US OPEN TO MARY HICKEY San Francisco is a popular venue

In many ways, Chiva Tafazzoli's second US Open held 13–16 May at the Embassy Suites in South San Francisco was more successful than his first venture last year in Washington DC. For one thing, total attendance increased by 50%—from 54 to 82 total backgammoners. Additionally, the Embassy Suites (at the outstanding rate of \$99/night) received rave reviews from everyone attending.


But is this tournament misnamed? Is it the US Open, or the *Women's* US Open? Carol Joy Cole won in 2009 and this year, the title of US Open Champion goes to Mary Hickey of Kirkersville, Ohio.

Mary had not even planned to attend the tournament. But two weeks prior to the start date, she won an online qualifier at Play65 that provided her with a free Open entry and hotel room. You can't beat that!

Following a bye in the opening round, Mary won four straight matches to face Dorn Bishop (CA) in the 17-point finals. The match was broadcast on the Internet via Ustream with assistant director Rob Maier uploading the moves. Here are some highlights from that match.

Trailing 3–4, Mary reached this setup and was hungry to put pressure on Dorn:

POS. 1. 17-point US Open finals. Mary Hickey (Black) trails Dorn Bishop (White) 3 to 4. Black on roll. **CUBE ACTION(S)**?




There's no question the position threatens Dorn, but Mary's double is too early. Dorn's take was trivial.

Mary rolled 5-2. She compounded her aggressive double with an overly aggressive checker play hitting with 11/4*. True, this play wins the most Gs; but it also loses the most Gs. A number of plays are better, but the anchoring 23/18, 16/14 is best.

Dorn responded with a 3-2, entering and hitting Mary's blot. A few rolls later he made a proper recube to 4 and went on to win an eight point gammon.

Now trailing 3–12 and holding a 2cube, Mary was looking to make something happen when an awkward double forced Dorn into the following position with Mary on shake:

POS. 2. 17-point US Open finals. Mary Hickey (Black) trails Dorn Bishop (White) 3 to 12. Black on roll. **CUBE ACTION(S)?**




Mary correctly recubed here. If she simply holds the doubler and loses the game, she'll still trail 3–14. Mary really needs to win this game and redoubling has the added benefit of winning her an occasional gammon.

Dorn thought for about 30 seconds before taking the 4-cube (the right decision). Mary tossed a golden 2-1 hitting both checkers and when the smoke cleared, she was just one double shy of winning an eight point gammon. Still, the win tightened the score to 12–7 bringing her within striking distance.

Mary grabbed two points in the next game to cut her deficit to 9–12. The next game turned the tide. Perhaps a little frustrated after losing six straight points, Dorn pushed a bit in this position:

POS. 3. 17-pt. US Open finals. Dorn Bishop (White) leads Mary Hickey (Black) 12 to 9. White on roll. **CUBE ACTION(S)?**



Dorn cubed to two. Although White wins from this position nearly two-thirds of the time, White's 12–9 lead makes this an early cube. Mary scooped it up and reached a tasty recube position 12 turns later that Dorn was forced to take. Mary brought the four point game home to take a 13–12 lead.

Mary Hickey took her 13–12 lead and never looked back. She swept the remaining games to earn a 17–13 victory and the 2010 US Open title. Well done, Mary!

POINT that I had resigned from the USBGF. Let me set the record straight. I stepped down from my chairmanship of the Rules and Ethics and the Education Committees and the Board of Governors largely because my role as a teacher, profiting from giving backgammon lessons, was causing some people to question my motives and to become critical of my efforts to promote

the USBGF.

Because I have no desire to subject myself to personal attacks and negativity, and because I do not want to do anything that could hurt the progress of the USBGF, (an organization I helped form and strongly support), I stepped down. I continue to be an advisor to the Education Committee and I am working very closely with the members of that committee to promote backgammon in the schools and generally in the United States.










PLAYING WITH DUCKS

Dear Danny: I faced the challenging set of ducks in the Consolation flight of our weekly event:

5 point match. Black trails White 2 to 4. **BLACK TO PLAY 2-2**.



I completely misread the concept here picking the third best play. I've rolled it out but would love to have your input on how to solve this challenging position "over the board." After the play I made, sign me—Quackin' Up

DEAR DONALD: The first thing worth noticing in this position is the race, as both

sides have sprung their back men and at present little contact remains. If you let White convert to a pure race, you have little chance to win the game, as you are far behind. So your first priority must be to hit, which gains nine pips in the race and prevents White from breaking contact immediately.

