# 1960s THEMED 2009 MBC CHAMPION IS HIGH

Steve Sax bags his 2nd Beaver

The 2009 Midwest Backgammon Championships let its hair down in celebration of the 1960s and the winner was High: New Yorker Julius High who captured the Championship title. The 26th annual charity event, directed by Bill Davis, was held 20–22 March at the Wyndham Lisle in Illinois with 180 players in attendance. \$4500 was raised for the Anti-Cruelty Society.




Champ winner Julius High (L) pictured with director Bill Davis and Advanced winner Brandon Macklin.

Last year, Julius High became serious about the game, recording and studying all of his matches. Recently, he flew out to California to study the finer points of tournament play with the ABT's #2 all-time player: Ray Fogerlund. Apparently, the lessons were money well spent as Julius rolled over Gerry Tansey (MO), Petko Kostadinov (SC), Stick Rice (OH), Lucky Nelson (IL) and Rod Covlin (NY) before facing Adam Bennett (WI) in the finals. Adam, another up-and-comer defeated a tough lineup of players as well: Chuck Bower (IN), Phil Simborg (IL), Fred Kalantari (MN), Greg Merriman (MI), and Steve Sax (CA).

The 15-point finals commenced Sunday at 3:00 p.m. Both players were newcomers to a Championship final table, but didn't appear overly nervous. An interesting sequence developed in the second game with Julius leading 1–0. According to Snowie, Julius had just missed five doubling opportunities prior to this position where his double is clear. Do you take this?


MBC 15-point finals. Julius High (Black) leads Adam Bennett (White) 1–0. Black doubles. **SHOULD WHITE TAKE?** 



Adam counted the position and found himself trailing 72 to 62 in the pip count. He dropped which according to Snowie rollouts, is a .80 error. Adam can still win this position 24% of the time. (That's plenty with cube possession.) In addition to the race, White benefits from six rolls that leave immediate shots (6-1, 6-3, 5-5, 6-6) and eight additional rolls where Black will not hit, nor will he bring in any checkers from his 8-point (4-1, 5-1, 3-4, 3-5).

The key doubling position occurred with the match tied at 4 to 4:

Trying to make something happen, Adam doubled here and Julius took. A quick 3-ply analysis shows the cube to be a 0.056 error, but a long rollout reduces the

Mary bested Stick Rice (OH) in the undefeated bracket of the double elimination event. Canadian Neil Garvie then edged Stick to gain a shot at Mary in the finals. The opening 11-point match was close, but at 8-all, Mary took charge and captured her first Ohio State title in the 11 year history of the event.

In the 16-player Masters event, Neil Kazaross (IL) topped Mary Hickey in the semifinals, and then "a-Neil-ated" up-and-comer Rod Covlin (NY) in the finals to add another trophy to his overcrowded case.  $\Delta$

your premature roll, he was going to cube you but you rolled so quickly that he didn't have time to stop you.

What is your decision and why?—Michael Crane, Director, British Isles Backgammon Association

This would have been a tougher ruling if your opponent had no legal moves (e.g. was still closed out on the bar). But when the player rolls completely out of turn, he must suffer the consequences: the offended opponent can take his turn from the start (even doubling if he so wishes). The player must then act on the cube knowing that his premature roll will be treated as such following his cube decision.—Ed.





### **BIZARRE DOUBLING PROBLEM**

Dear Danny: I was playing online with a player from Italy. He showed me this bizarre fictional position and then asked me the proper cube actions for Black and White:

Match to 15 points. Black leads White, 6 to 0. Black on roll. **CUBE ACTION(S)?** 



I didn't spend much time with it. I don't know the number of times that White wins from here, but it can't be more than a fraction. So I would simply recube to 16 and expect White to pass, unless he was playing such a superior player that trailing 0–14 Crawford was too overwhelming for his patience.

I responded to my Italian friend with this opinion, but before he could answer me, our connection dropped. I have not been able to reconnect with him, so I am at a loss as to why he even presented the setup.

