TIM MABEE WINS IN WIS. Steve Brown loses 3 finals

Pub Club director Tim Mabee (IL) rallied against Steve Brown to win the 2008 Wisconsin State Championships. A small but enthusiastic crowd of 76 players traveled to the Radison Hotel in Madison to partake in the annual Labor Day modified Swiss tournament—down from 103 in 2007. Tom Machaj directed the tournament, ably assisted by other Madison club members.




Tim Mabee (L) receives the Champion's trophy from Tom Machaj. That's runner-up Steve Brown on the right.

The 9-round swiss format ended with Steve Brown undefeated. Tim's record was 7–2. This put Steve in the finals and had the two other 7–2 qualifiers, Matt Cohn-Geier (CA) and Neil Kazaross (IL), battling to determine Steve's opponent. Tim won a bye, then defeated Matt in the semifinals to gain a shot at the Minnesota expert.

Steve Brown won every match he entered during the first three days of the event. He was a finalist with Jesse Eaton in the Doubles; he reached the final three of the Badger Classic Masters, and went 9–0 in the main tournament. But Monday defeats in the Doubles (to Chicagoans Joann Feinstein & Herb Roman) and Masters (to Neil Kazaross) brought him down to earth.

The 13-point finals began as a runaway for Steve. After five games, he was ahead 6–0. Then Tim got his game into high gear tying the match at 8-all. In the next game, Tim won a doubled game to take a 10–8 lead. But he got very careless in the next game: 13-point Wis. finals. Tim Mabee (Black) leads Steve Brown (White), 10 to 8. White on roll. **CUBE ACTION(S)?**



Steve doubled and Tim (trailing only 113 to 106) miscounted the position and dropped. According to 720 3-ply, precise Snowie rollouts, the position is not even a double. Steve is only seven pips ahead in the race with worse inner board checker distribution than his opponent.

But this was destined to be Tim Mabee's match. Bearing in for the double match-point win, Tim left a 6-5 flyshot which Steve hit to flip the game around. But five rolls later, Tim tossed a gamechanging 6-5 of his own to seal the deal.

Julius High (NY) recorded the final game and although a Snowie analysis of that game shows that Steve outplayed Tim (3.28–*World Class* to 6.97–*Advanced*), Tim prevailed to win over \$4,000 and the state title. Congratulations to Tim Mabee on the first ABT victory of his life.

Mike Corbett showed why he is a "Giant of Backgammon" by defeating fellow Floridian Steve Flam in the 2008 Florida State Championship finals. Director Elayne Feinstein welcomed 105 main tourney entrants to her 10th annual affair held at the Marriott North Hotel in Ft. Lauderdale.




2008 Florida State Champ Mike Corbett (right) with runner-up Steve Flam.

Following a big win over ABT leader Neil Kazaross in the semifinals, Corbett faced Steve Flam, a fine player in his own right. Flam, a 1999 Florida finalist, defeated Chicagoan Phil Simborg in the semifinals to advance to the finals.

After 15 games and five lead changes, the 11-point match was knotted at 8-all. Steve, on shake, applied severe pressure on BG Giant #27 with a double in this position:





Dear Danny: My partner and I recently played in an ABT doubles event. Although I generally get along with him, he does like to contradict me, especially in pressure situations. We faced such a position in our most recent tournament match:

7-point match. Black trails White 3 to 5. **BLACK TO PLAY 4-1.**



I wanted to simply hit the second checker (23/18*). My partner preferred

another strategy: 7/2, building a fourth point. Because gammons would win the match for us, I ended up making my hitting play and what happens? Our opponents roll 2-2 anchoring and making their 4-point. (Of course, 2-2 dances if I had listened to my partner.) Needless to say, we couldn't bring the position home and I haven't stopped hearing from my partner for a month.

What do you think, Danny. Was I wrong to pick up the second piece while I had the chance, or is building the 2-point a better move at this score?—*Taking heat*

DEAR HEAT: Seeking backgammon wisdom many years ago, I trekked to a place that is very cold, a remote slope in the Himalayas where I found the reclusive guru Maharishi Mahesh Daniel. The Maharishi whispered a mantra to me that has served me well ever since. May I repeat it to you, as I do to my shadow fifty times each morning?

Destroy Valuable Enemy Slots.

What has my mantra to do with your backgammon position?

Having made your 1-point, you will be at a disadvantage in a positional game. However, you have a tremendous advantage in the game you have embarked upon, a *blitz*. In other kinds of games, the quality of the points you have made is paramount,

but in a blitz, the number of inside points prevails. A wonderful match-winning gammon looms if you can continue the blitz successfully.

What can end the blitz and convert the game to a positional battle? An anchor for your opponent. In the current position, White threatens to make an anchor: the golden anchor on your 5-point. Stop him! His blot on your 5-point "slots" that anchor, and is as valuable in this position as a slot on his own 5-point is in other kinds of positions. That, not the relatively unimportant slot on his bar-point, is the slot you must destroy.

Although better rolls were possible, your actual 4-1 lets you accomplish this priority while keeping a three point board and leaving only one inside blot of your own. Hit 6/5* with the ace, destroying the slot, keeping your opponent dancing, and creating three inside blots only temporarily, then move 6/2 with the 4, consolidating two of these blots into a third inside point. Sending a third man back can wait, and so can making a fourth inside point.