As you will still trail in the race, though not by less than before hitting, a secondary priority for you is preventing the escape of the blot you send back. The best play for that purpose is 13/9*, 6/4(2), making your 4-point, giving White five additional dancing rolls (4-6, 4-5 and 4-4) and strengthening both your board and your prime (which can grow to a 5-prime if you roll a 6, a 2, 5-3 or 4-4 next).

However, that play, as well as another play that is good for containment, 13/9*(2), leaves blots and shots (11 return hits in all, the equivalent of a simple direct shot). I would choose 13/9*, 6/4(2) if White had only three inside points, but not when he has four. Because White's board and prime are already developed and stronger than yours, a return hit will be disastrous. For this reason, I favor the safe 15/9*/7, a play that doesn't put all your game-winning eggs in one leaky basket. You will have several paths to victory. You can win the race, despite being behind, just by rolling larger numbers than your opponent. You can hit White's blot if he flees to your outer board, or point on the blot if he remains in your home board. You can extend your blockade in either direction.—Yours, Danny

Danny Kleinman Responds

Looking at some rollout results, I see that $13/9^*$, 6/4(2) is slightly superior, despite the slight inferiority of boards, and despite the fact that it wins 2.8% fewer games. Of course this would not be true if gammon losses could harm, as it leads to gammon losses in a whopping 18.2% of all games, and I knew that when I even considered the play. What I overlooked, however, is that making the 4-point increases your chances of winning a gammon, from an almost neglible 4.5% of all games to a substantial though not large 8.0%. At this score, where winning a plain game ties the match but a gammon wins the match outright, increased gammon chances trade one-for-one with increases chances of losing.

The lesson to be learned, for me as well as for you, is that even innocuous-looking positions contain small gammon threats, and that building your board increases those gammon threats significantly.-DK



7 point match. Black trails White 5 to 6 Crawford. **BLACK ON SHAKE.**




So basically, Black wants to win the game, but a match-ending gammon would be best of all. How aggressive is Black supposed to get trying for the gammon?

Tak Morioka, Chicago's all-time master point leader, qualified on his third attempt, then won four straight matches to add another ABT title to his scrapbook. Tak defeated Stick Rice (OH) in the finals by the lopsided score of 11-1. It was yet another loss for Stick who holds the record for being in

the most ABT finals without ever winning.

Tak said his toughest match was against Carol Joy Cole in the semifinals. Carol and Tak teamed to place second in the Doubles (behind Ed & Austin O'Laughlin).

Roz Ferris defeated the Jesse Eaton for the Intermediate title. Jesse's finish gives him 15.21 Intermediate points—probably enough for a top 20 silver coin at year's end.

This year's Chicago Open, although sparsely attended, received positive feedback for the format and the food. Kudos to Rory and Howard for a job well done. Δ

OCTOGENARIAN

I am an octogenarian.

It has its benefits. In some cities the buses have special seats for us. The movies let us in for less money. There are senior discounts at certain stores. It's like they are saying, "We know you are slowing down and having difficulty moving around, so we will try to make it easier for you to be here. We appreciate and respect you."

Not so in backgammon these days. The powers that be want to "improve" our game—speed it up at any cost. They have introduced clocks and made them mandatory in a number of divisions including mine.

Clocks change many aspects of backgammon including the handling of dice. I am used to picking them up to end my turn. I have my own dice in money games (which I play a lot of), but in clocked matches, one pair of dice is shared and you end your turn by pushing a button. So I am required to switch back and forth. You say this is easy to learn and do? For younger players, maybe. But I've been doing the same thing for decades, so it is much harder for me.

I have had speedy players request a clock with me, probably to gain an advantage. Sometimes they complicate their movement of checkers to distract me and use up time. I do not mean complicated games. I mean picking both checkers up, holding them, and then positioning and repositioning them. So now I have to shift my concentration away from strategy, pip count, and clock use to remember where the checkers started and see if they were placed correctly. Clock use fosters abuse like this. I guess as we move up the skill ladder, we'll all have to accept this if we want to continue to play tournament backgammon.

I have dined with tournament directors and they all express the same concern: where are the new players going to come from? In my opinion, they should be making it easier to play the game, not more complex.

Sir, what's that you say? You don't know what an octogenarian is? Your mother

tongue is different and this is not in your vocabulary? I commend you for trying to survive in this world, but the powers that be do not want you. English is the official language of backgammon. They have limited access to the game for foreigners, and now they're going after the slower-moving individuals.

