
## MALCOLM STAYS HOT! Defeats Fogerlund in Pittsburgh Culpepper tops Sax in Masters

A nother Pittsburgh Backgammon Championships, another weekend of food, fun, and great backgammon. This year, director Steve Hast welcomed 133 players to the Pittsburgh Greentree Radisson 13–15 February, generating sellout fields in the Championship (64), both Masters (32), and Doubles (32 teams).

For the 11th straight year, the ABT Award Ceremony was held prior to the Saturday morning Calcutta auction (auctioneer Jeb Horton raised \$1100 for charity). Top 2003 finishers Malcolm Davis (TX), Dean Adamian (MI), and Ray Fogerlund (CA) were presented with trophies with honorable mention given to the 4th place finisher Gregg Cattanach (GA). Saturday evening, with only eight players left in the Championship field, the top four ABT finishers were still in contention!







#### WHAT'S IN A NICKNAME?

Dear Danny: Recently I talked with a well-known backgammon champion, Dallas Backgammon League director Tom Wheeler, at the Riviera Backgammon Tournament in Las Vegas. At that time, Tom insisted that henceforth, I should refer to him by the moniker "Z."

Here is the problem. There is already a very prominent backgammon champion, Steve Zolotow, who everybody already knows as "Z." He has used this nickname for 35 years. Shouldn't this interloper be obligated to at least refer to himself as "Z junior," or "Number Two Z"? Can, for example, a newcomer to boxing refer to himself as Mohammed Ali—"The Greatest"?

Backgammon is a line of business and name identification is valuable (e.g. X-22). Can someone usurp another's celebrity name?—Michael "Max" Maxakuli

**Dear M:** Funny you should mention Mohammed Ali, a military leader and contemporary of Napoleon's who was born in Turkey and became ruler of Egypt, Syria and Arabia. His name was usurped by Cassius Clay, a prizefighter from Louisville who claimed to be "The Greatest" (although the greatest heavyweight boxer was actually Joe Louis—er, Joseph Louis *Barrow*).

Speaking of Louisville, some years ago I received a telephone call from a woman whose name I did not recognized. She was trying to get in touch with an old schoolmate of hers named Danny Kleinman and asked if I was he. "Did you go to school in Louisville?" she asked.

"Yes," I replied. "I attended George Rogers Clark School in 1944."

"You're not the one. I went to school in Louisville with Danny Kleinman in 1951."

Some upstart had usurped my name, even before I became a celebrity.

I met Steve Zolotow, a most pleasant young man, about 35 years ago, when we played bridge and O'Hell together. Another Danny (yes, many people usurped my name) nicknamed him "Chuckles." I should think one nickname enough for any person, but apparently Steve was so greedy as to demand two, and adopted the nickname "Z" (which I didn't know until I received your letter, M). I guess "Z" is a "natural" nickname for someone whose surname begins with that letter.

However, Tom Wheeler's usurpation of Z's nickname isn't the first in the world of games. When I moved from New York to Los Angeles, I found that "The Beast" was no longer Ira Rubin (now a Hall-of-Famer) but another bridge player, the pro Conrad Potvin (who unlike Ira, *looked* like a beast but was a gentle soul). In Los Angeles O'Hell games during the 1960s, a player named Irving spoke with a heavy Brooklyn accent and thus acquired the nickname "Oiving." Soon another Irving, also with a Brooklyn accent, joined our games and usurped the nickname "Oiving." How could we distinguish the two? By calling the first "the Original Oiving," which soon became abbreviated "OO."

In the 1970s, an intelligent and informed young man who played bridge and backgammon, Richard Rodgers, arrived at the Cavendish West Club. Soon, eschewing the obvious choice of nickname "Hammerstein," he began calling himself "RR." I was present when an older bridge and backgammon player, Richard Ryder, objected, "You can't be RR: *I'm* RR."

Intervening quickly to prevent an incipient fistfight, I turned to Richard Rodgers and said, "You're *EE*."

"EE?" he asked. "What's that?"

"You're the *Erudite Englishmon*," I replied. The nickname stuck.

