## michigan summer championships <br> TALBOT TRIUMPHS IN NOVI <br> Steve Mellen Wins Michigan Masters

TThe Michigan Summer Championships is one title that has eluded backgammon giant Frank Talbot . . . until this year. Two wins in a row vs. runner-up Bill Versaw (Pittsburgh) earned Frank the title, over $\$ 7,000$, and 31.11 points. That's enough to vault him into second on the 2004 American Backgammon Tour.

Flint Area director Carol Joy Cole's mega-event, held 1-4 July at the Sheraton Novi, is always one of the friendliest and best attended tournaments in the US. This year, 177 players competed in three divisions of play, highlighted by a huge 92 player Open field (with $100 \%$ return). The staff of John Carrico, Mary Ann Meese, Troy Longman, and Woody Woodworth executed their tasks flawlessly, and auctioneer Peter Kalba raised a record $\$ 20,000+$ in the Calcutta.

After losing to Bill Versaw in the undefeated bracket finals, Frank Talbot remained confident. Two wins later (vs. Joe Sylvester and Canadian Michel Merlitti), the experienced Frank had a second chance at Versaw, a rookie in the Open division. And even though Talbot would need two 13-point victories in a row, oddsmakers made him even-money to win the title.

The first match was a 13-0 cakewalk, including this 8 point swing in game four:

13 point finals (Match \#1). Frank Talbot (Black) leads Bill Versaw (White), 4-0. Black on shake. CUBE ACTION(S)?

Is Black too good to double here? Not good enough? And if cubed, can White possibly take?

When Frank doubled, nearly all of the spectators thought that Bill had a stone-cold drop. If fact Bill's take was clearly correct. Unfortunately, this is backgammon, and when Frank rolled home a recubed gammon, match \#1 was effectively over.

The rubber match went right down to
the wire. Trailing 4-5 and on shake, is Bill supposed to double here?:

13 point finals (Match \#2). Bill Versaw (White) trails Frank Talbot (Black), 4-5. White on shake. CUBE ACTION(S)?


Once again, the cube action of both players was perfect: double/easy take. This

## A MOTHER OF AN ERROR

Problem \#1 from Jake Jacob's "Mother Of All Quizzes" in the June Point has several errors:

1. The position itself is incorrect, as White's spares are on the 4 - and 3points, not the 5 - and 2-points. (The correct position is on the facing page as Pos. 10 in Nack Ballard's fine "Rumble At The Riv" article.)
2. Jake's answer of $9 / 3,8 / 3$ can't be correct as Black has no checkers on the 9 -point. Regardless, $9 / 3,8 / 3$ would indicate a roll of 6-5, not the 5-4 in the problem and in the actual match.
3. In Jake's answer he notes that ". . . if White's spares were on the 5- and 1point . . ." This can't be correct either, as a White spare on the 1-point would be a blot instead.
4. Regarding this position, Nack said that

## BEAR-IN TACTICS

Dear Danny: Perhaps you will be able to enlighten two new backgammon players. I was playing a five point match online against my friend Jim who lives in another state. Trailing 3-4 Crawford, I was bearing in for a potential gammon (and match) win when...

time, it was Versaw who won an important gammon to take an $8-5$ lead. But a rally by Talbot sent the fight to double matchpoint. In a complicated final game, Frank prevailed to win one of the trophies he had generously donated to the tournament.

The Michigan Masters fielded 32 players and paid $\$ 15,000$ in prize money. Steve Mellen (NY) and Perry Gartner (NJ) were the combatants in the finals.
Here's a swing position from the 13-point match with Steve Mellen (Black) trailing Perry Gartner (White) 4 to 5 and holding a 2 cube. Black is on roll. SHOULD BLACK RECUBE?

I played $11 / 5,8 / 4$ giving Jim a direct 5 shot. Sadly, Jim threw double 5 s , I danced, Jim picked up the second checker, I danced again, and Jim went on to win one of the sickest games I've ever been involved in.

