

Joe thought for a while before taking the 4-cube. If you take the spare checker on Joe's 8-point and place it on his 2-point, the recube take is correct. But here, it's a blunder. Carol rolled 5-3 and correctly left her 5-point slotted. But Joe missed again and eventually lost four points to trail 6-14. Joe's late rally fell short and Carol Joy Cole went on to win 17-12 (see the video at chicagopoint.com/carolwins.mov).

After the match, Joe (who played the match at an "expert" level to Carol's "advanced") said "I actually thought the position might be a pass, but figured if I ever came in hitting, I would have a superstrong rewhip to 8. I also thought that if Carol had rolled a non-covering roll containing a 6, she might make a mistake and lift the blot on her 5-point."

THE STRONG MASTERS FINALS was captured by the local player Bill Finneran. Bill knocked off Petko Kostadinov (SC) and Ray Fogerlund (CA) before facing the upand-coming Rod Covlin (NY) in the finals. Bill prevailed to win nearly \$7,000 in prize money. Prior to beginning play, he wrote a poem about the US Open that can be found on page 8.

FAMILY AFFAIR: ED & ADAM BENNETT SWEEP MICHIGAN **Bill Riles is Michigan Master**

d & Adam Bennett had memorable Cresults at this year's Michigan Summer Championships 2-5 July at the Sheraton Novi: Ed won the Championship Main event and son Adam won the Consolation. 200 players attended Carol Joy Cole's annual summer gammon festival with 181 participating in the main tournaments.

Failing to draw a bye in the 95 player Champ field meant that Ed, a 73-yearold retired commercial banker from New Mexico, needed seven 11-point victories in a row to win the undefeated bracket. This included an exciting seventh match against the always-tough Ray Glaeser (OH).

In the one-loss bracket, Dean Adamian skunked 2000 Michigan Summer Champ Mike Senkiewicz (NY) 11-0 to earn his spot in the finals. Now Dean would need to beat Ed in two 13-point matches to claim his second Michigan Summer title (he won in 2003).

Dean never trailed in the first match eventually taking a 12-6 Crawford lead. But Ed made it interesting and trailing 9–12, was just a doubled gammon away from victory. Dean hung on to win 13-9 setting the stage for one final match.

"When in doubt, try to pressure your opponent. Play to win rather than to avoid losing." That was Ed's motto during the

Carol Joy is well known to the backgammon world. She has directed the Flint Area Backgammon Club (Michigan) and edited the international newsletter for over 30 years. Additionally, she annually directs the Michigan Summer Championships over the 4th of July weekend. She was the only female in the 25 player Championship field, but that didn't intimidate her. She drew a bye, then proceeded to defeat (in order) 2009 Chicago Open champ Larry Taylor (Georgia), 2009 Pittsburgh champ Bob Glass (California), and 2009 European Backgammon Super Jackpot winner Werner Schmucki (Austria) en route to the 17-point finals with 1989 World champion and 1995 ABT champion Joe Russell (California).

In the semifinals, Carol defeated Werner Schmucki at DMP and Joe Russell bested Ed O'Laughlin 15-8. This set up the 17-point finals. Underdog CJC leaped ahead 5-0. Seven games later, with the Carol leading 10-6, Joe doubled and Carol JUL./AUG. 2009

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CAROLINA INVITATIONAL CEASES

To my fellow competitors, the tourney staff, and the many well-wishers: thank you all so very much.




THANKS TO CHIVA

Next year's US Open is already set: May 14–16 at Club One Poker Casino in Fresno, California.—Ed. Δ






TWO RACE CUBE QUESTIONS

Dear Danny: In a local club match, I faced the following racing position:

7-point match. Black (X) and White are tied at 5-5. White doubles. **SHOULD BLACK TAKE?**



Trailing by only 7 pips, I took the cube. In fact, 720 3-ply, precise Snowie rollouts show Black winning 29.8% which equates to a 0.094 error to take or a 1.73% reduction of my match-winning equity.

