## **DENNIS CULPEPPER**WINS 1996 ABT TITLE

Two regional victories in July and October were enough to give Dennis Culpepper Player of the Year honors in the American Backgammon Tour Points Race for 1996. Culpepper, a veteran backgammon player from Chesterfield, Virginia (he won back-to-back Eastern Opens in the late 1980s) had no points going into the 4th of July Michigan Summer Championships.

Winning the 85-player field tourney (biggest of all Tour events) gave Culpepper 31.00 points. That was good enough to lead until Dave Cardwell (Atlanta, GA) increased his total by winning the Last Chance event at the Illinois State Championships on 6 Oct.

But Cardwell's 31.30 total would lead only one week. On 13 Oct., Dennis won his second ABT event: the Nation's Capital Championships. The 25-player field generated another 10.11 points giving Dennis his final winning total of 41.11. Dave Cardwell placed second (31.30) and all-time ABT master point leader Art Benjamin (Claremont, CA) placed third (30.00). [See All-Time ABT standings on page 5.—Ed.]

1996's top three will be honored at the official American Backgammon Tour Awards Ceremony at the Pittsburgh Championships (14–16 Feb.)—the kickoff event for the 5th year of ABT competition. 1996 final standings are on page 3.  $\Delta$ 



## Hasty Plays

#### **BLAME BARCLAY**

No one accepts responsibility for their actions anymore. If people encounter problems or setbacks, it's because they're being discriminated against for their race, creed, sex, size or shape.

They may use a physical or mental disability as an excuse for failure. They may possess a drug or alcohol abuse problem which distorts their behavior. They may have fallen under the influence of a charismatic character who controls their life. The bottom line is that a person, group, or force beyond their control is directing part of their life absolving them of responsibility for their actions.

I realize now that I'm not responsible for all my "hasty plays." I found someone to blame: Barclay Cooke, backgammon author and longtime dead person. About 20 years ago, Barclay Cooke was the "advisor" to the Twin Cities Backgammon Club in Minnesota. I don't know whether he answered questions by mail or gave backgammon lectures in Minnesota or if the title "advisor" was merely honorary.

I was just learning about backgammon, and one of the club members told me to read Cooke's *Paradoxes and Probabilities* to improve my game. What I absorbed from the book was Cooke's fixation with capturing the opponent's 5-point. To Cooke, it was the most important point from which you could attack, race, or reenter if hit. I quickly became infected by Cooke's preoccupation for this 5-point, a preoccupation which has blinded me from

Kazaross proves unstoppable in Chicago Bar Point Club tourney play.


The Chicago Bar Point Club is a tough place to play. With players such as Jake Jacobs, Harry Cohn, Dean Muench, Howard Ring, Gary Kay, Joe Sylvester, Yamin Yamin and Tak Morioka playing regularly or occasionally, it probably ranks as one of the toughest weekly backgammon clubs in the world. That's what makes Neil Kazaross's accomplishment of winning his fourth club title in a row so impressive.

Kazaross took over the points lead in February and never looked back. Surprisingly, although he defeated Herb Roman, his closest competitor by over 10 points (32.64 to 21.92), Neil earned only two Player of the Month titles. This highlights the extent of his consistent play.

The An-Neil-ator finished December in strong fashion, winning 10 matches in a row. It's the fourth time he's had 10 or more straight BPC wins in the past three

years. That's also a Bar Point Club record.

Congratulations to Neil and Herb as well as Tim Mabee, Richard Lloyd, Jake Jacobs and Reggie Porter, all of whom will be invited to represent the BPC at the Illinois State Challenge Cup 2 February in Peoria, Illinois.  $\Delta$



#### "With Just 8 Pounds of Clay"

Danny Kleinman's review of the new Robin Clay book:

#### **BACKGAMMON WINNING STRATEGIES**

Backgammon Winning Strategies ©1996 by Robin Clay. Published by MacMillian Publishers, Ltd.; 25 Eccleston Place; London SW1W 9NF, England. Tel.: 0171 881 8000. Fax: 0171 881 8001. Soft cover, 244 pages. £8 sterling.

Robin Clay's new book, Backgammon Winning Strategies promises to "make a weak player victorious" [Clay's emphasis—DK] "ensuring that one can arrive at the next game confident of victory" and show the reader "how to make his own luck once backgammon probability is mastered."

This is contrary to all we know. Nobody but a dice mechanic can "make his own luck" and enter "the next game confident of victory." The outcome of a game depends on (1) the quality of your play, (2) the quality of your opponent's play, and (3) luck. Of these, you can control only (1) and "backgammon probability" can take you only a small part of the way in doing so. Counting shots, for example, may tell you that you'll get hit slightly less often if you place your blot in one place rather than another, but it won't tell you how valuable a checker on a particular point will be if it is not hit (often a decisive criterion).

