

The color helps you, the reader, know what's going on. In real life, the cube stays one color no matter who has it. CURTIS LUCAS'S SHIP COMES IN

Stuart Hosen wins Super Jackpot

71-year-old Curtis Lucas has prevailed in Las Vegas . . . and we're not talking about the Senior's Tourney! The retired Navy aircraft engineer from Dallas, Texas saw his ship come in at the Las Vegas Open Championship leaving such players as Emil Mortuk, Fred Kalantari, and Mike Senkiewicz in the wake. The event was staged 20–24 November at the Riviera Hotel by the Nevada Backgammon Association. Howard Markowitz directed assisted by an able staff.





Lucas had a successful Intermediate run in 2000 and 2001 winning in Vegas and Prague and capturing the Consolation in Paris. He was also a finalist in the 2001 Illinois State Championships Open division. So although Snowie ranked him as an "Intermediate," Curtis Lucas knows how to win.

The 17-point finals against New Yorker Reza Rezaian is case in point. Although given less than a 30% chance of winning (according to Snowie), Lucas steered his dice to a 13–8 lead after 10 games. That's when the tide changed for Rezaian. He won eight of the next ten points to grab a big 16–15 Crawford lead.

Trailing for the first time in the match, Curtis would need two wins in a row *unless* he could grab a gammon. And that's the direction the game was taking when . . .





'DOUBLES' TROUBLE

Dear Miss Lonelyblots: My friend and I are both new to the tournament scene. Recently we played in our first Doubles tournament. It was fun at first, but at double match-point, we had a very unpleasant situation. We were Black, and he was rolling the dice and moving the checkers.

Tournament double match-point. **BLACK TEAM TO PLAY 6-3.**



My partner reflexively ran off the 3anchor (22/13). Before I was able even to cry "Wait!" he picked up the dice. We were punished when Black rolled 5-3. Instead of a double shot, we had a single shot and needed a 3 to stay alive. He rolled a 6-2 and it was "game over."

Please tell my partner how wrong he was. Do you think the team member on roll should always have the final say? I think this rule is bad for teamwork.—Peeved Partner

DEAR **P**EEVED: I would have made the play you favor, 21/12, as reflexively as your partner made his play. In general, to maximize shot chances one should break the more advanced anchor, not the deeper one. A blot on the deepest occupied point is very lonely indeed.

In particular, the significant swings in this position occur when White rolls 5-3, 5-2 or 3-3. As you noticed, White's actual 5-3 left 11 shots after your partner's play but would have left 21 shots after yours. Had White rolled a 5-2, in contrast, your play would have yielded 17 shots while your partner's play would have yielded 21. That's a net gain of 12 shots in 1296 sequences for your play on these rolls.

We must also take White's 3-3 into consideration. After your partner's play, White's 3-3 leaves 11 shots while your play leaves none. Superficially, that virtually equalizes the shot chances of the two plays and makes it a toss-up between them. However, the chance that White will roll 3-3 actually favors your play, which keeps White from bearing any men off and retains the shot chances that you have in the position, which are slightly higher than 11 in 36.

So over all, the gain from your play is slightly more than 12 shots in 1296. Against that, some of White's 3s, 6-3 and 4-3, leave shots at *two blots* (on his 1-point

and 3-point) after your partner's play (but not after yours). Shots at the blot on the 1-point, though they duplicate the aces you can use to cover your own inside blot, are especially potent because they sometimes let you hit the blot on the 3-point too. Thus despite the greater frequency with which your play lets you hit shots, your partner's play is about equally good and may even be slightly better.

Regardless, your partner was wrong to lift his dice so quickly. It is not only discourteous, but also foolish not to give a teammate time to suggest an alternative move. Why play doubles at all except to be able to consult? Though I cannot tell whether your partner's haste in lifting his dice was intentional(from disrespect) or inadvertent (from inattention), you'd be wise to choose a different partner next time.