Names and nicknames are not proprietary, M. Titles, whether of books or songs, cannot be copyrighted. Soon after Beatles Lennon and McCartney wrote *Words of Love*, Papa John of the Mamas and Papas wrote a very different song with the same title, only to have his own nickname usurped by a pizza company.

Although Tom Wheeler is certainly entitled to use "Z" as a nickname, I'll offer him one that is more appropriate: the first letter of *his own* surname. From now on, Tom, please call yourself "Dubya" and leave poor Chuckles alone.—*Yours, K*  $\Delta$


to build one myself?—*Peter Gordon, via Internet* 

Buy the checkers before constructing the board. Then build the storage tray and quadrants to accommodate them. When six checkers are laid on the 1- through 6-point, there should be about 1/8 inch of play between the checkers and the frame.

Additionally, we have the January 1931 Popular Mechanics that includes the article "Inlaid Backgammon Board Made Easy." The described board is designed for 1.25 inch checkers, but everything can be relatively increased for larger checkers.

"Research, Alex. We were trying to discover which cold saké goes down best after you've lost all your matches."


"That sounds hard!"


"Was he a friendly giant, Uncle Jake, like Hagrid?"

Once again, attendance increased this year, up to 67 main flight participants from as far away as Massachusetts, Minnesota, New Mexico, and Mexico City.

In the Open division, Atlanta area expert Gregg Cattanach got off to a quick start in the 2004 ABT points race by defeating local player Don Faix twice to win the double elimination format. Congratulations to Gregg, who continues to be one of the hottest players in our game.


The Queen City Cup Masters event drew a full 16-player field with Stuart Thomson meeting John O'Hagan in the finals. Stuart, originally from Ottawa, has lived in Atlanta for the past seven years, and is one of the strongest players in the Southeast. John, the best player in Indiana, is also top-ranked in the Midwest.

The Snowie error rates for both players in the finals were between 2.1 and 2.3, making this one of the best-played finals in the history of backgammon. In addition to being outstanding players, Stuart and John are gentlemen who exhibit exemplary etiquette both during and after their matches. Let's take a look at a few interesting positions from the match.


Pos. 1: 13-point match. John O'Hagan (Black) and Stuart Thomson (White) tied at 2–2. **BLACK TO PLAY 4-1.** 



Stuart opened with 5-2 (bringing two down) and John correctly slotted the 5-pt with his 4-1 response. Extensive rollouts on Jellyfish, Snowie-3 and Snowie-4 indicate that slotting (13/9, 6/5) with 4-1 in the opening position is fairly close but measurably wrong. However, the case for slotting with 4-1 in Position 1 vs. slotting in the opening position is much stronger for these reasons:

- Some of White's 4s (4-1 and 6-4) are more constructive here than in the opening position. Slotting duplicates more of White's 4s.
- Black's race is 7 pips less favorable. It is less costly for Black to get hit when he already trails in the race.
- By slotting his 5-pt, Black begins to construct a prime. If he is missed and a prime-versus-prime position evolves, Black's less favorable race will work to his advantage.
- The alternative play of splitting with an ace (24/23, 13/9) may seem innocuous when White has only a one-point board; but in fact, it is riskier when White has more ammunition on his side of the board.

<u>Pos. 2:</u> 13-point match. John O'Hagan (Black) leads Stuart Thomson (White) 7 to 6. **WHITE TO PLAY 2-1.** (See position, upper right.)



John opened with 6-5 running and Stuart (White) responded with 2-1. This exact position was discussed in my Saturday morning seminar, just 28 hours earlier. Many experts routinely split (24/23, 13/11) here. Indeed, before the advent of Snowie and Jellyfish, nearly everyone split in this position. Stuart correctly slotted, 13/11, 6/5.

By contrast, the slot/split decision with 2-1 in the opening position is very close (within 0.005). The case for slotting with 2-1 in Position 2 is much stronger than the case for slotting with 2-1 in the opening position, for these reasons:

- White's race is 11 pips less favorable. It is less costly for White to get hit when he already trails in the race.
- If there is an exchange of hits on White's 5-point, Black will have only a single shot from the bar (15 numbers) at White's 5-point blot, compared to a double shot from the bar (21 numbers) if Black had two checkers back. Moreover, Black will be unable to anchor with only one checker back.
- One of Black's hitting rolls, 4-1, awkwardly forces him to leave a shot on his own side of the board.




