BG MASTERS PULLS THE PLUG Fails to honor signed contracts Four ABT events effected

BackgammonMasters.com has pulled out of US Backgammon sponsorship breaking legally signed contracts in the process. The California Open (Dec. 1–3), Carolina Invitational (Jan. 12–14), Pittsburgh Championships (Feb. 16–18), and Southeast Championships (May 4–6) were all advertising 100% return and/or added moneys in their invitations. All of the events have canceled their advertised added monies and issued a public apology for the reversal. Backgammon Masters spokesman Giora Tal was twice offered the opportunity to comment on the abrupt action, but did not respond.

In an e-mail sent to California Open registrants just five days prior to his 1–3 December event, director Patrick Gibson wrote:

"I just received some BAD NEWS.
BackgammonMasters.com has gotten legal advice regarding their participation in the USA marketplace. They have withdrawn (canceled) all contracts with the USA-based backgammon tournaments and will NOT have a presence at these events . . ."

The new US Internet gaming law will not be enforced until later in 2007. Additionally, BGM is presently doing nothing to stop US players from participating at their site other than posting the following disclaimer:

"Backgammon is a skill game. In some countries and regions, online skill games for money are not allowed. We recommend you check with your local authorities before you play. If skill-gaming is not legal in your region, we will not be held responsible for any damages you incur. We urge you to verify the legality in your region or country before you make your first deposit."

Nevada Backgammon Association director Howard Markowitz was the initial contact for Backgammon Masters. Although not employed with the company, Markowitz brokered the initial deals between BGM and the tournament directors in Chicago, Wisconsin, Florida, Indiana, Pittsburgh, Charlotte, and Atlanta. When asked to comment on the US pullout, Markowitz cited the new US Internet gaming law and what Backgammon Masters perceived to be a lack dedication on the part of some directors regarding their promotion of the company.

But Markowitz did not consider that a valid excuse for BGM's actions stating for the record, "I found the fact that they broke contracts appalling."

Roz Ferris (IL) was the North American Representative for BGM. After relaying the bad news to the effected directors in late November, her employment was terminated. When asked to comment on the entire situation, Ferris said, "I consider the whole thing a farce."

The following attendance chart could be the real reason for BGM's quick exit. It shows that with the exception of the Indiana Open (Butch & Mary Ann Messe's farewell tournament as directors), Backgammon Masters' added money in 2006 was of no value with regard to increasing player attendance when compared to 2005:

The late Michael Maxakuli, former publisher of the *Las Vegas Backgammon Magazine*, had a negative impression of BGM following the April Nevada State Championships—their first sponsored event. In June 2006, Maxakuli wrote CHICAGO POINT suggesting a tongue-in-cheek exposé on the promoters and their playsite:

"Why don't you let your readers know who and what Backgammon Masters are? Let me suggest two headlines for you: 'Backgammon Etiquette: The Correct Way to Pass Out Baseball Caps'. Or possibly 'Backgammon Virtual Reality: Graphics Are Enough.'" Δ

MICHAEL MAXAKULI 11/14/1944-12/11/2006

A backgammon icon since the 70s

Michael "Max" Maxakuli, backgammon publisher, club director, and expert player is dead. He was 62.

Born in Albania, Max grew up in Windsor, Canada before his family moved to Milwaukee, Wisconsin. There he attended high school and some college at the University of Wisconsin (Milwaukee). He later owned a nightclub while working as an entertainment promoter. But in the early 1970s, Max craved a larger stage and moved to Las Vegas just prior to the back-



gammon boom. Soon, he was directing the Las Vegas Backgammon Club which met on the strip at Dirty Sally's Discotheque.

Maxakuli began printing the Las Vegas Backgammon Club Newsletter in 1974. The publication went to magazine size in March 1978 and by September 1978, the issue was full glossy with a new name: Las Vegas Backgammon

Magazine. In 1980, worldwide circulation was stated as 20,000. Maxakuli remained the sole publisher until December 1980






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PLAYING ACCORDING TO THE SCORE

Dear Danny: I have only been playing backgammon for about 8 months and have a question regarding a specific position:

5 point match. BLACK TO PLAY 6-2.