However, it is right for the rules to give the roller the final say on moves. Else disagreements between partners could be endless, which would be fair to neither the opponents nor the tournament. Rules cannot protect against everything. Rules should protect against the actions of an opponent, but (except in cases of dumping and other grievous offenses) not against the actions of a partner— $Miss\ Lonelyblots\ \Delta$

with 18/8 is clearly better at this score because even when White enters and hits (except with 4-4 and 5-5), he faces the extremely dangerous jeopardy of being rehit with one or two additional blots exposed.

Not to worry. Reza danced and Curtis tossed 4-4, making his 5-point and eventually closing out his unlucky opponent to win a gammon and \$22,000 in prize money.

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
I looked at the score—3-3 in a 17-point match. Hmm, that didn't help! Later, I showed this to various players, and asked "Who is on roll?" Neither side should redouble, so the answers split. Most players leaned toward White redoubling, since he has 15 powerful shakes, and wins a lot of gammons . . . if he wins. The others decided that, if whichever side they chose was on roll, Black stood better overall. In fact, Black really is close to a proper redouble, as he wins about 2/3, and nearly 30% of the times he wins, he wins a gammon.

In real life it was Black redoubling, as I learned when White passed!

Welcome to the ProAm Invitational. From November 16–24, Howard Markowitz and a top-flight staff staged a huge tournament at the Riviera Hotel in Las Vegas. By combining the ProAm with the Nevada State Championships, Howard was able to draw hundreds of players, including most of the world's best. (Though the three Chicagoans voted into the Giant 32 were all absent. Notes from your mothers, gentlemen!)

The ProAm Invitational is played in a doubles tournament format. The entry is \$13,000, and the teams willing to cough up that kind of dough are made up of some of the best players in the game.

Pos. 2. 17-pt. match. Black leads White 11–8. BLACK TO PLAY 6-4.




Armando Balbi, Jerry Grandell, Stu Hosen, Steve Sax. After paying \$13,000, how'd you like to face one of them!? At this board, those four were facing each other, Armando and Jerry acting as the Boys from Brazil (Jerry is an honorary member), while Stu and Steve formed the Red-Headed League. Armando and Jerry (Black) led 11–8 to 17 when Jerry rolled 6-4. I see at least five plays to think about: hitting on the 14-point; bringing two down;

hitting twice; making the 4-point; or making the acepoint.

The last play is also the worst play. Of the hitting plays I would lean toward bringing two men down as it leaves the fewest returns and gives you six builders for the 4-point. But all the hitting plays are blunders. Building the 4-point is best. (Armando and Jerry actually played 24/14*.)


Pos. 3. 17 pt. match. Black leads White, 15–10. BLACK TO PLAY 5-4.



Argentinean great Leo Fernandez, and his partner, Portugal's Jose Salema, were in comfy shape in their match with Hammond & Svobodny, when Leo rolled this 5-4. There are two things that are true: (1) the best play to win the game is to make the 3-point; and (2) if you make the 3-point, when you win, you'll almost always win a gammon.


So, make the 3-point? No! If you hit (14/5* is the best way), White will have three men up against a four-point board. On his side, he has only a two-point board, and a blot. Meanwhile the cube is still available to you. Pointing wins 87.8%, and hitting 86.5%, so hitting costs only 1.3% wins. Meanwhile, though pointing wins 71.2% gammons, hitting grabs 76.9%. Leo and Jose pointed, but won a gammon and the match anyway.

Pos. 4. 17-pt. match. Black leads White 8–4. BLACK TO PLAY 4-1.




Great players make for great problems. Unfortunately, because there were so many good matches, I couldn't watch all of them! Someone showed me this position, and I know it came from a match between X-22 and Falafel, but who was rolling, and how they played it, I cannot tell you. The debate was between 6/2*, 24/23 and 6/2*/1*. In discussing it 6/2*, 22/21 and 6/2*, 13/12 were mentioned in passing. Actually, both of those latter two are better than splitting the acepoint. All three are inferior to the double hit.

