Breaking the board wins a mere 12.6%, running wins 16.9%, but splitting and closing wins 17.7%. The upside of closing the board is apparent. What is hard to spot is that, especially at double match-point, there is very little downside. Aces, the numbers that hit, already played well for Black. Black's biggest gain is on 4-1, but notice that White has four numbers (2-6 and 2-5) that hit off the bar, and the other seven 2s remake the deuce.

J.A. rolled 6-3. Aha! Instant gratification. I flunked. Instant pain. J.A. rolled 5-4, and cleared his 6-point. Students of the game know that the dice like to bait their masters by producing the "joker" one roll late. By shifting points, J.A. had cleverly tricked my dice into giving me my joker. You see, they thought, with the ace blot now covered, that 6-1 was no longer a good shake for me. "Hee, hee," they giggled, and tumbled out 6-1. Well, the joke was on them: it was *still* a good shake for me. It was, of course, less good for J.A.

As it turned out, one of my teammates, young mad scientist Kurt Schurecht, also





PROBLEM #231 ANALYZED by Danny Kleinman

Double match point. BLACK TO PLAY 6-2.



When Bill Davis first showed me this problem, I studied it for a couple of minutes, just about as long as I'd spend in an important match. I ignored the doublehit 7/1*, 10/8*, which not only put a man out of play on the 1-point, but also broke the bar-point, a vital part of Black's prime.

That left the passive blot-minimizing (a) 18/10 and the natural-looking single-hit (b) 13/7, 10/8*. At any match score where gammons mattered, I'd choose (b). Sending a fourth man back increases Black's shot exposure: 14 shots for (b) versus 22 for (a). But a fourth man back lets White play a back game. How we loved back games 20 or 25 years ago! They offer much better winning chances than deucepoint or treypoint games, and are spectacular when they succeed. Only when we learned their price-excessive gammons-did we start avoiding them. At double match-point, however, White can play a back game for free. This must be the point of the problem! Therefore, I reported to Bill, I'd force White to play with one anchor rather than two by moving (a) 18/10. I was pleased to hear Bill reply that (a) was the play made at the table by X, a top expert who shall remain anonymous.

For several reasons, I convinced myself later, that X and I were wrong.

1. The issue is not only how many anchors White will have but how good Black's position is. After (a), Black's position simply isn't that strong. His 10-point is of no use in conjunction with the alreadymade 4-, 5-, 6- and bar-points. His spares on the 4- and 5-points are illplaced, and he has little chance of making the 3-point (no other active builders for it). Likewise he has little chance to extend his prime backwards to the 8-point. In contrast, (b) gives black *four* active builders for the 3-point and a *slotted* 8-point with direct and indirect covers. Black is a big favorite to preempt the 3-point (the strongest anchor for White in a back game).

- 2. Four men back do not a back game make. After (b), White winds up with three men on the deucepoint and one on the acepoint almost as often as a 1-2 back game, and seldom gets a 2-3 or 1-3 back game.
- Play (a) often lets White, fearless of gammons, play a back game anyway. White is only two blots away from a Polish Prime (string of six points either made or slotted). On 5-4 next, for example, White can play a blot-happy 17/12*, 8/4. Then black will usually have to send a fourth man back lest he find himself trapped behind an ordinary prime.
- 4. Play (a) gives White other options. Sometimes White can make an outpost on Black's 8-point. Sometimes White can play a "front" game, hitting and containing Black's blot. Sometimes the game may become a donnybrook of hits and

return hits in which White, with an anchor and a board nearly as good as Black's, will not be at a serious disadvantage.

WHAT GOOD ARE mere human judgments in this era of reliance on computers, however? Table #1 (below) shows what Jelly-FishTM Analyzer has to say.

Notice JellyFish's remarkable consistency. In the first three rows, (a) yields 0.5% or 0.6% more wins than (b) whether JellyFish is "evaluating" at Level 6 or 7 or performing rollouts at Level. 5. In the fourth row, Level 6 rollouts for (b) agree with Level 7 evaluations to the nearest *tenth of a percent*, not only for total wins but also for gammons and backgammons. Only at Level 6 do the rollouts yield fewer wins for (a) than for (b): by 1 ½%.

I suspect that Level 6 plays the White side better than Level 5 for (a) but not (b). Recall that (a) gives White more options of *different game plans*, options of the most difficult kind. Perhaps it is here that Level 6 judges better than Level 5. Even Level 6, however, sometimes misjudges. For cubeless play differs from play at double matchpoint in that gammons still count. If Jelly-Fish could play heedless of gammons, I suspect, its Level 6 rollouts would show *more* than a $1\frac{1}{2}\%$ advantage for (b) 13/7, $10/8*. \Delta$