I remember reading somewhere that if the leader's pip count advantage is at least 8% of his total count, than he can make an initial double. And I can take up to 12%.

(104-97)/97 = 7.2%

Given White's distributional advantage, I can understand her double; but I can't figure out why Black should drop this cube. What am I missing here, Danny?—Wondering Wayne

DEAR WONDERING: What you're missing is consideration of the score. If you pass and then enter the Crawford Game trailing 5–6, you figure to have about 30% (some theorists estimate more, higher than 31%) match-winning chances, so you need at least 30% game-winning chances to justify a take. Any guidelines for *race takes* based on money play, or match play at the start of a match, are based on a 22% take-point (which would be 25% if not for the ability to redouble).

Also, I don't think the guideline you cite is very accurate. I use another guideline, based on the ratio D2/S, where D is the difference in *adjusted* pip counts and


S is the sum of the two pip counts. The adjustments to pip count include crediting the doubler with four fewer pips to account for the advantage of being on shake. So, without any other adjustments (such as for distribution in home boards and crossovers from the outfield), here D = 104 - 93 = 11, S = 104 + 93 = 197, and D2/S = 121/197 = 0.6142. A chart in "The Racer's Edge" (a chapter of my book *Double-Sixes From the Bar*) equates a ratio of 0.6142 to about 71% game-winning chances ... or about 29% game-winning chances for the doubled player (you).

Is it worth memorizing that chart (or a similar one)? That's for you to decide; but if you have such a chart in your head, you definitely have an edge in judging cube actions at various match scores.

By the way, at 5–5 in a match to 7, even a small advantage should result in an early double by a player who may "lose his market" after a very favorable exchange of rolls. I'm surprised that the cube was left unturned so long.—*Yours, Danny*

Dear Danny: In the US Open Masters event, I faced Steve Sax in the quarterfinals. Leading 7–1, I recubed to 4 in this position:

11-point match. Black (Ed O'Laughlin) leads White (Steve Sax) 7 to 1. SHOULD BLACK RECUBE?



Steve took, recubed to 8, and rolled well enough to gain a 9–7 advantage. He then went on to win our match. The Snowie bearoff database says that my recube was a small error. Black wins 85.2% which translates into a 0.025 error.

I know many techniques for adjusted pip counting in the bearoff, but they all pointed to this being a recube. Do you know of a method that would have given me the right answer?—Ed O'Laughlin

DEAR ED: You probably are better at

calculating adjusted pip counts than I am, but using my crude estimates, I would have thought you were slightly less than an 85% favorite to win the game (only about 82%). I see that I was mistaken, as the database you consulted is undoubtedly more accurate than my off-the-cuff estimates.

If you have memorized a match equity chart (such as the one in the book that Antonio Ortega and I wrote with three annotated matches of Neil Kazaross), you will see that by keeping the cube at 2, you will wind up with match-winning chances of 0.927 if you win the game, 0.754 if you lose. By redoubling to 4, you induce your opponent to take and send the cube right back to you at 8, resulting in match-winning chances of 1.000 if you win the game but only 0.322 if you lose; in effect, you are offering 432-to-73 odds that you will win the game. To offer those odds, you need better than 85.5% game-winning chances.

If your actual game-winning chances were as much as 85.2%, then you were very close to a redouble indeed. I'm not good enough to cut it that close. Just looking at the position, however, and taking the score into account, I'd have waited a shake and redoubled next turn only if nothing bad happened during the intervening exchange of rolls.

Be extra cautious in turning the cube when your opponent will take and (with nothing to lose by doing so) redouble immediately. How cautious is "extra" cautious? Your guess is as good as mine.— Yours, Danny Δ



tournament and the following position from the first match is a good example.

13-point Michigan Open finals #1. Dean Adamian (White) leads Ed Bennett (Black) 6 to 2. **BLACK TO PLAY 6-1.**



Ed chose the bold double hit: 10/4*, 6/5*. Dean danced and Ed ended the game with a correct cube-out. Although the play ranks second best to simply making the 9-point, it demonstrates why aggressive errors generally work out better compared to passive ones.

