
SCONYERS & GLASS WIN BIG IN COSTA RICA

With one Tournament of the Américas day remaining, Hugh Sconyers (Austin, TX) was alive in everything: Herradura, Open and Blitz. Although he didn't maintain his undefeated record, his Herradura finals victory over Reno master Wilcox Snellings, and runner-up Open finish behind L.A.'s Bob Glass netted him two beautiful exotic wood trophies and a lion's share of the five-figure prize money.

The \$10,000 added event, held 19–23 April at the Herradura Hotel in San José, Costa Rica drew sparse participation (75 total players in the main events); however there was no shortage of world-class backgammon, good times and camaraderie. Mario Madrigal and the Costa Rican BG Association organized the festive tournament for the fourth year in a row. Bill Davis directed the event, assisted by Carol Joy Cole, Peter Kalba and Dru Heggen.

Sconyers defeated Snellings 15–5 in the Herradura finals. Game 4 with Hugh (Black) leading 3–1 proved to be the pivotal game. [Recording provided by Antonio Ortega.]

RUSSELL GOES UNDEFEATED

Tops Trice Twice To Win Chicago Open

1989 World Champion Joe Russell marched undefeated through a strong national field to win the 16th Chicago Open. The tournament was held 26–29 May at the Hyatt Woodfield in Schaumberg, IL. Joann Feinstein and Howard Markowitz directed the tournament which is the longest-running in Chicagoland. Attendance jumped 15% in the main events to 124 players—the event's biggest turnout since 1983.

Joe Russell (Reno, NV) faced Boston expert Walter Trice in the 13-point finals of the undefeated bracket. Trailing 9–6, Joe rallied to tie the contest at 9–all, and then went on the win a doubled gammon sending Walter into the one-loss bracket.

Trice's 11–4 victory over Jeff Kane (on the strength of an 8-cube) set up another Russell/Trice pairing. But Joe was too strong, winning the rematch and title 13-5.

Congratulations to Maurice Barie (MI) on his 13–5 victory over Bruce Pollack (IL) in the big 74-player Intermediate division. Results: Δ

A 24 April letter written by Held and Schretlen cite irreconcilable differences as the reason for their resignation.


De Bruin will continue publishing the EBN. His first issue (No. 17) without Held and Schretlen notes their departure and wishes them luck in their future journalistic endeavors.

STOP POTS

Dear Danny: At the recent, very well attended Nordic "Wide" Open in Copenhagen, Denmark, "StopPots" were offered instead of the more usual minijackpots. Columns (1) to (4) of the following table were on public display. Column (5) is my calculation:

You enter a StopPot at any row you wish. For example, if you choose row 3, you play a 7-point match with an entry fee of 100 units. If you win, you can either stop and get back 175 units, or play another match. If you win again, you can either stop and get back 360 or play a third match with a win return of 740 units. And so on.

Column (4) shows the posted return at each level. Column (5) shows that you always get better than evens by not stopping. For example, having entered and won at row 3, you risk 175 to gain an extra 185 by not stopping.

The organizers say that StopPots cut out the wait for your next opponent, though they were so popular in Copenhagen that there were long queues to register! Tournament Director Chris Ternel told me that a computer system would speed this up next year.

StopPots seem an ingenious innovation which, for any given return to the organizers, give the players more choice. What's your opinion, Danny?—Ray Kershaw, London, England

DEAR RAY: Yes, compared to mini-jack-pots, the new "StopPots" offer more flexibility for players waiting for a slow match to finish in the Main Draw. I would imagine, however, that they might be impractical for the organizers of most tournaments.

Suppose Hy Rollah wishes to enter at Row 8 simply from his desire to gamble. (Never mind your calculation that Row 8 offers the highest rate of return.) Nobody else, however, has the \$3200 to invest in a Row 8 entry and wishes to risk it all on a single 7-point match.

The organizers can deal with Hy, of course, by apologizing, "Sorry, Hy. We can't find you an opponent for those stakes, but we'd be happy to enter you at Row 4." (No other player is willing to enter for more than \$200.)

No problem. Hy hasn't been injured.

Not so Percentage Percy. Percy, a very fine player with a tiny bankroll, gets knocked out early in the Main Draw. He enters a StopPot at Row 2, and wins five matches in a row. Nobody else, however, reaches Row 7 by winning matches, nor is anybody willing to put up \$1600 to play Percy now. (Hy Rollah isn't available, being fully occupied in a long match in the Main Draw.) Percy (as his choice to continue at every stage has demonstrated) is interested in a big prize, actually the \$6250 for winning in Row 8. Frustrated, he demands extra money from the organizers:

"I entered this StopPot intending to keep playing until I lost or won it all. In principle, I'm entitled to \$1562.50—my so-called 'equity'—not just \$1500. In practice, I'm entitled to more, for I'm by far the best player here. I figure I'm 60% to win any match. That makes my expectation even greater: \$2250, if my calculations are correct.

Actually, Percy is not the best player. William Worldbeater is. But William is busy playing Hy in the Main Draw. Nonetheless, I really don't know how I'd rule if asked to adjudicate. Mini-jackpots do not create such problems.

Why have either mini-jackpots or StopPots, however? They are no more relevant to a tournament than any other "side action" is. It means something to win a championship, be it the "Nordic Wide Open" in Denmark, the "El Cariari" at the Tournament of the Américas in Costa Rica, or a PAL ("Police Athletic League") tournament for boys and girls under 13 in the Bronx. But if you win a 3-round minijackpot, or a StopPot in which some enter at Row 2 and others at Row 6, you're not the *champion* of anything.