Pos. 5. 19-pt. match. White leads Black 5-4. WHITE ON ROLL. CUBE ACTIONS?



I've remarked on this before: top players have bigger cubes. The triple shot and the prime might scare lesser players, but Donald Kahn and his partner Kit Woolsey (author of the brand new *Encyclopedia of Backgammon*) correctly took, and were "rewarded" when they reached:

<u>Pos. 6.</u> 19-pt. match. White leads Black 5-4. Black recubes. **SHOULE WHITE TAKE?**



Black has one extra man, but a seven pip lead. It turns out that his cubeless probability of winning is exactly 76%. White's takepoint is slightly higher than normal, at 26%, and his recube is somewhat crippled, since Black only needs about 14% winning chances to take a 16-cube.



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
But cube efficiency is pretty high in races, and White has a proper take. I put the quotes around "rewarded" up above, because Leo and Jose took, and won eight points. Kahn/Woolsey nearly pulled off a long post-Crawford rally, before being stopped 15–19.

Pos. 7. 19-pt. match. Black leads White 8-7. Black on roll. CUBE ACTION(S)?



If an 8-game isn't giddy enough for you, how about a 16? Martha Ghio and Kent Goulding (Black) don't have quite enough here to redouble, since their opponents have a better board. Herb Gurland and Ed O'Laughlin had no trouble taking, and no trouble redoubling here.


<u>Pos. 8.</u> 19-pt. match. Black leads White 8–7. White redoubles. **TAKE FOR BLACK?**



The knee-jerk reaction to a big cube is that the takepoint must be lower than normal. In fact, the one point lead is enough to raise Black's takepoint to almost 27%. Meanwhile, the recube is severely crippled since White only needs about 9% to take on 16. The seven pip race lead puts this right on the money border and a big pass at the score, but Martha and KG misguessed over the board. White rolled 6-3,


and chose the slightly inaccurate 16/10, 18/15. The tradeoff seems to be two extra building numbers, for only one extra shot, but in fact 4-4 is still a joker for Black, so 18/12, 16/13 is best. The difference isn't huge, but it is big enough, especially when Black rolls 4-6 off the bar!

Pos. 9. 19-pt. match. Black leads White 8-7. Black on roll. CUBE ACTION(S)?



At Riverview Amusement Park in Chicago, I once saw a magician pass sheets of metal through a box occupied by his assistant. Paying an extra quarter, I was allowed to mount the stage, and peek over the top of the box. Inside I found the woman, extremely skinny and extremely flexible, had managed to solve the improbable geometry problem by fitting into a very narrow space. Given the small doubling window, and the likelihood of the position being too good, fitting a cube in here would require some magic. But this is a magical position, and the correct action is double/ take. Needless to say it didn't go that way at the table, and after rolling a 5, Martha and KG played on and won a gammon.

Pos. 10. 23-pt. finals tied at 22-all. WHITE ON ROLL . . .



They won their next round as well, reaching the finals, where they were joined by Armando Balbi and Jerry Grandell, who had just defeated Fernandez/Salema via a

16-game of their own. After a thrilling seven hour final (if *that* isn't an oxymoron), it all came down to this. With White on roll, Black's chances are up to 97.2%, but a just small enough 5-2 followed by the double shot-leaving 4-3, and 97.2% quickly dwindled away to zero.

