
MEA MAXIMA CULPA A Look At My Las Vegas Win By Mike Corbett

It was my good fortune to face Dallas, Texas backgammon giant Malcolm Davis in the finals of the recent Las Vegas Open Tournament (November 4–8 at the Riviera Hotel). Having prevailed against capable opponents in the earlier rounds (including Neil Kazaross), I found myself in fine fettle for the matchup with my old friend. This position came up late in the match:

Las Vegas Open 17-point finals. Mike Corbett (Black) leads Malcolm Davis (White) 12 to 3. White on roll. **CUBE ACTION(S)**?



After a long deliberation, I took the 4-cube and was treated to the gasps and

rumbles of a surprised gallery. I shall explain later why this pleases me. You will get my thoughts regarding this poor decision, not as a justification, but more to stimulate curiosity about an issue I have wrestled with for years.

My thoughts "in order of their appearance" were as follows:

- 1) Even at this match score, White has at best, a razor-thin double if the cube is centered. And when White does double, Black would make a huge blunder if he passed.
- 2) The gammon threat should be minimal (extended rollout suggests about 7.4%).
- I thought I'd win about one-third of the games with a few more gammons than my opponent. (I need 36% with about 7% gammons against).
- 4) The decision seemed close and if I did win, I'd become an overwhelming match favorite. (6400 full 3-ply, precise Snowie rollouts show taking at this score to be a .147 error—yikes!) And finally,
- 5) Any intermediate playing the black checkers is likely to play at a lower error rate than an expert playing the whites.

Just try it. Whenever the directional complexity of the strategy is vague, beware. Playing the White pieces, you will be forced to consider balancing the merits of priming or closing out your opponent by slotting the bar, escaping the back checkers, and hitting on the ace point. I will award the first three people who can do this perfectly (random dice) with a cash prize from my new sack of money.

So what could this certainty be worth? Would I get .02 or .03 back? I would be grateful for some feedback since my ability to quantify this information is limited.

I now confess to the maxima culpa for which this article is named. I love making a play that I sense will be wildly unpopular. It may be more than simple vanity. I may have deeper unhealthy tendencies, but if the biggest error I ever make in a match is .147, I will be hard to beat.

It was great to see young faces in this year's Super Jackpot finals. Congratulations










CONSIDER THE RACE

Dear Danny: I was watching two Open players in a double match-point game when Black faced a tricky play:

Match to 7 points tied at 6-all (DMP). **BLACK (X) TO PLAY 3-3.**



If I have the count right, before Black's roll, he's down 74 to 65. The double 3 roll then puts him in the lead by three pips. That's basically nothing, yet Black chose to make his 9-point and slot his 3-point. Shouldn't Black stay back with 12/6, 6/3(2) for maximum outfield coverage? ... or at least make his 12-point and play 6/3(3)?

Am I wrong or is the Open player all wet here?—*Max Coverage*

DEAR MAX: I make Black a distinct underdog in the race. First, a 3-pip lead with the opponent on shake means that the opponent is really ahead in the race, as the shake is worth about 4 pips. Second, Black's distribution is poorer than White's. Black's gap on the 5-point will cause him to waste 5s in the bearoff, for example, but White will bear off checkers with 5s.

For this reason, I can see the merit of staying back and making the 3-point, 12/3, 6/3. Contact favors the player who trails in the race. A distance of 11 pips between opposing blots is ideal for maximizing contact, and White is in danger of rolling 6-4, 6-3, 6-2 or 6-1 (an 8-in-36 chance) to give Black a direct outfield shot. That just about counterbalances the danger to Black, which consists of White's immediate 6-5 shot as well as Black's blotting 6s when White stays back in Black's home court.