Calcutta Auctioneer Peter Kalba with tourney administrator and Skunk Dice referee Robin Horton.

Pos. 3: 13-point match. John O'Hagan (Black) leads Stuart Thomson (White) 10 to 6. BLACK TO PLAY 6-3.



Position 3 dramatically illustrates that backgammon is an interesting, challenging and difficult game. I believe that over the board, the vast majority of players would make a whopper with 6-3. (Paul Magriel defines a "whopper" as an error of 0.10 or greater.) Undoubtedly, when presented as a problem, more would find the correct play.

Unfortunately for Black, he must break his six-prime with 6-3. Notice that White, also, is in danger of breaking his own sixprime.


Black's candidate plays are:

a.	12/6,9/6	White breaks with 25 numbers.
b.	8/5,8/2	White breaks with 27 numbers.
c.	7/4,7/1	White breaks with 29 numbers.
d.	12/6, 5/2	White breaks with 32 numbers.
e.	12/6,4/1	White breaks with 34 numbers.

I believe that most players would quickly play 8/5, 8/2 or 7/4, 7/1, and either not see or quickly dismiss the best move.

In this position, Black should sacrifice any notions of purity. The prime consideration (pardon the pun) is how often White, on his next roll, will be forced to break his own six-prime. As the above chart illustrates, White is most likely to break if Black makes the bizarre-looking play (e) (diagrammed in 3A), breaking his 4-point.

### Pos. 3A: Black has played 6-3 correctly: 12/6, 4/1.



The best play is 12/6 4/1; all other moves are whoppers! A play that breaks an inner point and slots a lower one is sometimes known as a "banana split" (though

perhaps "banana slot" would be a more accurate term).

In the actual game, John played 8/5, 8/2. Stuart doubled a few rolls later, but John won the game with double 3s on the last shake, taking a 12-6 lead in the 13point match. Stuart then went on a rampage, winning the last five games to claim the match and the Queen City Cup title. Congratulations to both Stuart and John for their world-class play!








**S** o many things to do, so little time. Black can make an anchor, make the offensive four point, or hit. All of these plays improve his position.

If Black makes the anchor, he should


probably play 13/9 with the four rather than 7/3. This improves his chances of making a blockade, and duplicates White's hitting sixes. 7/3 would create a new hitting number. Thus, the choices are 24/21, 13/9; 13/10\*, 10/6; and 8/4, 7/4.

Making the anchor secures against a crushing blitz and keeps Black in the game. The problem is that the game isn't very attractive. Black is behind in the race, behind in board development, White has only one checker back, and White has several hitting rolls. This approach may concede fewer gammons, but it doesn't make an attempt to win the game.

Hitting sends a second checker back and puts White on the bar. There are several blots, but White has to enter first. White has the stronger inner board so a blot-hitting contest favors White, but as long as Black survives he won't mind an exchange of hits. With reasonable luck he could wind up with an anchor and two or more of White's checkers back, which would give Black very reasonable winning chances.

Making the 4-point equalizes the inner board strength and leaves Black with a very

Malcolm went on to win eight points and closed out the match 13–1 (holding an 8-cube) in the next game. Overall, Snowie ranked Malcolm's play as World Class with a 2.75 error rate. Once again, the tall Texan is the man to catch in ABT 2004.

pure position. The problem with this play is that it is then White's roll. White's builders are nicely distributed, and Black has three vulnerable checkers in White's board. There is a significant danger that White will be able to carry out an attack if she has her full roll to play.

While all three plays have their advantages, the arguments for the hitting play are strongest. This both sends a second checker back—which is helpful for winning the game—and puts White on the bar which prevents her from attacking next roll. Leaving four blots is dangerous, but the odds are that White won't be able to take full advantage of them since she must use half of her roll to enter. Black will probably emerge with some anchor and a decent chance to win frontwards.

"When in doubt, hit" is a good motto. This position nicely illustrates the power of hitting. The alternatives only work on one aspect of Black's position and leaves White free to improve. Hitting both improves Black's position and cuts down on White's good rolls.  $\Delta$