Likewise the "fundamental principles" Clay teaches can take you only so far. We can almost always recognize assets and liabilities of positions, merits and drawbacks of plays. Most real problems arise when principles conflict. Which shall we do with our roll: anchor or extend our own blockade, slot or split, escape or hit? As Kit Woolsey's recent book demonstrates, even the best experts often cannot weigh accurately the merits of a play against its drawbacks (or the merits of another). Once you learn everything that Clay, Woolsey, Magriel, Cooke or I can teach you, you are on your own, with no guarantee of finding the best move in any given position.

How well does Clay teach backgammon principles? Not with the clear logic and examples of Magriel, not with the illuminating insights of Cooke, not with the keen analyses of Woolsey. Here are some of the ways I find Clay lacking.

"Set out with a plan to construct a prime," Clay advises (page 4). Priming however, is only one of several sensible


game plans, and your choice among them is often determined by which numbers you have rolled an which plays your opponent has made.

"Whenever there is a choice of which point to make," says Clay (page 6), you should follow a fixed order (5-point, 4-point, bar-point, 3-point). Nonsense! This order determines the ranking of opening rolls (3-1, 4-2, 6-1, 5-3), but after just a couple of rolls, priorities change with features of the position. even when this order is correct, it shouldn't govern your moves entirely. You must also consider issues that Clay never addresses explicitly, including:

- Which point most impedes your opponent in this position?
- Which point does your opponent threaten to make if you don't?
- Which point can you most easily make later if you don't make it now?
- Which point works best in tandem with other points and builders?
- Which point will you be willing and able to retain longest?

"In the opening stages of the game when faced with a choice of hitting a blot or making a point it is generally correct to hit," says Clay (page 13). His example is

correct (hitting with 3-1 after an opponent has slotted with an opening 2-1), but his principle is not: would you hit with a 3-1 after an opponent moves 24/16 with an opening 6-2? What he omits is well known: by hitting a *slot* your opponent threatens to cover, you do *two* good things (sending a man back *and* keeping your opponent from making a key point) instead of one (just making your 5-point).

Rather than continue through Clay's book to point out deficiencies (mainly oversimplifying and overgeneralizing), I'll focus on his whoppers:

Clay refers to "three factors" governing cube decisions ("race, position, and threat") and asks you to consider turning the cube with "at least two in your favor," taking with "at least one in your favor" (page 25), but mentions neither the usual 25% threshold for takes nor what kind of threat is significant. This is simply a threat to reduce the opponent's chances substantially below 25% by next turn, and only the player on shake can have it, not the player facing a cube to be taken or passed.

Later on (page 120), Clay offers astounding chouette advice. When the Box doubles, Clay urges Captain and Crew to beaver: not on the merits of the position, but to put "great pressure on the Box" and cause him "to make errors or ruin his position by trying to play safe." Clay urges a weak player in the Box to pass the Captain's and Crew's cubes "to avoid the risk of a big loss"—again without reference to the merits of the position.

Strangely, Clay overcomplicates some simple things. In a "Probability and Luck" chapter that gets some complex problems wrong, he lists *many* principles for positioning the last two men in bear-off races when there is a choice. I offer *one*: the better placement is that whose distance between men is closer to 2.7 (actually any fraction between 2 and 3 will do).

Clay's principles lead to errors. He says (#4) that the greater the distance between the two men, the better—except (#5) when the gap rises beyond three (that is, the distance rises beyond four). This implies erroneously that it is better to have men on the 6- and 2-points than the 5- and 3-points. Then he makes another exception, claiming (#6) that it is better to have men on the 5- and 4-points than the 6- and 3-points. Just the opposite is true (if the positions seem equivalent at first glance, try playing a 2-1).

Clay compounds his errors (page 101) by adding that the same principles which govern bearing off two men also govern bearing your last two men in to save a

gammon. to see why this is wrong, just picture a closed board, men on the 12-, 11-, and 9-points, and a 6-1 to play. Clay's rules yield 12/6, 9/8, but in fact 12/6, 11/10 is best. The superiority of 12/6, 11/10 manifests itself if you roll 3-1 next and play 10/6, risking a gammon only on 2-1 following. After 12/6, 9/8, you can do no better than 8/5, 11/10 with 3/1 next, risking a gammon not only on 2-1 but on 1-1, 3-1 and 3-2 following.

Clay cites four computer programs as aiding him in the analyses of positions in his book, including JellyFish<sup>TM</sup>, and Expert

Backgammon<sup>TM</sup>. Throughout the text, he indicates a JellyFish result or conclusion by an unequal-sign, an Expert Backgammon result or conclusion by a dagger. It would be easier on the reader if he used mnemonic abbreviations ("JF" and "EB"). I wonder why anyone having access to JellyFish would ever use the less-reliable Expert Backgammon.

I also wonder, when Clay cites a preference of either program, whether he is referring to the program's *play* or the results of *rollouts* using the program (which are more reliable than the program itself). This is in sharp con-trast to Woolsey, who commendably outlines his methodology at the start of his book.