Match score considerations are what I find confusing regarding this position. In a match to 5 points, how would you move at the following scores?

- (A) Black and White are tied at 1 to 1. White holds the cube at 2.
- (B) Black leads White 4–0, Crawford.
- **(C)** Black and White are tied at 2–2. The cube is in the center.

I am unable to determine the reasons for making a particular move at these scores. Is there something specific I should be looking for?—Puzzled by the Score

DEAR **P**UZZLED: Yes, there is something you should be looking for: the cost of gammons at each score, as well as your prospects after each of the two plausible plays.

9/3, 6/4* minimizes shots, as only direct 4s hit, but leaves an extra blot. If White rolls a 4, she will have excellent chances to pick up a second blot and win a gammon. About one-third of White's hits figure to result in gammons.

9/3, 9/7 minimizes blots, and creates a nearly gammonless position, but leaves two extra shots, as both direct 3s and 2-1 hit. Each play leaves about the same future shot jeopardy. 9/3, 6/4* risks a blot on three rolls next, 6-4 and 6-6, but only if White dances (16 rolls). 9/3, 9/7 risks a blot

on only two rolls next, 5-5 and 6-6, but it incurs this risk on all of White's 23 missing rolls except 6-6. Note, however, that 6-6 is a good roll for White if she has not been hit: she will bring her two outfield men home and her back man to the outfield, giving her significant racing chances. However, if White is on the bar, her 6-6, like other dancing rolls, will give you a small gammon threat, as you are a favorite to cover the 4-point and make a five point board.

If gammons were cost-free, as at double match-point, it would be clear to minimize shots. But now let's take the score into account:

(A) With White owning the cube at 2, gammons weigh heavily, as they win the match outright without any wasted points. Of the 11 games in which White hits after 9/3, 6/4*, she will win slightly less than four gammons (let's assume four). However, of the 16 games in which White dances, you will win slightly less than two gammons (let's assume two).

So 9/3, 9/7 saves you a *net* of about two gammons in 36 games, but gives White two more game-winning shots. Although gammons weigh heavily at this score, *game-swings* still outweigh them. Although it is close, you should give the nod to 9/3, 6/4*.

(B) At Crawford-even, gammons cost very little. Your opponent's goal is to get to the next higher *odd* number of points, so it hardly hurts at all for you to be gammoned and lead 4-2 instead of 4-1 post-Crawford.

At this score, it is not even close: minimize shots, 9/3, 6/4*, to maximize your chances of winning the game and the match.

(C) When each side needs three points for the match and the cube is unturned, gammons weigh heavily, though not so heavily as when they win the match outright, for they bring the winner to the Crawford game, where he is about a 75% favorite to win the match, instead of providing only a 3-2 lead that makes him no more than a 60% favorite to win the match.

If the cube were frozen at 1, then 9/3, 6/4* would be better than 9/3, 9/7 by a slightly greater margin than in (A). But the cube is alive, leading me to wonder: why didn't you cash with the cube before rolling? Now you must consider the cube actions of each player. You will cash if White doesn't hit, so the small gammon chance you obtain by hitting means nothing. If White hits, she can cash, but if you have a second blot, her gammon threat is so good that she should play on for a gammon, keeping the cube in reserve in case she incurs future jeopardy. Now the nearly four games in which White wins gammons after you play 9/3, 6/4* slightly outweigh your two extra wins, so 9/3, 9/7 is slightly better than 9/3, 6/4*.—Yours, Danny Δ

Richard Munitz of Suffren, New York has won the American Backgammon Tour points race for 2006. His 58.56 total points were earned in five events across the United States:

Pittsburgh Championships (PA): Semifinalist Michigan Summer Championships: 1st Thousand Islands Tournament (NY): 1st Georgia Championships: 1st California State: Consolation Semifinalist

Only after prevailing in Michigan did Munitz believe that his winning the Tour was within the realm of possibility. His two additional victories in New York, and Georgia equals Neil Kazaross's "hat trick" accomplished in 1995.