However, White can play a 5 in his home board, so if White rolls neither a doublet nor a 6, he will reduce contact by coming out to Black's 7-point or 8-point, giving Black only an indirect shot. So staying back does not favor Black. Making the 9-point gains when White rolls 5-2, 4-1, 3-2, 3-1, 2-2, 2-1 or 1-1, and gains big when White rolls the double-5s that it blocks and must remain on Black's 4-point for Black to point on, pick and pass, or even hit loose to gain in the race.—Yours, Danny Δ

The choices were (a) must beat the undefeated player twice, (b) must beat the undefeated player once, and (c) must beat the undefeated player who gets a point spot.

I alerted Art Benjamin to the poll and he defended (b) playing a one match finals with mathematics. I contend that your polling approach is *not* a fair presentation of the issue. Without anyone providing a positive case for change, the players are responding to their long-standing experience and "logic" for why it has been two wins required in the past.

I believe that you are well intended to gather the playing public's opinion with your poll questions, but as in an election, we voters are provided with a *pro* and *con* postion on all propositions. Perhaps getting such pro/con statements could be solicited prior to creating a Chicago Point "poll" and have them available (via a click) on the poll page?—*Patrick Gibson, Gammon Associates, Van Nuys, California*

Our polls do give the players a chance to comment; and those comments are only a click away. Despite Art Benjamin's comments favoring (b), the results of 210 voters were as follows: (a) 150, (b) 43, (c) 17.—Ed.

"UNFAIR AUCTION" REPLY

In answer to the letter in your last newsletter complaining that the auction in Peoria was "unfair" because door prizes raised the price of specific teams:

1. The "goal" of the auctioneer is to get the bids as high as possible and have as much action as possible. Higher prices across the board do raise the investment for individual players, but their return is proportionately higher. Anyone who doesn't want to invest so much can usually get the buyer to allow them to buy back half, or a person can find a partner to take part of the action.

2. There were only about three bigger added prizes—one for the buyer of the first team, one for a free room night, and one for the last team—all valued around \$100. Most other door prizes were under \$25. I doubt that *anyone* bought a team or bid more for those prizes. They were just a nice bonus for participating.

3. Nobody has to buy back. Why should Vinton Knarr, or CHICAGO POINT publishing Mr. Knarr's letter, for that matter, encourage others to boycott buying back at the auction? Tournaments need this additional income to help cover costs. I commend the POINT for publishing a letter

We agree with Mr. Knarr that giving \$100 or higher valued door prizes to winning bidders skews the team's actual equity value. But this technique could also help to raise all other bids—good for the directors who collect 10% of the proceeds. If players believe that their team price is out of line, they don't have to buy back. The owner shouldn't be offended because he is the one who received the bonus gift for his high bid.—Ed. Δ

Players enjoyed a dinner break at the famous Pump Room. All in all, another successful event. Δ



PROBLEM #349 ANALYZED by John O'Hagan

Match to 9 points. Black leads White 7 to 5. BLACK TO PLAY 5-2.



B lack is ahead 2-away, 4-away, owns a 2-cube, and has apparently just hit a shot in the bearoff to avoid losing a gammon and the match. Hitting that shot was a huge swing for Black since he's now a solid favorite in the game. He's far from gin of course, and this 5-2 roll leaves a lot to be desired. Nineteen numbers made a full 6-prime and most of the other 17 play better than this 5-2.

Remember to keep the match score situation in mind when thinking how to play this 52. This is one of those "gammon save" scores for Black which means that the opponent's gammons are worth twice their normal value and yours are worth nothing. At most scores, the gain from turning a single game loss into a single game win is twice as important and the extra loss from turning a single game loss into a gammon loss.

For example, at 3-away, 3-away with the cube on 2, a single game win/loss gives you 75%/25% match winning chances (MWC) while a gammon win/loss wins or loses the match for you. The gammon price is therefore one-half and a checker play that increased both your winning chances and your gammon-losing chances would be correct as long as the former was at least one-half of the latter. But at this 2-away, 4-away score with the cube on two, a single game win/loss gives you 100%/50% MWC while a gammon loses the match with 0% MWC. The gammon price is therefore 100% and plays that increase your wins and gammon losses need to increase the former by more than the latter to be correct.