Perhaps it is unfair for any reviewer to appraise Clay's book so soon after reading the one by Woolsey and Heinrich. Despite his mistakes, wrong principles, and failure to state sound principles where applicable, Clay does reiterate some of the things a beginner must learn to become an intermediate; and to his credit, he includes a fairly decent 100-problem guiz at the end of the book. At eight pounds sterling, the book is reasonably priced by today's standards. You'll do much better, however, to save your shillings for a down payment on New Ideas In Backgammon . . . or the re-released paperback edition of Magriel's classic Backgammon if you don't already own the hardbound.—Danny Kleinman  $\Delta$





#### THREE DECIMAL PLACES

I'm beginning work on an new backgammon book and it would be helpful to have Kit Woolsey's match equity tables to three decimal places. Could you obtain those figures for me?—Antonio Ortega, San José. Costa Rica

Kit Woolsey answers: Sorry, but there is no such animal. Keep in mind that when I constructed my match equity table, it was not an output of some exact formula which I shoved into the computer; if it were, I would have it to the three decimal places

(at least I would have something to three decimal places). In fact, my equity table was a combination of some computer analysis, some interpretation of empirical data, some assumptions I made, and some intuitive guesses on my part.

Doesn't sound very rigorous, does it? Well, I never claimed that it was, nor have I claimed that my match equity table is right even to two decimal places. I'm sure that if God were to derive the "correct" equity table, there would be plenty of errors in what I have done. The big advantage of my table is that it is practical. The figures probably aren't too far wrong, and errors we make assessing a position are likely to be far greater than any errors in the table.

I believe some people have been able to produce (via some formulas which I don't know) match equity tables which are "accurate" to three decimal places. However, the assumptions they made to construct their formulas are likely no better than the various things I did to construct my table.—K.W.  $\Delta$



seeing better options. Look at this position, one we've all experienced:

Money game. BLACK TO PLAY 4-3.



This is pretty early for a "hasty play," but I managed to pull one off. It's a great roll in which all the options are good: hit a blot or build either 5-point. I made my opponent's 5-point, but I should have hit the blot on the 9-point. Early in a game, it's best to hit and send a man back, forgoing even a valuable 5-point. Backgammon is essentially a racing game, and hitting puts you in the lead. When my "misplay" was pointed out, I felt bad, but I sleep better now knowing that it's not my fault. Barclay Cooke and his book—that's who to blame. Δ



#### PROBLEM #230 ANALYZED

by Kit Woolsey

Match to 7 points. Black leads White, 1 to 0. White is holding a 4-cube. **BLACK TO PLAY 2-2.** 



Black is faced with a treacherous position. The race is far from being a claim, so it may be important for Black to delay or contain White's back checker. On the other hand, that checker represents a potential threat.

White's board is very strong, so Black cannot afford to be hit. This 2-2 roll leaves Black several options.

The straightforward play is to simply make the 6-point. This certainly can't be bad. The 6-point is helpful both for bringing the rest of the checkers in safely and for containing White's back checker. If White is unable to flee the back checker to safety, she will probably be forced to break the midpoint, and Black can now either attack or start to clear the midpoint—whichever the dice dictate.

Another plan involves clearing the midpoint now and trying to run home safely. Both 13/11(2), 10/8(2) and 13/9(2) are possible. There probably isn't much difference between these plays. Making the 9-point is a bit better for containment purposes, so it is probably the superior of the two. This approach might be reasonable if White had three men on the midpoint. As it is, White is getting ready to clear the midpoint herself, so these plays take some of the pressure off White. Making the 6-point and retaining the pressure on White's midpoint looks to be better.

What about the attacking plays? Putting White on the bar certainly has its advantages. If White flunks, Black gains heavily in the race, and he can afford to leave a blot in the outfield next turn since it will only

be an indirect shot. If White enters, Black's position may be a bit ragged.

Shifting points is good for a safer future. However Black would, for the most part, be forced to play 13/11 with the fourth deuce, and those indirect shots cost too much. If Black is going to hit, his plan is to rush his men home safely. Thus, 13/11(2), 5/3\*, 3/1 looks to be better than 10/8(2), 5/3\*, 3/1.

So, our two main choices appear to be 10/6(2), and 13/11(2), 5/3\*, 3/1. Purity vs. tactics. Always a difficult problem. Making the 6-point sure looks nice. Still, the gains from hitting are pretty big. The race is close enough that putting White on the bar can lead to great gains. If White flunks, Black is in excellent shape to barrel home with reasonable safety. If White enters with a 6, Black will have plenty of pick-andpass numbers. And if White enters with a 3, Black can clear his outfield points and only leave indirect shots. There will be some danger, but Black wouldn't have a free ride home after making the 6-point either. It's a close choice, but I would go with 13/11(2), 5/3\*, 3/1.

There is no hard and fast rule which will solve this sort of problem. However, when you have a chance to put an opponent on the bar against a four point board, it is often correct to do so. She flunks almost half the time, and the gains when this happens can easily outweigh the losses when she enters.  $\Delta$

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