After the match, Jim thought I should have simply cleared the 8 -point with $8 / 2$, $8 / 4$. He said that at least I wouldn't have lost any ground following the 5-5 shake, and picking up two checkers would have been impossible. It's true that when Jim hits, I can only hit back with any 5 and 2-3 ( 13 shots), so maybe I should have played safer. (Or perhaps 11/5, 9/5 might have worked better.)

Anyway, how would you have handled this position over the board.-Still Uncertain

Dear Still: Over the board, it's dollars to doughnuts that I would have cleared the 8 -point and made the 2-point, just as your friend Jim would. "Why leave a shot needlessly?" I would think . . . if we consider the few seconds we take for a roll like this over the board to be thought.

However, whether or not you get hit is virtually irrelevant in this position. Two other things are far more important.
(1) Joker control.
(2) Further wrecking of White's structure.

Any play that breaks the 8-point,
whether or not it leaves a shot, resurrects

White's killed 5 s , letting him spring a man on any 5 , and making his double- 5 s a joker.

So if you give the position more than cursory thought, you will look for a play that doesn't break the 8-point. 11/5, 9/5 is one such play, but it resurrects White's killed 6 s , letting him spring a man on any 6 , and making his double-6's a joker.

The other such play is $11 / 5,6 / 2$, the play favored by 1440 Snowie rollouts (3-ply, full). I admit that I wouldn't have found this play over the board . . except, perhaps, on Easter Sunday. 11/5, $6 / 2$ resurrects White's 5 s , but in a way that helps you, not White, for any 5 except 5-3 will require him to break his ace-anchor-his most valuable asset in a back game. After $11 / 5,6 / 2$, White's good rolls are 3 s , and his double- 3 s is a joker. However, the double3 s joker is not nearly as powerful as the double-5s or double-6s joker White will get if you break your 8-point or 9-point.

Thus there are two strong reasons to play the unorthodox $11 / 5,6 / 2$ : the joker you give White is less potent, and (more important), you force White to play 5 s destructively. - Yours, Danny $\Delta$

Mellen correctly rolled on taking two pieces off. Garner then tossed a 5-1.5/off is easy. But then Perry took almost two minutes determining that $6 / 5$ was superior to $3 / 2$ (by one roll). He could have saved brain cells by using Danny Kleinman's "Rule of 2.7." Space your last two checkers as close to 2.7 pips apart and you can never be wrong. In the actual case, Perry had to choose between checkers on the 5 - and 3 -points (2 pip spacing) and the 6- and 2-points (4 pip spacing). 2 is closer to 2.7 than it is to 4 and hence the correct choice.

With four checkers remaining, Steve recubed and Perry was forced to take. Steve took two off, but Perry came up one pip short rolling 4-3 to fall behind 8-5. Steve eventually won the match 13-9 for a \$10,000 payday.

It seems I made a mess last month in the "Mother of All Quizzes." I could claim that Bill goofed when he typeset it, or that someone mixed up my position cards. I could blame it on the poltergeist. (They come bundled with the rest of the software provided by Microsoft; how else to explain the performance of this operating system?) I could claim all that, but Mom wouldn't buy it. After I clean it up for you folks I have to go stand in the corner for an hour!

Consider these two positions . . .
Error Position 1. Black trails White 8-13 to 23. BLACK TO PLAY 5-4.


Correct Position 1. Black trails White 8-13 to 23. BLACK TO PLAY 5-4.


Error Position 1 (on the top) is as it appeared in my quiz, while Correct Position 1 (on the bottom) is the position as it should have appeared. In my "Answers," the recommended move should have been $8 / 3,7 / 3$ (rather than the impossible $9 / 3$, $8 / 3$ ). $8 / 3,7 / 3$ is correct if White's spares are on the 4- and 3-point; the "duplication" I refer to in my answer now exists. To make matters more confusing in my explanation, I referred to the difference if White's spare were on the " 5 - and 1-point," when I meant the "5- and 2-point." What, Mom? Another hour in the corner? Sigh! Okay.