It looked like a walkover for Dean in the rubber match. With Ed trailing 5–10 to 13, Adam (who had won the Open Consolation) had to leave for the airport. En route, he called his mom to tell her "It doesn't look very good for dad."

Things started to look better, though, as Ed rallied to tie the match at 10–all. Three points later, Ed Bennett was claiming his first ABT win since the Chicago Open in 2003. It was a great victory for a man who had open heart surgery in 2007 and missed this year's March Midwest Championships due to some more procedural heart work.

OPEN CONSOLATION


Although only playing Open level events for a year, Adam Bennett (Madison, WI)

is quickly "catching on." He won the 2008 Open Consolation in Wisconsin, and was runner-up at the Midwest Championships earlier this year. Here in Michigan, Adam survived a tense 11-point finals vs. Bill Riles to win the Open Consolation. This play was the decider:

11-pt. Michigan Open Cons. finals. Adam Bennett (Black) leads Bill Riles (White) 9 to 8. White on roll. **CUBE ACTION(S)**?



Trailing 3-away, 2-away, Bill's double is clear, but whether to drop or take is very close. Adam made the correct decision by taking and was rewarded with an 11–8 match victory.

MICHIGAN MASTERS

An incredible 32-player field including Sax, Weaver, Gartner, Koca, Kazaross, Woolsey, Munitz, Rice, Russell, Fogerlund, O'Laughlin, Senkiewicz and O'Hagan battled for thousands of dollars in prize money in the Michigan Masters. When the dust settled, two were standing: Bill Riles (TX) and Brent Cohen (PA).



The match was a good one with the leading changing hands a number of times. But the big game occurred with Cohen ahead 11–9 to 13. Bill Riles calls it the "Backgame From Hell." Read about it here: <u>tinyurl.com/michbg</u>. In the end Bill Riles

prevailed to capture the

first big win of his life. [*See his letter on page 3.*] So was Brent Cohen who teamed with Neil Kazaross to win the Open Doubles.

Two Very Valuble Doubling Charts

by Phil Simborg

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PHYLLIS SMOLINSKI 1947–2009

Phyllis Smolinski died on July 4 at her home in Palos Park, Illinois. Phyllis lost her battle with Leukemia following a two-month stay in the hospital. She leaves behind a husband Wayne, a son Michael, three sisters and a brother.

At the time of her death, Phyllis ranked 8th on the alltime Chicagoland point list with 321.49. She began her tournament career playing at the House of Backgammon in the late 1970s. She also earned points playing at the Pub Club, Gammon's of Chicago, Prime Backgammon Club, and at the Bar Point Club where she collected the bulk of her points (259.66) playing between 1984 and 2008. She represented the Bar Point Club seven times at the annual Illinois State Team Challenge Cup winning three Cups.

Ms. Smolinski had a fine national tournament year in 2000 where at the Chicago Open, she won the Intermediate Consolation and was a finalist in the Open Doubles. Additionally, at the Nevada State Tournament, she was an Intermediate semifinalist.

Phyllis, a breast cancer survivor, slowed her play after 2007, but still attend the BPC for chouette play at least twice a month until hospitalized due to Leukemia complications earlier this year and laid to rest at the Cumberland Chapel in Norridge on July 9.

C ube decisions (both doubling and taking) have two elements. You really need to get both right to make the correct decision. The first element involves assessing the situation over the board. You need to look at the board and estimate the wins, losses, and gammons for both sides. You need to consider your market-losers and when your doubling window opens and closes. You need to determine the volatility of the position and the value of potential recubes if you give or take the cube.

When you've done all that, you have only half of what you need to make an informed cube decision. The other half is applying all of the above to the given match score. At different scores, there are different take points, and the price of gammons also changes with the score. Both of these factors change at different cube values as well.