Have I missed something, Danny? Isn't the proper action simply redouble/drop?—

Just Making Sure

**Dear Just:** White can win this game by getting off in four rolls while Black fails to get off in four. White will get off in four rolls one time in 1,296, or roughly 772 times in 1,000,000. Black will fail to get off in four rolls about 15% of the time, so White will win the game in this way only about 115 times in 1,000,000. White can also win this game by getting off in five rolls while Black fails to get off in five. White will get off in five rolls slightly more than 3% of the time, but Black will require six or more rolls to get off only about 1% of the time. As a rough estimate, this

sequence of events will let White win about 315 times in 1,000,000. All in all, I estimate, White will win the game about 430 times in 1,000,000.

In contrast, even if she can never gammon or backgammon Black, White can win a 15-point match trailing 0–14 against an equally skillful opponent one time in 256, or about 3,091 times in 1,000,000. The possibility of White's winning gammons after the Crawford game provides greater matchwinning chances still.

That said, Black should still *not* redouble. Why? Because he is *too good to redouble*. He can win a gammon with double-6s, and he cannot lose the game. After his worst roll (2-1) and White's best (any doublet), Black will still be able to cash with the cube, as he will be a 99.5% favorite to win the game (if rolled to completion). That's a heavier favorite than he would be leading 14–0 entering the Crawford Game, so White cannot afford to take and redouble to 16.—Yours, Danny  $\Delta$

# AN INVITATION TO MY CHOUETTE

Up to now, we have had a maximum of five players. We have discussed what to do if a sixth man comes in. In that case we will break into two 3-man "interlocking" chouettes. This approach allows all players the ability to play all others. The loser of one 3-man chouette goes to the bottom of the ladder of the other chouette. Each chouette has a score sheet with all the player's names. The names of the players in the other chouette have boxes about them which disappear when they be-

come active. I have heard this has been done in California and will let it develop.

There is a weekly BG tournament every Tuesday night at Jackson's Bar & Grill at 7:00 p.m. Previously directed by the late Michael (Max) Maxakuli, it is now very ably run by Tony Anton and Jason Lee. I participate and in no way want to deter its prospering. Like in Chicago, I would like to see efforts to expand backgammon in the Vegas area. I would like to see beginner's lessons. With all the schools, senior centers, and housing developments with community centers, I am sure we can find someone, somewhere who would like to learn backgammon. I have my PowerPoint presentation just waiting to be unfurled again.

Here are the facts: My chouette meets every Thursday and Saturday at noon when I am in town. Every effort will be made to provide a game of your liking. My phone number is (201) 233-2221. Just call and you will be given all the information. There is no charge for playing.

With Howard Markowitz's Nevada State Tournament coming up this month, I am hoping that my chouette will have an international flavor. I look forward to seeing you on your next trip to Las Vegas.— $Larry Liebster \Delta$

error to 0.036. We like this cube. Adam gives up very little match equity with his early double (about one-sixth of one percent) and if Julius mistakenly drops this double, the slightly early cube turns into a genius coup gaining nearly 2% of match equity.

Julius went on to turn the game around and win a gammon to leap ahead 8–4. He never looked back winning his first major title 15–5. Congrats to both Adam and Julius for being class acts throughout the event.

# **Grand Crystal Beaver XI**

20 players (12 at the \$600 level and 8 at the \$300 level) entered the Friday night Master's Jackpot known as the "Grand Crystal Beaver." That's because the trophy is a beautiful Swarovski crystal beaver valued over \$150. The finals were a "crosscountry" battle: California's Steve Sax vs. New Yorker Rod Covlin. In the previous 10 years, nobody had every won the GCB twice. 

# PROBLEM #343 ANALYZED

by Jake Jacobs

5-point match. White leads Black 4 to 3, Crawford. **BLACK TO PLAY 4-3.** 



When Bill sent me this problem he remarked that it was a tough one because there were three choices. Unfortunately, the problem he sent called for the play of 5-2, but I misread it. That problem has exactly three plays worth considering. Of course there are more than three plays here—we will focus on four—but there are three distinct sorts of plays. That may or may not make the play tough, but it does make the position interesting.