Prior to 2006, Richard had only a scattering of points in 1998, 2001, and 2002. Now his 72.58 total ranks him 24th on the ABT all-time listings. Commenting on his 2006 performance, Munitz said, "It was one heck of a

year. I enjoyed the competition right up the the last tournament."

Second place goes to Gregg Cattanach of Doraville, Georgia. Cattanach earned a respectable 49.62 points—enough to win the Tour in many previous years. Gregg placed in four events including wins at the Midwest Championships and the Florida State. His steady play over the past four years has resulted in an ABT ranking of 10th all-time.

The third place finisher with 47.40 points, Ken Fischer of Oxnard, California, also won three events in 2006: Carolina, Ohio and California. Ken's final victory at the California State Championship in December moved him from sixth place into a trophy position. In 13 previous seasons, Fischer had played in only a few events gathering 1.50 points. [Check out the final 2006 ABT standings on page 3.—Ed.]

All three finishers will receive their first-ever marble ABT trophies at the upcoming Pittsburgh Championships during the Calcutta Auction on 17 February. Δ

CHICAGO OPEN CANCELLED

Joann Feinstein retires as Director Las Vegas takes Memorial Day weekend



Joann Feinstein has officially announced her retirement from directing The Chicago Open. The event, first held in 1980, is officially cancelled for 2007. Chicago Open co-director Howard

Markowitz stated: "I wasn't so willing to continue Chicago on my own. We discussed running the event with a couple of other people. They weren't ready to do it so soon, and Joann unequivocally said she was done." Mr. Markowitz will retain the Memorial Day weekend for his Nevada State Championship which will be held 23–27 May 2007 at the Riviera Hotel in Las Vegas.

Ms. Feinstein's first effort at staffing a major tournament came at the 2nd Chicago Open in 1981. She co-directed the same event with Mr. Markowitz beginning in 1989 until 2006. In 1991 she and Howard formed the Prime Backgammon Club of Chicago (the club remained active for over four years). That same year, she also began serving as a staff member of the Nevada Backgammon Association tournaments and will continue working NBA events in 2007.

A successful player ranked 10th all-time in Chicagoland and 117th all-time in the ABT, Ms. Feinstein will continue to play in a limited number of events annually. Δ

when he partnered with financier Joel Rettew. His girlfriend Linda Kruegel (also from Milwaukee) was the editor in charge of layout and design.

Beginning in late 1978, Maxakuli used the LVBM to network backgammon clubs throughout the world. By 1982 his "American Association of Backgammon Clubs" had attained a zenith of 80 associate clubs in 30 states and six countries making him a very powerful figure.

LVBM continued regular publication until the Spring of 1982 with numerous

celebrities of the era gracing the cover playing backgammon such as Charlie Callas, Connie Stevens, Tina Turner, Liberace. James Daren, and Don Adams.

1981 was the best

backgammon year of Michael Maxakuli's life. His magazine was riding high, he was in a close relationship with Linda, and he won over \$100,000 in three major tournaments (Turnberry Isle runner-up, Desert Inn Invitational winner, Las Vegas Holiday winner). At the conclusion of the year, Les Levi wrote this about Maxakuli in the Backgammon Times newspaper:

"Animated and articulate, Max has a good many opinions on a good many subjects and throughout, he engages in the unusual habit of punctuating sentences with a squirt of green breath mint. Once in a while, he pulls a long, thin cigar out of a tin container stuck in his boot. He seems bent on winning, although he is reluctant to be optimistic."

But things started to unravel for Max

in 1982. His magazine lost financing and ended publication in Spring 1982, his girlfriend left him, and he was abusing alcohol and drugs leading to an eventual run-in with the law.

But Max came back and continued to make his mark on the backgammon scene winning the Las Vegas Open in 1996. And in April 2006, he won the \$1000 Limited Jackpot event at the Nevada State Championship. In 2002, Maxakuli collaborated with chicagopoint.com to post a number of his old photographs from backgammon's golden age. (They are permanently posted at www.chicagopoint.com/maxpix.html) Additionally, he remained the figurehead of the current Las Vegas Backgammon Club until his passing.

Max's last tournament appearance was at the Las Vegas Open in November 2006. Flint BackgammoNews editor Carol Joy Cole commented that he seemed quite energetic. "We knew he wasn't in the best of health, but this happened sooner than I expected."

