




John Jennings rolling to victory.





PLUG THE HOLE?


Dear Danny: I have trouble with leaving shots. It seems that when I do, I always get hit.

[Stop right there! If your blots were sure to get hit, you should give up backgammon right away, for the cards are stacked (or should I say the dice are loaded?) against you. Even world champions are forced occasionally to leave game-winning shots, but when they do, they incur no more than 31% risk of immediate loss. If you, in contrast, are *certain* to lose, that handicap is impossible to surmount.

Fortunately, what you say isn't true (unless you really are playing with loaded dice). However, you are still handicapped severely, for your paranoid *belief* that it is true keeps you from leaving a shot when doing so is right.—DK]

So when I rolled a 6-2 in the following position, I knew what to do:

9-point match. Black and White are tied at 4 to 4. **BLACK TO PLAY 6-2.**



9/1 was the easy play for me. And when my opponent rolled 4-1 (which would have hit), I felt justified playing safe.

After I won the game despite leaving a later shot, my opponent said I had blundered. "9/3, 7/5 is clearly right. Plug the hole now and the dam won't burst later."

What's your take on this position? I would probably make the same play at double match point or for money, but now my opponent has created an inkling of doubt in my mind.—Uncertain

Dear Uncertain: You've taken a right first step in starting to doubt, listening to your (obviously more experienced) opponent's opinion and soliciting mine. Your second step should be to accept the assumption that the dice are fair. Your third step should be to focus not only on your fear of getting hit and the probability of that happening, but also on the costs when your opponent hits and the benefits when he does not.

Let's start with the benefits. The gap in your board creates a continuing danger of blotting. After moving 9/1, you'll blot on 6-4, 6-3, 5-5, 5-4 and 5-3 next. Other 5s and 6s will also play badly, piling more men still on your 1-point, which acts as a magnet, sucking in more and more of your checkers, stripping your points, creating new gaps. The more men you put out of play on your 1-point, the less ammunition you will have for the battles that may occur when you do get hit or for attacking a blot your opponent leaves when he breaks anchor. In contrast, after moving 9/3, 7/5, you'll be poised to make your 3-point with most 5s and some of your small numbers, reducing your future danger.

Now let's consider the costs of moving 9/3, 7/5. If you get hit, you may dance upon your opponent's strong board. However, your opponent still has two men behind your 5-prime, and only one is at the edge. Though he may be able to spring both men with a prompt 6 followed soon by an ace and another 6, he'll often fail. Then he may weaken and break his strong board, perhaps leaving a vulnerable blot of his own. In some scenarios, you'll pick up a third man, pounce on a blot in your home board, and win a gammon.

Without attempting any calculations, I'll judge that the large benefits of the bold play when you don't get hit exceed the modest costs when you do get hit. Call it "the voice of experience" talking.

If you judge otherwise, that's okay. You won't always be able to weigh benefits against costs accurately in complex positions, especially in the heat of play when you can't take forever to move. However, the more you attempt such comparisons, and the more willing you are to consider leaving blots, the better your game and your chances of victory will become. All I ask is that you try.— $Yours, Danny \Delta$



FRED GEHLHOFF DIES

Suffers Brain Hemorrhage While Playing Backgammon

Fred Gehlhoff, know as "Fredly" to many FIBS online backgammon players, died 8 November 2002 at a hospital in Green Bay, Wisconsin. He was 51.

As they would often do, Gehlhoff and Rhonda Young were playing backgammon on the evening of 6 November at their home in Kingsford, Michigan. Gehlhoff took a break, complaining of a severe headache. Rhonda massaged Fred's head, but the pain only worsened. She then went to get him a cold compress, but when she returned, he had suffered a massive cerebral hemorrhage.

Gehlhoff was airlifted by helicopter to a hospital in Green Bay, but the damage was in the brain stem area and judged to be inoperable. On Friday morning, November 8, the decision was made to remove him from life support.

A long-time chess player, Gehlhoff made the switch to backgammon in the late 1980s. An avid tournament player, he competed in 12 straight Midwest Championship events between 1990 and 2001. Fred moved up to the Championship level after winning the 1999 Chicago Open Intermediate title. In December 2000, he was a runner-up to Kit Woolsey in the Backgammon On Board V Caribbean Master's Jackpot.

al Heinrich stood upon the chair and peered into the viewfinder of the camera pointed down at the backgammon board. It was the pre-JellyFishTM era and Hal was recording another tournament match to add to his massive database for analysis at a later time. After adjusting the camera's field of view to include the entire board, Hal asked the players to use his large white and black dice because they stood out clearly on the videotape.


When Hal was confident the recording was working properly, the experts began their match. Then the two of us walked over to an open board and sat down. Hal picked up a dice cup and began twirling it in his hands while we talked a little "backgammon." I told him that I'd begun playing my opening 5-3 differently. I no longer made the 3-point, but now brought two men down from the midpoint. I felt it was better to concentrate on building the opponent's 5- and 4-points first. Hal listened patiently before expressing a different opinion: "I like building the 3-point."