You may as well stick to side action, which needn't be in the form of chouettes. While waiting for your next match, you can play a 7-point (or 5-point, or 11-point, whatever time permits) match with any agreeable opponent for any mutually agreeable stake: for \$50, for \$1000, for

sport or practice. As a convenience to the players, the organizers might accept signups for \$50 7-point matches with "pot luck" draws (you don't know whether your opponent will be the player who sighed up before you or the player who will sign up next): no rake, 100% return.

StopPots are "ingenious," but only a gimmick. I expect they will thrive for a while, then fade into obscurity like other fads. But who am I to second-guess fashions? Give the public what it wants and is willing to pay for.—*Yours, Danny* Δ

last month's position

PROBLEM #213 SOLVED

by Walter Trice

23-pt. 1995 Reno Masters finals. Howard Ring (Black) leads Mike Senkiewicz (White) 8 to 6. **BLACK TO PLAY 5-2.**



Black can leave 24 shots and one blot with play (A): 18/11, or 21 shots and two blots with play (B): 18/13, 18/16. The choice is technical, and it involves gammons and the cube as well as several subvariations. We'll begin by simplifying the problem and assuming double match-point. Later we can incorporate the other factors.

Could the exposure of the second blot make White's 21 hitting numbers after play (B) as good as the 24 following play (A)? After making play (A), I wouldn't take a double in a money game if I knew in advance that I would be hit. Hits must win at least 75% of the time. On the other hand, hitting doesn't guarantee a win for White, either.

Black will be up 19 pips after playing the 5-2. He may get an immediate 5-2 or 6-2 return shot. And if he rolls a 2 before White closes the deuce point, he has racing equity. In addition, White might be later forced to hit loose on the 2-point giving Black another angle. My intuition says that a hit makes it just a bit closer to "take" than to "gin," so I'll put Black's chance of winning after being hit at 86%.

After play (B), when White hits one blot, she's a clear favorite to hit the other one as well. (If this seems surprising, you will find it easy to verify that White's five immediate double-hits plus the hit/dance/hit sequences already add up to 47% of the total.) When the two men are hit, White is a big favorite to close them both out. And even if Black anchors, his chances are quite poor. Thus it seems that the exposure of the second blot should snuff almost half of

Black's "life-after-death" vig. White's hits should win about 92% of the time after play (B).

The two plays are not equal when White misses either. Black can clean up his blots more easily after (B). 10 rolls repeat, and Black gets hit 8.9% of the time given an initial miss. Play (A) repeats with 16 numbers, assuming that White clears the 17-point when she misses. Black then gets hit 15.2% of the time. But (B) gives White better diversification between hitting and racing numbers: play (A) non-hits average nine pips and play (B) non-hits average 10. Deducting a couple of pips from Black's lead for extra wastage, we'll make him 75% in the (A) racing variations and 73% when he is missed after (B). White's winning probabilities in these variations, assuming 85% effectiveness for the second roll hits are:

(A): 0.152 x 0.85 + 0.848 x 0.25 = **34**% (B): 0.089 x 0.85 + 0.911 x 0.27 = **32**%

Combining these figures with our conclusions about the first roll hits gives us the following for White's total probability of winning:

- (A): (24/36) x 0.86 + (12/36) x 0.34 = **69**% total White wins
- (B): (21/36) x 0.92 + (15/36) x 0.32 = **67**% total White wins

Therefore Black would make play (B), minimizing immediate shots, at double match-point.

But Black will get gammoned more with play (B). To estimate the gammon factor, assume that with (B), a hit results in getting both blots closed out half the time and that 40% of these games are gammons. (Note: these assumptions involve a slight overstatement to compensate for gammon chances in "loose end" variations that we will ignore.) Play (A) hits will win gammons about 4% of the time. (The remaining outfield blot is a factor.)

White equities for the two plays with gammons incorporated are:

- A: $(24/36) \times (0.86 + 0.04 0.14) + (12/36) \times (0.34 0.66) =$ **0.40**
- B: $(21/36) \times (0.92\% + 0.20 0.08) + (15/36) \times 0.32 0.68) =$ **0.46**

These numbers indicate a clear edge to play (A) for Black at this point.

Finally, we need to consider whether the presence of a live cube affects the checker play decision. Since there is a long way to go in the match and the score is close, we can assume that the correct money play is also right here. White will, of course, be doubling after either play. Black will often redouble shortly after a miss, and (B) gives him more and better opportunities to do so.

But even after White's worst roll (3-2), she can still take a recube and at a winning probability of 68% on average, Black's equity gains from the redouble will not be enough to alter our conclusion that play (A) is correct.

However, if Black stood about four pips better in the race, the cube factor would be significant enough to make the plays equal. A still greater lead would make (B) the right play. Δ

hen annotating a backgammon match, most authors simply give their opinions about a play and their reasons for these opinions. In the newly released *Costa Rica 1993*, Antonio Ortega, Max Esquivel, and Mario Madrigal have done a lot more. They have gone through the final 1993 Tournament of the Américas Masters match between Wilcox Snellings and Mike Senkiewicz and rolled out by hand many of the controversial positions. In addition, many of the positions were given to the computer program "Expert Backgammon" to obtain roll-out data.

The authors included American expert Neil Kazaross as a special guest coauthor, and Neil provides many new insights into several key positions. Also, there is commentary by the players Snellings and Senkiewicz themselves, letting the reader see what was actually going through their minds during the match.

Costa Rica 1993 contains the most accurate and thorough match analysis I have ever seen in print. No serious student of the game should fail to get a copy of this book.—Kit Woolsey Δ