On a special post-Christmas 26 December meeting, Lucky could only win with an outright victory and no points for Joe. The round-of-


eight was

BG/Superbowl Action Ideas

ooking for ways to merge backgammon with Superbowl Sunday? Try these:

- 1. CUBE FOOTBALL. Make a bet on the game with your friend at the established line. During any commercial break, you can double your opponent who must either take, pass, or beaver the cube before the start of the next play. Score a gammon if your team "beats the spread" by 14 or more points. To make it more interesting, you can win a gammon without cubing.
- 2. **PLAYING FOR POINTS.** Make a football bet with your friend at the established Vegas line. Then, an hour prior to kickoff, play him for half-points instead of money up until kickoff time. For example, if the Vegas line makes your team a +6 point underdog and you win 14 points at backgammon, your team now is getting +13 points. Δ



PROBLEM #286 ANALYZED

by Kit Woolsey

5-point match.Black leads White, 1 to 0. **BLACK TO PLAY 4-3.**



Black has three possible approaches:

- (1) He can play safe and tear up his board with 6/2, 4/1
- (2) He can keep everything in one piece and leave one blot and one direct shot with 9/2 or 13/10, 13/9
- (3) He can go all out with 18/14*, 6/3.

We can eliminate 9/2 and 13/10, 13/9 simply because they have to be worse than the safe play. 9/2 or 13/10, 13/9 leave a crushing direct shot, and don't gain Black much if he survives the shot. Black loses a valuable point, and he will have the same problems of clearing the back anchor in the future. These plays do keep Black's position in one piece better than 6/2, 4/1 if White misses, but the cost if White hits so outweighs this gain that the completely safe play has to be superior.

How do things look after 6/2, 4/1? Pretty ugly. Black's board is a wreck, and he is unlikely to be able to put it back together quickly. White will be able to play where she wants with complete freedom, and Black will be unable to hit a shot until he is able to clean up the blots in his inner board. Still, Black is far from lost. He is only a little behind in the race, and his checkers are safe for now. He will probably be able to clear either the 9- or 8-point next turn while he waits for the doubles he needs to bring his outfield checkers home. Meanwhile White will have to do something, and any move White makes will release some of the pressure on Black's fragile position. Most likely White will

break off the back anchor in the next roll or two while she can do so safely. The likely result is that Black will wind up with a barpoint holding game a little behind in the race. He will be an underdog, but there will be plenty of play left.

Now let's look at the big play: 18/14*, 6/3. Clearly if White hits back, Black is in very serious gammon danger. Is it worth the risk in order to put White on the bar against a three-point board and gain substantially in the race?

First, let's count White's hitting rolls so we know what kind of risk we are talking about. Any 2, 1-1, 1-6, and 5-6. That comes to 16 shot numbers. White has nine flunks, and 11 rolls which enter but don't hit.

We know what happens when White hits. Suppose White misses. Black will be in decent shape, but he will be far from a claim. He will have three blots to worry about, and White still has that huge board. Even if Black cleans up those blots, White will have plenty of chances from his 5-point holding game, with both shot-hitting and race potential. Black may eventually close in on a decent cube, but he has a long way to go before he reaches that point.

Speaking of the cube, might that be coming across the table quickly? Clearly if Black makes the safe play, White isn't close to a cube. White's racing lead is small, and she doesn't have any great threats. However, if Black plays 18/14*, 6/3, it is another story. Suddenly White has some huge threats—16 of them in fact. If White hits back, she will lose her market by a mile. This is sufficient justification for White to turn the cube immediately. Black would still have a take since he would be in good shape if White missed, but White would nevertheless have a strong double.

Slow death or quick death? If it were just a question of that, then maybe the gambling hitting play would be right. However, as we have seen, Black is far from dead if he plays safe. He is a little behind in the race, but only a little behind, and he can probably continue to play safe. It isn't necessarily slow death at all. The hitting play, on the other hand, definitely risks quick death, and doesn't automatically win the game when it works. These considerations point to discretion being the better part of valor. Black should play 6/2, 4/1 and hope to roll a timely doubles later on.

Big plays are often called for in inferior positions, particularly when they are likely to win the game if they work or if the position is pretty hopeless without the big play. Since neither is the case here, it is time for the small play.—*Kit Woolsey* Δ



We use "Web Album Wizard" for the Macintosh computer. It's really quite simple and a great way to store photos in an album format.—Ed. Δ