HEDGING & SETTLEMENTS

A t a recent tournament, I overheard two of my friends (let's call them Bob and Jim) talking before commencing play in the finals of the Seniors event. Bob said, "Let's play the match with the winner getting 60% and the loser 40%."

Jim replied, "Fine by me."

I looked at the prize structure and saw that the winner was supposed to receive \$950 with second place getting \$450. Now, I can do the 60/40 calculation in my head. The total of \$950 and \$450 is \$1400. Dividing that by 5 makes each one-fifth (or 20%) worth \$280. So the winner after the hedge gets $$280 \times 3 = 840 and the loser gets $$280 \times 2 = 560 . This changes the prize return of each player by a measly \$110—negligible compared to the amount of time and effort expended to reach the finals.

Now, I know these guys. One is a multimillionaire and the other is by no means financially strapped. When I was in a similar situation, instead of hedging, I said, "Let's bet an additional \$100 on the side."

So, why did Bob and Jim make the hedge?


My answer is that it is a ritual, just like the dance football players do after scoring a touchdown. We humans love ritual. Religions and governments all have theirs. It's part of our culture.

I can understand hedging when the the prize money is extremely large with a huge swing between the first and second place payout. And when the players are in desperate need of the money, hedging makes sense. But when the amount of money is basically insignificant to their lives, then I think the players are just strutting their stuff; running at each other and banging bellies in celebration of getting into the finals.

This is okay as long as they realize what they are doing and no feelings are hurt, but when done in the manner of ruffling feathers or trying to gain a degree of psychological superiority, it is one of my BG peeves.—Larry Liebster Δ



After a couple of minutes, Mike dropped the double against his weaker opponent. Against equal competition, a Snowie 3-ply analysis shows his decision to be a near blunder, but following a 720 full rollout, the error drops to a mere .035—a loss of only 0.33% match equity.

"I figured my match chances were better trailing 8–9 because my opponent could still make cube errors at this complicated score," explained Mike.

It was an excellent decision for the author of *Backgammon Problems*. Following the next game, Mike was ahead 10–9 Crawford and rolling this position home when:

What's your play here? A quick 3-ply Snowie analysis prefers 14/2, 13/7, 8/2.

Instead, Corbett played Snowie's third choice: 13/1, 14/2. In any event, Mike was able to roll the position home and claim his third Florida State title in the 10 year history of the event.

After the match, not one person in the playing room would have made Mike's play. But a 1440 3-ply, precise rollout shows his move to be correct! These are the exact type of positions that Mike Corbett likes to feature in his lectures: maintain your prime and give White the chance to crash his home board. Well done Mr. Corbett!



match, Ray ran calculations in his head and decided that he would have slightly the best of it if he offered to split the prize money. Alan pondered the offer and eventually accepted the deal. Ray rolled a 2 to hit Alan's blot, and proceeded to bring the game home to claim the title.

In fact, Ray's settlement is incredible in its accuracy. A 1440 game 3-ply, precise full Snowie rollout shows that Ray wins 40.5% of these games and loses 59.5% of which 30.7% are match-ending gammons or backgammons. The Snowie rollout shows:

Ray wins the match 40.5%. He can also win when Alan wins a plain game (59.5% - 30.7% = 28.8%) and Ray goes on to win from a 9–10 Crawford deficit 30% of the time. Doing the math:

40.5 + (28.8 x .30) = 49.14%

Therefore Ray has slightly the worst of the position and made an incredibly accurate settlement. It's true that Ray would have a slight skill advantage in the remainder of the match; but it's also true that only Ray can misplay the current game as Alan's moves are all forced.



I don't care for the loose hit. Black doesn't really need it. He is short on ammunition, and giving up the barpoint here could be quite serious. If White hits back, Black will be scrambling to recover. If White doesn't hit back, Black will have to roll well to cover the blot on the 3-point. And even if that happens, Black doesn't have any ammunition in place to complete a closeout, so White will probably wind up with an acepoint game. Since White's winning chances from the acepoint are about as good as his winning chances from the 3-point, Black will not have gained much. The theme here is to not give up what you have when you are short on ammunition. If one or two of the checkers on the midpoint were in range of the 3-point, it might be another story.

13/9 is a productive play. If White flunks or enters with an ace and Black rolls a 6, he can afford to hit loose on the

3-point, since he retains the important barpoint. Also, if Black rolls a 4 he can just make the 9-point. Still, the play has its flaws. White might roll 1-6 or 3-6 from the bar, and Black definitely does not want a second checker back. Also, this play leaves the back checker stranded, and Black doesn't want to do that.

24/20 follows the "bring them around and win" game plan. This is an excellent time to try to extricate the back checker with White on the bar. Black will probably be conceding White some anchor, but that isn't a big deal with gammons not counting. Black will probably be able to continue running the back checker next turn, and once that is accomplished it should be smooth sailing. I believe this is the play which is consistent with the position and what Black's main game plan should be.

It is easy to take one's eye off the ball in this type of position. The key is to determine what is most important for Black, and what he can definitely accomplish. Winning the fight for the 3-point would be nice, but that might not happen and Black would still have the problem of extricating the back checker. Black knows he wants to run his straggler, and he has rolled a convenient number to do so. Therefore, that is what he should do.—*Kit Woolsey* Δ