I trust everyone has realized that it is possible to hit White's blot on the 15-point? That is one candidate, the play that sends a third checker back while making a bid to escape the back checkers. Making the deuce is also a candidate: it strengthens our board, sends one of White's men to the roof, and in doing so, protects our blots. Last but not least, we may cover our 5-point, and then choose among 4s. There are other possible plays such as 16/13, 5/1\* or the simple 16/9, but I'm sure everyone reading this has rightly dismissed them.

There is an important principle that applies here. More than one, but this will be the first. Black trails 2-away, Crawford, the primary gammon-go score. Knowing that you need a gammon may be very helpful or it may not, since it depends upon whether you know which play wins the most gammons. Here is the first important principle: the play that wins the most gammons is almost always the play that wins the most games. Put another way: the play you would tend to make for money is usually the play you should make at this score. There are plays where that isn't true, instances where one play will obviously win many more gammons than the alternatives.

But none of our candidate plays is obviously more gammonish than any other. And since I know which play wins the most games and which wins the most gammons, I can tell you now they are the same.

Another important principle is that primes and blitzes tend to be more gammonish than holding games. That is one of the problems with 22/15\*. We'll come back to that in a second, after noting the other problem with hitting outside: a hitting contest favors the side with the better board, and so it favors White. She has 27 return shots from the bar, including seven numbers that hit twice. Besides the fact that you may be opening yourself up to a quick knockout, the likelihood that White will end up with an advanced anchor is high. This will more than offset sending a third man back. Hitting outside comes in fifth place, and is a double whopper.

Making the deuce is a much better play than hitting outside. It is a blitzing play, and thus more gammonish than hitting outside. White has far fewer return hits, no double hits, and a quarter of the numbers that do hit, she will instead use to make an advanced anchor. The downside is that making the 2-point is highly committal; you will be either blitzing or trying to scramble home when the blitz fails. Making the deuce isn't quite a whopper, but it is a sizable error.

So it is the 5-point. Which brings us to one more principle: making the 5-point is a strong play in every game plan. Your game is still undeveloped, so you can't properly be said to have a game plan yet. But if you do wind up blitzing, you will be thrilled to have the 5-point. If you wind up priming, you will be thrilled to have the 5-point. Even if you are only running for home, you will still be happy to have the 5-point.


Having made the five, there are four ways to play the 4, and since one of them requires you to break the 8-point, there are only three. Of those we can also eliminate 22/18. This play is still better than 22/15\*. If you played 22/18 first, and then looked around for a 3, you would cover your 5-point in preference to hitting. But playing out to the bar leaves White too many hits. She has 33 total hits, 14 of them hitting twice, and none of them leaves a direct return shot.



After 13/9, 8/5

I confess that I like the first one. I came of age in the era of "pure" plays, and 13/9 is the purer play. It starts a new point for the prime, while providing a builder than may be useful for an even better point, such as the 4-point, or for a blitz. Meanwhile hitting on the deuce puts a man where you don't particularly want it, while stripping one of the builders that might be used for better things.

Nonetheless, hitting is the higher rated play. It provides protection for the other blots and might score a quick knockout, sewing up a gammon and thus a match win. Because 13/9 is so much better positionally, even though 6/2\* is tactically better the difference is less than 2%.

There is one other factor to examine when the plays are this close: will one play force harder choices on the opponent? It is hard to say for sure; there are at least a few very interesting rolls after either play, with the potential for making a blunder. But after hitting it is very unlikely that White will make a serious mistake if she rolls a 5 or a 6. If over half the rolls are effectively forced, or offer equivalent choices, then 13/9 is the play that makes life harder for the opponent. Against a weak opponent it is probably enough to swing it.

*Verdict:* Play 13/9, 8/5 against a weak player, and 8/5, 6/2\* against a strong player.—*Jake Jacobs*  $\Delta$