The concepts of duplication and diversification are dear to the hearts of all players who have read Magriel's book. They are also mostly misapplied. Kibitz any intermediate players' chouette and you'll hear plenty of blithering about how the Captain should be duplicating on this roll or diversifying on that, when some other fundamental principle such as running, pointing, or hitting clearly applies. Which makes the pair above a bit of a curiosity.

If Black uses his 5-4 to make the deuce, he hits a White blot which usually trumps other considerations such as keeping his points part of the same potential six-prime (by making the 3-point instead). But making the 3 -point is a blunder when White's spares are on the 5 and 2 . White's numbers would be diversified allowing him to step up with deuces and 3 s , and hit loose with

1 s and 4 s . Pointing duplicates White's entering 4 s and 1 s , and is thus correct. And when White's spares are on the 4 and 3 , making the 3-point becomes correct, as it neatly duplicates White's numbers: 2 s and 3 s to hit, 2 s and 3 s to step up, whereas pointing would partly diversify them, duplicating only White's entering 3 , and diversifying White's entering 4.-Jake Jacobs $\Delta$

## BOOT' CANP: ENLIST!



Walter Trice's New Book Reviewed By Neil Kazaross

BACKGAMMON BOOT CAMP by Walter Trice. 339 pages. Published by The Fortuitous Press, San Francisco. Copyright 2004 by Walter Trice. Soft Cover bound. Available from The Backgammon Boutique (810/232-9731). Price \$40 + \$4 shipping (\$9 overseas).
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Backgammon Boot Camp is a new book written by Walter Trice and published by The Fortuitous Press of San Francisco (www.fortuitouspress.com). Walter needs no introductions, but for those of you who haven't had the pleasure of meeting him, this New Englander is one of the best players in the world. He is consistently top-rated on GamesGrid and has amassed a fine total in ABT tournaments considering the number of events he has competed in. If you want a real challenge, play some "Nackgammon" with Walter. I consider him one of the top three Nack players in the world.

One would expect a very fine player like Walter to produce a very fine book. After reading Backgammon Boot Camp, I must state that my expectations are fulfilled. From a standpoint of sturdiness, the book is very well constructed. Most backgammon books get a lot of wear and tear. If the binding is poor and the paper thin, the book will be a mess after a couple of years. This is not the case with Backgammon Boot Camp. Additionally, the page layout makes for an "easy-on-the-eyes" read. I'm impressed with the quality of Jeremy Bagai's Fortuitous Press products and hope they continue to publish backgammon books.

While not a book intended to thrill experts, $B B C$ certainly is not a book solely
for beginners, either. As I understand it, the book is mostly composed of well organized problem columns from his "Beginner's Boot Camp" series online at www.gammonvillage.com. But don't let the name fool you. The series contains plenty of info for intermediate and advanced players alike.

The 339 page book starts out with a "Basic Training" section. Beginners will get a very good, easy-to-read, easy-to-understand introduction to many of the principles and other things they should think about during a game. Stronger players will find the "Basic Training" section to be a useful review, and I'll bet that championship level competitors will err on a problem or two in this section.

After 74 pages, "Basic Training" is finished and "Advanced Training" begins. Fortunately from the expert's standpoint, this material comprises most of this book. Here, the best players will find some challenging positions with lucid explanations. The titles of the major advanced chapters are:
"Advanced Training,"
"Cubes and Races,"
"Cubes and Contact,"
"Backgames,"
"Primes,"
"Attacking Play,"
"Match Play," and
"Graduation."
Each chapter contains several subchapters discussing various important concepts pertaining to the main theme. The chapter on cubes and races is very good as is the chapter on attacking play. The chapter on backgames is superb and nearly worth the price of the book.

Writing about backgammon while maintaining the attention of a large variety of readers from casual player to expert is not easy. However, I was quite entertained by this book, in part due to Trice's writing style, which includes just enough humor for a long backgammon book. Very inter-
esting are the times when he refers to the errors intermediates are likely to make, or to some badly mistaken beliefs from backgammon's PB (pre-bot) past.