With this in mind, how best to play this 5-2? It looks like your choices are: (1) hit

with the 5 (8/3*) and then play the 2 with one of your other checkers; (2) lift the blot on the 9-point with the 2 or the 5 and then play the other number with one of your checkers on White's side of the board; or (3) keep the back of the prime slotted and play the entire roll in some fashion with your four back checkers (although you should keep a checker on the 21-point since you'll get hit twice on 6-6 and might be able to hit if White blots on the 2-point).

Can any of these three be eliminated from further consideration? Probably not, even though hitting loose and not lifting are pretty big plays to be considering at this score.

Let's look at the hitting play, 8/3* with the 5. If we do this, what's the best 2? 13/11 would be my choice. 8/6 is too conservative and advancing any of your three rearmost checkers two pips forward doesn't do much to enhance your winning chances. A GNU rollout confirmed that 13/11 is indeed better than 8/6, 18/16, 21/19, or 22/20. Everything will play well if White doesn't hit you back. You'll have good 1s, 2s, 3s, 4s, 5s, and 6s. If White does hit but doesn't escape from your 3-point, your non-entering 1s and 2s will allow you to remake a fifth blocking point.

Hitting takes away White's 6-6 joker but it does give White four strong double hitters (6-3, 5-3) which are very gammonish (especially if you dance with one or both) and two single hitters (6-2) which will also be very bad if you dance. The other ten hitters don't allow White to escape, but you will then dance one-ninth of the time and that could be disastrous. White would then have direct 5s and 6s to hit again and escape with tempo and be well on her way to gammoning you.

The second option with this 5-2 is to lift the blot on the 9-point. Lifting with the 2 is surely better than with the 5 since you don't want to front-load your builders. So what's the right 5 if you play 9/7 with the deuce? Playing either 21/16 or 22/17 give you excellent coverage; but 22/17 looks a little better since it gives you 4-4 to make your 9-point, 6-6 to hit loose on your 3point (if White is still there), and some very slight hope if White rolls her 6-6 joker. Another possibility is to play 13/8 with the 5. That gives you fewer shots after White's 6-3, 6-2, or 6-1 but it does dodge getting hit with White's 6-4 and the spare on the 8-point will allow you to hit loose with a 5 without breaking the point. Not a bad play but I like the extra outfield coverage from 22/17 and a GNU rollout agrees. 22/17 9/7 is the best lifting play.

The third approach with this 5-2 is to keep the 9-point slotted. There are lots of

possible plays here but, as stated earlier, it's probably right not to move your checker on the 21-point since you'll still have a chance if White rolls her 6-6 joker. (A GNU rollout agrees with keeping the checker on the 21-point by the way.) All plays in this category are pretty risky since they give the 6-6 super joker, the 6-x & fan sequence, and all but 13/6 also leave the 6-4 semijoker. These are all pretty gammonish and I'm afraid the extra win/extra gammon loss ratio will be well below the required 1.0 for all of these plays.

The five candidate plays appear to be: 13/6; 18/11; 18/13, 22/20; 22/15; and 22/17, 18/16. 13/6 and 18/13, 22/20 are too conservative (even at this score) while 18/11 is too loose. So that leaves 22/15 and 22/17, 18/16. I'd choose 22/15 since that gives 27 covers for the 9-point versus 25 after 22/17, 19/16. A GNU rollout disagreed. It showed 22/17 19/16 to be the slightly better play.


So the the final candidates are lifting with 22/17, 9/7, hitting with 8/3* 13/11, and not lifting with 22/17, 18/16. I definitely like lifting at this score. 6-6 will be a disaster of course, but there are 35 other numbers on the dice and you gain enough on these to more than offset the huge loss from the 1/36 super joker. Hitting loose gets hit back too often and the four double hitters are especially bad at this score. Keeping the 9-point slotted is also a little too bold at this score. Why take this chance? Lifting is safer and gives you excellent hitting chances even if White does roll a 6.

The GNU rollout agrees. Lifting is best, not lifting is second, and hitting is third.— John O'Hagan Δ

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