In my lifetime, I have seen purification tried before in Nazi Germany. Their goal was the creation of a blond, blue-eyed master race. To reach this end, they eliminated those considered to be the negative parts of their society. Now it's starting in backgammon.

You say, "Why are you making such a fuss?"

At three different tournaments, I have lost matches on time. I have traveled a long distance and paid substantial money only to be disqualified. I have had trouble handling the clocks (there are at least three different types in use, usually requiring a director to set up), picking up (sometimes dropping) both dice, not hitting the clock, and just thinking about my moves.

I am doing my best to adjust; but I also wonder about new players entering the Championship. Will they stay with backgammon, or go to a game that is more accommodating?

I only have about twenty years left to play, and I want tournaments to exist until I leave. With clock use expanding, I'm beginning to have my doubts that the game can draw enough new players to remain viable in the years to come.—*Larry Liebster* Δ



11-point match. Black leads White 10 to 8 Crawford. **BLACK TO PLAY 5-1.**



First of all, let's consider the match score and how it might be relevant to Black's choice. Black is ahead 10–8 Crawford. It matters little to Black whether he loses a single game or a gammon. If White wins she will be turning the cube as soon as possible in the following game, so all getting gammoned costs Black is his free drop.

UNDERWATER BACKGAMMON

It's official! So grab your dive gear and book your flights! The 2010 Underwater Backgammon World Championship will take place September 22–25 in Zakynthos, Greece. We chose this idyllic Ionian island because of its magnificent beauty and pristine waters.

We will be working together with the Diver's Paradise dive base [www.diversparadise.gr] during the event. The dive location will depend on weather conditions and will be decided each day before the dive(s).

Each dive will cost 25 euros (if you bring your own equipment). This price includes air tanks, weights and boat trip. Naturally, any and all dive equipment can be rented from the dive base, as needed.

Count on doing at least three to four dives. Advancing to the final rounds of the tournament will naturally require more dives! More fish, more tavli, more fun!

If you require some tips on lodging, our local contact and owner of Diver's Paradise, Mr. Fanis Nikoloudakis, can be of great assistance. Getting backgammoned, on the other hand, is very serious. Instead of being at DMP, Black loses the match. Consequently, if the decision is otherwise close, Black should be choosing a play which has lower backgammon frequency. While backgammons are rare in any event, they can happen in a position like this.

Given the above analysis, I think it is pretty clear that Black must play 24/23 with the ace regardless of what he does with the 5. Assuming Black winds up with some sort of backgame, he will be sticking around for a last ditch shot as long as possible if there is little extra risk involved. If Black plays a 2-5 backgame and doesn't get an early shot, he will probably be able to safely stay with one or even two checkers on White's 2-point to the bitter end without taking any serious backgammon risk.

It is likely that White will be forced to dump checkers behind the 2-point anchor, and these dead checkers will be good backgammon protection. If Black winds up with a 1-5 backgame, it is another story. Now Black will not be able to stay until the bitter end due to the backgammon danger. Since it's not clear that the 2-5 backgame doesn't generate as many shots as the 1-5 game to begin with, this extra added backgammon danger make the 2-5 structure superior here.

Of special note: For all you "15 minutes of fame" people out there, the event is planned to be covered by the local (and possibly national) TV stations, as well as possibly the *Discovery Channel* (Canada). So, bring your best Oscar performance and start practicing!

SIMBORG INTERVIEW OF PETKO

It was interesting to read Phil Simborg's

For the 5, there are a couple of choices. The purer play is to slot the 5-point. This is the point Black wants to make the most. It won't matter much if White picks up some more checkers. If anything that might help Black's timing, although Black timing will probably be okay anyway. The other play is to hit loose on the 3-point. While it is unlikely that Black can win frontwards, there is the possibility that White might get jammed in on Black's ace point and be forced to break some of the blockade.

My preference is to slot the 5-point. Even if White is forced to break some of his blockade, that isn't going to help Black all that much. Winning frontwards is pretty impossible. The main danger with hitting loose is that White gets stuck on the bar and Black fails to get his back spare onto the 20-point launching pad in time. If that happens, Black will have to leave the defensive 5-point and be left with just a 2-point game. With White forced to move, White will probably hit one of Black's blots and Blacks timing should be secure. 24/23, 10/5 for me.

This is a difficult position. One must look ahead and see what Black is really trying to accomplish here. When the proper goals are realized, the best play can be determined.—*Kit Woolsey* Δ


