Costa Ricans Win Intermediate, Sweep Novice



The 28 April–2 May vacation tourney drew a total of 122 international players from five continents and Australia, including one of the strongest 56 player Open fields ever assembled (Magriel, Robertie, Goulding, Sylvester, Kazaross, Kissane, Wachtel, etc.!)

Australia's Tino Lechich, the eventual Open winner, survived the following incredible position in the round-of-32 against CRBA President Mario Madrigal:

#### DANISH BACKGAMMON FEDERA-TION RESPONDS

We have seen the controversy that two advertisements in the invitation to our 5th Nordic Open have created. As it has never been our intention to embarrass, disgust or offend anyone, we have decided to impose an advertisers' code that will exclude such types of ads in future DBF material. The letter to Miss Lonelyblots and her reply does, however, call for a reply.

First of all, we would like to make it absolutely clear that "the BG promoter" that it is criticized in the article is the Danish Backgammon Federation—not a private profit-seeking individual. DBF is a democratic and government-recognized organization with a leadership that is elected by the members. The Federation has more than 11,000 registered players (out of a total population of 5,000,000 Danes) and our pride, the "Carlsberg Backgammon Cup," has more than 4,300 players.

The DBF has backgammon ambitions and optimistic plans that hopefully will set standards for other countries. We try hard to constantly improve and to initiate new and popular activities. In these attempts, we sometimes make mistakes and occasionally show bad judgment. However, you don't get ahead if you just follow others.

This year in order to save money on





# ASK DANNY

#### **USING YOUR FREE PASS**

Pear Danny: Suppose you are leading 6 to 5 in a 7-point match and that it is after the Crawford game. Are there any opening rolls which are so bad for you that you should pass when your opponent doubles?—Gary Daniels, Normal, IL

DEAR GARY: I would have thought not. Even the poor opening rolls accomplish something useful: running a back man to relative safety, splitting the back men, bringing builders or slotting. All but 2-1 give you a small lead in the race, and 2-1 plays constructively if you slot your 5-point and put a builder on your 11-point.

Why use your "free pass" and start another game in which your opponent may win the opening roll?

Then I examined the statistics collected by Hal Heinrich for his ""Opening Roll Survey" (CHICAGO POINT, December 1990). I confess the results surprised me. For I found several rolls that led to more losses than wins for the opening mover.

It came as no real shock to see that 5-2 (played 13/8, 13/11) was a net loser. After all, 5-2 was my (and probably others') nominee for Worst Opening Roll. But 6-2 (played 24/18, 13/11) and 3-2 (played either 24/21, 13/11 or 13/10, 13/11) were also net losers.

So I'll conjecture that you should use your free pass after any of those three opening rolls.

Could I be wrong? Could Heinrich's results for 6-2 and 3-2 be flukes?

Conceivably, yes. But I suspect these results reflect a deep truth about the opening in backgammon. Do you see what 6-2, 5-2 and 3-2 have in common with each

other and with no other opening rolls? Each brings a builder to the 11-point without slotting the 5-point. Perhaps, then, the 11-point is overrated as a place for a builder. A man on the 11-point is a builder for no inside point other than the 5-point. In tandem with a slot on the 5-point (as after an opening 2-1 played in the usual way), a man on the 11-point is an asset. Otherwise, it is almost useless.

A final word of caution: my advice to use your free pass after rolling an opening 6-2, 5-2 or 3-2 applies only when your free pass is about to expire. Leading 6-3 or 6-1 post-Crawford, you should save your free pass for a truly rainy day: when your opponent wins a very good opening roll and you fail to equalize with your reply.— $Yours, Danny \Delta$

printing and mailing expenses, we engaged an advertisement agency with instructions to bring in as many ads as they could. # 41ST INDIANA OPEN: LOTS OF DIVISIONS AND DIVERSIONS

Last month I played in the 41st Indiana Open and wanted to share my reactions with you. Unlike most other tournaments, Indy offers four divisions instead of three. While I am not completely sold on this approach, its drawbacks are not as severe as I first thought.

Specifically, it was feared that smaller prize pools might discourage people from travelling to Indy. Actually, while attendance was somewhat low (perhaps partly due to the number of tournaments this spring), the first prize in the Open division was a reasonable \$2,500. Butch Meese is flexible with the number of places he pays in each division, reasoning that Open players prefer larger prizes, while Intermediate or Advanced players welcome more chances to cash.