With this book, Walter Trice has assured his position among backgammon's finest authors. Nearly everything he states about a BG position is "Snowie" rolled out with the results included. I'd like to have seen details concerning the lengths and strengths of these rollouts, but this is a minor point as I trust that there are no significant errors in the rollout conclusions. Nonetheless, this is a factor in my only giving the book a grade of A- (I also wanted a few more pages on backgames). But this is still an excellent rating from a tough grader.

In closing, I'll post a position from the "Graduation" chapter where Walter shows a blunder he made:

Money game. BLACK TO PLAY 6-3.


In this nice chapter, Trice correctly states that many errors stem from a lack of alertness rather than a lack of knowledge (especially at the expert level). In this position $14 / 8,9 / 6$ is the clear play but I'll bet many will misplay it. Walter chose $15 / 9$, $13 / 10$ and he provides a fine explanation of why that is wrong and why $14 / 8,9 / 6$ is clear.

Bottom Line: Buy this book; it is well worth \$40! - Neil Kazaross $\Delta$

Match to 7 points. Black trails White 4 to 6. BLACK TO PLAY 6-1.


If getting gammoned hurt Black, he could think about the non-hitting play of 10/9, $9 / 3$. This would leave only one blot for White to pick up. It would still be a pretty weak play, since it leaves more shots than the other candidates and fails to put White on the bar in a position where White could still win the race. With gammons only helping Black, this play is not a serious contender.

The other candidates involve playing

10/4*. There are four possible aces. 10/9 leaves 15 shots (all 4s, 3-1, and 3-6). The others leave 13 shots ( $5 / 4$ leaves all 5 s and 3-2, 4-3 leaves all 3 s and 4-6, and 2-1 leaves all 4 s and 3-1). That doesn't mean we can eliminate $10 / 9$, but two extra immediate shot numbers is a pretty big strike against the play. The future cleanup would have to be considerably superior to the other plays to justify leaving those two extra shot numbers in a position where getting hit is virtually all that matters.
$4 / 3$ has the advantage that on seven of White's non-hitting numbers, she will be forced to enter behind the inner board blot. That won't be a claim for Black, but he will be better off. However, even if that happens, Black will still be leaving a shot on 6-6, 6-5, and 2-1. These are fewer shots than will be left in other variations, so if the choice is close when White flunks, this may be the deciding factor.

The most common relevant variation occurs when White flunks. The question then is how many rolls permit Black to get safe. There is no shortcut answer to this. It is simply a matter of counting. We will look only at direct shots since they are the big ones. If it turns out to be close, we can examine indirect shots.

After 10/9, Black leaves a shot if he rolls 6-6 (a triple shot), 6-5, 6-4, 6-3, 6-2, $6-1,5-5,5-4$, and $5-3$. Since this play also leaves two extra immediate shots, it is now clear we can eliminate it.

After 5/4, Black leaves a shot if he rolls 6-2, 5-5, and 5-3. Remarkably enough, that is all. That's pretty good. The key is that by switching to the 4 -point, Black gives himself a safe landing place for a 6 .

After 4/3, Black leaves a shot on 6-6 (a triple shot), 6-5, 6-4, 6-3, 6-2, 6-1, 5-5, 5-4, and 4-4. Clearly all these shots more than make up for the better position if White enters without hitting.

After 2-1, Black leaves a shot on 6-6, $6-5,6-4,6-3$, and 5-5. Not quite as good as the shifting play. In addition, the shifting play makes a lower point, so future clearing will be easier. For example, suppose White enters with a 3 and Black brings everybody home and clears the 6 -point. It will now be a safer position than if Black had played $2 / 1$, since the 4 -point will be easier to clear safely than the 5-point.
$10 / 4^{*}, 5 / 4$ wins hands down. This really shouldn't come as a surprise. It is thematic when breaking down one's board to fill in the lower points and avoid leaving gaps on these lower points. That, plus an immediate landing place for a 6 , likely Black's worst number, makes it clear that this is the best play.

Running through these calculations isn't difficult. The key is to see the shifting play in the first place. It has been built into our thinking that once we have a good point we maintain it, and this bias often causes us to overlook profitable shifting plays such as in this position.-Kit Woolsey $\Delta$