I tried to sway Hal with some additional arguments for playing 13/10, 13/8 when Hal interrupted me stating, "I *really* like making the 3-point!"


The way Hal said "really," stopped me in my tracks. Sure, the Canadian master has won one more World Championship than I have, but that fact isn't what shut me up; it was the way he said "really." He was gently but firmly telling me to stop wasting my time with a new way to play a decent opening roll. I've always built the 3-point since that talk with Hal.

In the money game positions that follow, Black is always on roll with a 2-1 to play. I have not included any lengthy explanations justifying my answers (**shown on page 10**), but I will tell you that I *really* like my plays.—Duane Jensen. Δ




MAYFIELD AND SAX WIN IN MINN.




Doug Mayfield ponders a very difficult 4-3 play at double match-point in the Open finals vs. Richard del Furia.







PROBLEM #280 ANALYZED

by Steve Sax

Match to 7 points. Black and White are tied at 2–2. **BLACK TO PLAY 6-3.**



Thankfully my Snowie 4 arrived the same week I was asked to analyze Problem 285. But rather than use "Cliff's Notes" to find the right play, I'm going to try something novel. I'm going to reason my way to the correct move and only then use Snowie 4 to see if I've thought about it correctly.

The cube is in the middle and both players need five points to win the match. I don't see the cube being a factor after any reasonable play, so what we have here is a middle game checker move with some interesting and varied choices.

There are three possible choices, all quite different in nature. Choice A is simply to make the bar point and lifting the outfield blot (13/7, 9/6), Choice B is double hitting (9/3*, 7/4*), and choice C is making the midpoint (22/13). There are some other

legal choices that I like a lot less. (Watch one of them be the right choice—LOL.)

Choice A (13/7, 9/6) is a passive waiting play. Making the bar and lifting the blot leaves Black up 13 pips in this holding position. White now figures to run out with one or both checkers or if lucky, anchor up in Black's board. Thus a majority of the time on his next move, Black will have the chance to attack a White blot with the two checkers on the 7-point and builder on the 6-point.

If on the following turn Black doesn't roll an efficient attacking number, he can move his checkers on the 22-, 20- and 18-points with surprising freedom. Since White's outfield points are stripped and Black has White out-boarded three-to-one, Black can move all numbers but 3s off those points. And since 3s are good attacking numbers in his home board, Black gets nice diversification of his numbers.

Black's overall strategy after play A is to wiggle his back pieces forward into his opponent's and then his own outfield, keeping a potential blitz option as a wild card.

Choice B is to go for the blitz immediately which has an initial success rate of 25%. This is not to say that if you double hit and are hit back you lose, or conversely if you double hit and are missed, you instantly win, but that first roll will be critical in determining the future winner of the game.

If Black double-hits and is hit back, three out of four times White is looking pretty good as she will be sending the sixth, perhaps seventh, and often eighth checkers back. This is a pretty ugly prospect since you have your ace-point made.

If Black is missed by one of White's nine dancing numbers, he then has aces, deuces, 9s 10s and 11s to cover. However all of these covering numbers still leave him

with one and sometimes two blots in his home board with limited future coverage.

Black is far from a cube when he double hits and White fans, and when Black is hit with the 27 numbers, he is in far worse shape.

A third option would be Choice C, running to the midpoint and leaving two blots in jeopardy of being hit by 3s, 4s, 5s, and 6s.

Your 13-pip lead is history after this play and you give up tempo along with your race lead if you choose this play. The upside of play C in making your midpoint is of limited value as a single blot on the 13-point exhibits almost as much pressure on White's stripped midpoint as the made point does.

A couple of other plays like hitting off the midpoint 13/4* or 22/16, 7/4* seem like half-hearted choices with little promise of being the best move.

I'm picking Choice A as the best play. I like maintaining my race lead and taking a chance at working my way through the paper tiger gauntlet of stripped points in White's outfield.

If you don't think White has to be on his best behavior being out-boarded and behind in the race, you would be wrong. Backgammon, after all, is a race and if you can find a way to simplify the game and get to that point you should do so.

Now let's see if my reasoning coincides with "The Great and Powerful Oz."

Amazingly enough, I did reason correctly (assuming Snowie is correct) that the best Choice was A (13/7, 9/6). Second best was B, double hitting (my second choice too). In point of fact, Play A is best by so much that you should return the silver medal if you made play B. The other assorted plays came in far behind and are not important enough to note exactly where.

Remember the major criteria, which make Choice A best. You have a race lead and a superior board. Don't gratuitously give those away by making a weak attack or an unnecessary anchor. —Steve Sax Δ