I went to Indy worried about the potentially low attendance, but found nothing to discourage me from returning next year. In fact, the well-run tournament offered a number of diversionary enticements:

1. This was the 41st Indiana Open. That means the first one was played back when horses and buggies were still entering the Indy 500.

- 2. There are Hoosiers down there. It has been reliably reported that the term comes down to us from pioneer days. One of Indiana's first settlers, James Whitcomb Strommen, was chouetting, and after a particularly stunning turnaround, the kibitzers, to a man, remarked: "Hoo? Sure was a deep take!"
- 3. There are splendid cultural opportunities. Some of my friends found a blues band in Broad Ripple called Bangkok Rooster that was as fine as any in Chicago.

I, myself, joined a group of culture-

hungry lads, and went to see a dance show. It proved to be, not ballet, but a more modern form of dancing known as "Table." My friends decided this style was better than ballet because it's too hard to stuff dollar bills into a tutu.

4. Finally, there are Steak 'n Shakes, the greatest of all hamburger joints. Sure, the food is just as bad for you, and if you strip the bib overalls off them, you'll find the same sorts hanging around Steak 'n Shake at 3:00 A.M. as nod off in Dunkin' Donuts. But still...it tastes more elegant.

Twenty years ago, a whole generation went off to small town colleges and came back proclaiming: "After a night of beer drinking, I'd rather throw up Steak 'n Shake than White Castle!"

I HOPE THE FOREGOING convinces people to join me in Indy next year. Like many good things in life, it's better shared.

In the Open division, Quint McTyeire of Louisville won for a second straight year by defeating fellow Louisville Backgammon Club player Frank Frigo. Complete

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

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

# PROBLEM #192 SOLVED

Tournament double match-point. **BLACK TO PLAY 4-1.** 



Black has run out of time. He must relinquish some part of his prime while he is still stuck behind White's blockade. How should he go about it? There are four logical candidates:

- a) 24/23, 7/3
- b) 7/3, 7/6
- c) 7/3, 2/1\*
- d) 24/23, 5/1\*

24/23, 7/3 is the direct approach to winning the prime-vs.-prime battle by hoping White never rolls a 6. Although White's hand is forced, nearly all her numbers play well. 6s escape, and everything else (except 3-3, 4-4 and 5-5) points on Black securing at least a 5-prime. The plan will only work if White fails to roll a 6 before she is forced

to crash her board. (Remember, to Black's advantage, he will be on the bar and not have to move any more checkers.) The problem is that White figures to have several chances to roll that 6, and when she does, it's virtually "game over."

7/3, 7/6 is a modified version of the same plan. Now if White rolls the 6, she will not be hitting, so Black still has a chance if he can squirm his back man out. Small numbers will complete the prime for White, but Black will not have to play 6s, so he might be able to hold the fort for an extra roll and force White to break. 5s are the worst for White. She will probably have to point on Black. Now Black will be on the bar facing White's open 2-point, so Black will have some very decent winning chances.

7/3, 2/1\* is the most natural play. Black hits loose on the ace point, which could gain him some time to escape. If White hits back, Black is in trouble. But White is still behind the prime, so Black may stumble into some kind of a playable ace point game.

In the more likely case where White flunks, Black will be able to close his board. Now he will have to escape before White can enter. He is not a favorite to do so, but he may have a few rolls to get up and over while White remains stuck on the bar. Even if Black can just get up to the 23-point by the time White enters, White will have to scramble some to complete the prime.

24/23, 5/1\* is the most unusual play. Black attempts to win by brute force. If White flunks, Black will have very decent chances, since he should be able to cover at least one of his blots next roll. Then all he has to do is shake a 6 before White can enter. However, if White enters and hits, Black is pretty much gone.

So which shall it be? Any of the four approaches could work, but I would be

inclined to make the natural play of 7/3, 2/1\*. If Black completes his closeout, most of his board will hold up for a few rolls, which may be all the time he needs. If White hits, Black will still have some winning chances in the priming battle. Any of the other plays just gives White too many rolls to "gin" the position. After 7/3, 2/1\*, it may be Black, not White, who is threatening to claim the game on a good roll.

It is often wrong to hit when involved in a priming battle. However, hitting an enemy checker off the edge of the prime will often gain time rather than lose it. By advancing the prime, Black essentially gives himself 12 pips leeway, which may be all he needs to escape.

From a thematic standpoint, the natural looking play is very often the best one. This appears to be the case with Problem #192,  $\Delta$