In fact, Max had not been doing so well for a few weeks. When Las Vegas Club player Dick McCall (who had been in close touch) couldn't get a hold of him for a couple of days the second week of December, he went over to Maxakuli's apartment and had the building manager use a pass key to enter the premises. Max had died on his couch with the television still playing.

Michael Maxakuli is survived by two sisters, Vivian Yanko and Barbara Maxwell. The backgammon world will long remember Max who made incredible contributions to our game. His colorful personality will definitely be missed.—Bill Davis Δ

PROBLEM #323 ANALYZED

by Mary Hickey

5-point match. Black leads White 4 to 2. **BLACK TO PLAY 4-3.**



Black has many choices here, but the basic problem is one as old as our game's precursors played in ancient Mesopotamia: Hit or not?

If Black doesn't hit, whether the game is for money or at this "Gammon Save" match score, he should play the simple 14/7. Making the 2- or 10-point has no relevance to his game plan and leaves a double shot for far too little reason. If he does hit, 13/10*, 14/11 stands out because it keeps Black's distribution diverse while leaving White the fewest return shots from the bar. The rest of this discussion will concern only these two top contenders in their class.

For money, owning the cube could incline you toward caution, and an effort to creep up to a powerful and efficient recube later. The problem with that approach is that the opponent is well set up to make her bar point right now, expanding her block to a solid five points. If she fails to do that, she may connect her two backward men with 6-2 or 5-3, or run the man on her 16-point around into position as a builder for next time.

Meanwhile, you too are threatening to build a five point block, but if you don't succeed quickly, you may lose the priming battle. You are at a bit of a disadvantage there, because your existing block is "front-loaded." This puts you under more pressure to build your next point in line quickly, since you can't just play around with your rolls that fail to do anything. If your builders were farther back, your big rolls (the worst for priming battles) would make points at the front of your block, while small rolls would allow you to shift

your builders around without compromising your existing structure.

These problems with the gradual approach are sufficient to make the hitting play correct for money. A 3-ply Snowie 3 rollout using the strongest settings shows a 0.056 advantage (0.042 cubeless) for the hit, which wins both more games and gammons; but as might be expected, loses more gammons, also.

With a money advantage that small, and with gammons both ways a significant factor, we need to ask if the advantage perhaps changes to the quieter play at the actual match score. Having Snowie adjust the results of the money rollout to the actual score produces a whopping 0.118 advantage for 14/7, but that doesn't take into account that both players will play various later moves differently because of the lopsided value of gammons to each of them at this score. To allow for these differences in play as best the bot is able to discern them, I ran a 3-ply "according to score" rollout at the same strong settings as the money rollout.

A comparison of the two profiles for the 14/7 play, at score and for money, suggests that White does a good job taking appropriate risks for added gammons at the match score. She gets 0.7% more gammons in exchange for 0.5% losses. After the hitting play, the profiles suggest that at the score, Black pulls in his horns on the attack a

little sooner than he did for money, since he wins 0.5% fewer (meaningless) gammons and loses 0.1% fewer match-losing gammons. He also manages to pull off 0.1% more wins, which typically isn't the case at a score where he must play cautiously.

Why do the profiles suggest that after the quiet play, White succeeds better than Black at achieving her objectives at the score; but after the hitting play, it is Black who performs better at "play according to score"? I believe it is because after the quiet play, White has the initiative, but after the hitting play, Black does. You can't pursue your objectives or formulate winning game plans when most of your moves are either forced or nearly forced. This factor is large enough to eat up almost all of the 0.118 difference we would see favoring 14/7 at the score if it were played exactly the same as for money by both sides. What remains, according to the rollout, is a pull of only 0.016 toward 14/7 at the score.

You can disagree with this result, since future bots that play better at various scores (and for money, too, for that matter) may very well reverse it. What we can take away from this problem is the importance of the initiative in score-based play. A play that concedes the initiative to your opponent may still be correct, as it appears may be the case here, but when in doubt it's best to keep both your hands on the wheel.— $Mary\ Hickey\ \Delta$