The "Centered Cube Take Point" chart shows when you should take or drop an offered double based on the match score. If you are trailing 3–5 to 7 (2-away/4-away), the chart says you can take a double with only 18% winning chances. Why such a low take point? Because at this score, if you drop, you would trail 3–6 Crawford which is a bad place to be. Additionally, your take gives you an automatic recube to 4, which is DMP meaning gammons are meaningless for both sides.

If you are leading 3–2 to 7 (4-away/5-away), you can take a double if you are within the 20% to 29% range of winning (or an average of 24%). That range is dependent on how many times you get gammoned in the position and how likely it is you will be able to redouble.

The "Price of Gammons" chart tells you just how much those gammons are costing you at a given match score, or how much they are worth to your opponent compared to the value of winning the game.

To help players learn these important values, I have developed the charts at left. I can't wait until I come up against one of you in a tournament who beats me thanks to these charts! Actually, that would give me some pleasure.—*Phil Simborg* Δ



9-point match. Black leads White 8 to 7 Crawford. BLACK TO PLAY 4-1.



If Black chooses to break his board and hold the double anchor, there are three possible approaches:

- 1. he could leave no inner board blots with 6/5, 6/2;
- 2. he could leave one blot with 5/4, 5/1, or;
- 3. he could leave both points slotted with 6/1.

Even though Black may be getting a shot next turn, 6/5, 6/2 looks too stiff. That spare on the 2-point is dead. The only thing Black can do with it is move it onto the ace point. Black will certainly need at least a five-point board if he hopes to contain a hit checker, and since he is losing one of the

back points, he will want to have the ace point slotted. That spare checker belongs on the ace point.

5/4, 5/1 is a reasonable compromise. There shouldn't be much difference between giving up the 6-point and giving up the 5-point. The ace point remains slotted, and Black will be a three away from remaking a five-point board; although of course not as good a board. If Black does hit a shot, getting hit back on the ace point might not be too bad since at least the White checker will be partially contained.

6/1 has the advantage of leaving the 6point slotted, so when Black later pulls out one of the back checkers, he will be able to remake the point quicker. Black will need his 6- and 5-points at some time in the future if he is to contain a hit checker. The downside of this play is that it leaves two inner board blots with no checkers in immediate cover range. Black's first shot may be coming quickly, and leaving two inner board blots may be too big. On balance, if Black does break his board, I think that 5/4, 5/1 is the right compromise of aggression and safety.

Now, on to the big question. Should Black hold his front board and play 22/17 (which is the only legal way Black can hold his front board)? Keeping the board is very important for Black's winning chances. If Black does hit a shot, he will need to put his board together if he hopes to contain the hit checker. If Black breaks his board now, it will be difficult for him to put it back together regardless of which board-breaking play he chooses. Is it worth the risk?

Leaving the 22-point is very committal. Not only does this give White several

pointing numbers which previously did not exist, but it gives up the 22-point forever. Black is much more likely to get a shot holding the 22-point compared to holding the 21-point. Black will need to roll perfectly next turn in order to hold both anchors, since he can't afford to break his board any more. However, Black will be a lot happier breaking the 21-point anchor rather than the 22-point anchor, since the farther back the anchor, the better chance of getting a shot.

The match score is a major factor here. Black is certainly more likely to get gammoned if he breaks his 22-point anchor, since White will have more ways to blow Black out of the water and then come in safely against the meager anchor on the 21point. On the other hand, if Black does hit a shot, his winning chances will be considerably better if he keeps his board intact. So it appears that Black will win more often if he plays 22/17.

At this match score, getting gammoned is extra costly to Black since it is the difference between playing the next game at double match-point and losing the match. For this reason mainly, I do not think that Black should release the anchor. If the score were reversed so losing the game loses the match whether Black gets gammoned or not, then I would go with 22/17, particularly since Black could conceivably win a gammon if he hits an early shot and his board is intact. If it were early in the match where gammons are of value to both sides I would consider it close, but I would probably choose to hold the anchor.-Kit Woolsey Δ
