#### STEVE MELLEN IS BAR POINT CLUB'S PLAYER OF THE YEAR Kazaross's Streak Ends

Nothing lasts forever. After a five-year run as the Chicago Bar Point Club "top dog," Neil Kazaross has been dethroned by our 1998 Player of the Year Steve Mellen.

Mellen, a 28-year-old commercial litigation lawyer, played less than a year of tourney backgammon at the Flint (MI) club before moving to Chicago in mid-1997. Starting slowly in Chicago, Steve still managed to finish December in 18th place.

What a difference a year makes. In 1998, Steve lead the points race every month of the year equaling Tak Morioka's 1991 feat.

Mellen displayed great poise and determination in his 1998 victory. "In January, I made a commitment to improve

motivation and dedication in winning the 1998 American Backgammon Tour. 17 tournaments from across the country made up this year's tour. Alex earned 41.70 points for the following finishes: Thousand Islands (1st), Indiana Open (2nd), Minnesota State (1st), Nation's Capital (2nd). That was enough to hold off New Jersey

my game," said Mellen. "I'm proud of my accomplishment."

Steve rates the pinnacle of his Bar Point Club year as his 13 October victory over

player Perry Gartner (34.44), and Michigan's Maurice Barie (27.73) who finished 2nd and 3rd respectively.

Caraplis, a 33-year-old chiropractor from West Paterson, NJ, is serious about the game. From 1994 to mid-1997, Alex gave up tournament play to study. "I read everything I could, put a lot of time in on "Matchqiz," worked with JellyFish<sup>TM</sup>, and hundreds of positional rollouts. It really made a difference."

Following the 4-year hiatus, Caraplis won his return event (1000 Islands in August, 1997). He went on to finish 7th for the '97 ABT season.

Alex's dad introduced him to the game when he was just a kid. "My father was of Greek descent and played a Middle Eastern style: good checker play, but no cube knowledge."

How does Alex feel about his impressive result? "I wanted to prove to myself that I could do this. A lot of people talk the talk; I wanted to walk the walk.

"The ABT gives backgammon direction. It's something to work for. I played every ABT event since August of last year. World Cup champ Howard Ring. "I had been on a two month losing streak and was only 0.32 points ahead of Joe Wollick at the time. I faced Howard in the finals and gave him my 'A' game. That win seemed to energize me for the last three months."

No doubt. Steve finished the year in a blaze of glory, winning December Player of the Month via an 11 match win streak his second 1000-to-1 Club achievement of 1998. Hats off to Steve Mellen for a job well done.

**C**ONGRATULATIONS ALSO to Joe Wollick, Tak Morioka, Neil Kazaross, Laila Leonhardt and Herb Roman for earning spots on the CBPC Illinois State Challenge Cup team (to be played 7 February in Springfield, IL). The Top-20 players will be honored at Awards Night 5 January at the Golden Flame.

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#### **CONSISTENCY IN RULINGS**

This is written in response to Jake Jacobs' commentary in the November 1998 issue of CHICAGO POINT. Being an advocate of much greater depth for backgammon tournament rules, I would have to be on the side of the "punishers."

Many years ago, I had an editorial asking for members of the backgammon community to send suggestions, and possible amendments, or recommendations for rule changes to me. I received only one response, and that was from a European organizer stating that I "did not have the authority" to make such a request. That is a different issue. Although, we are talking about bearoffs in noncontact positions, I am more interested in *ruling consistency* rather then the rulings themselves.

Some years ago, a position arose where White was on roll with three checkers the

ace point against Black who had a checker on the trey point and a checker on the ace point. White rolled a non-double and Black rolled a 2-1. Black then requested a ruling because the White side neglected to bear off any checkers following his non-double.


Doesn't this constitute an illegal play? What is the difference if one has touched the checkers or not? It is still a forced move situation. In chess parlance, this is known as zugzwang, which is the compulsion to make a move regardless of the setup.


Indeed, the Snowie<sup>™</sup> backgammon program will bear off checkers automatically in a forced move situation. It so indicates on screen by stating "Forced Move" in a rectangular box.

In my example, the ruling went in Black's favor-White still had three checkers on the 1-point. If zugzwang had been in effect, there would be no question how this ruling would have resulted: those checkers for White would have been borne off, pure and simple. That's also true for the one Jake described. There would be no "shades of gray" as to whether or not they had been touched, nudged, shifted, etc. Of course in my example, Black would not be a happy camper.

In Jake's scenario, White ended up getting a pass from his opponent (only to be punished by Lady Luck). In my example, White was punished yet both positions were similar in that they were both "forced






#### SAILORS TAKE WARNING

**D** ear Danny: Here is a strange position from a chouette in which I was captain of the ship with three rather outspoken sailors.

#### Money game. BLACK TO PLAY 6-6.



The first 6 is pretty easy. Unless we hit, we face being primed, and the race is rather poor as well. The main question was how many of the blots to cover on our 1-, 2-, and 3-points. (The less said about how this position was reached—I did mention the rather mutinous crew—the better!)

After listening to the troops argue for awhile, I covered all three points. White rolled 5-5, giving him quite a race lead. As uninteresting as the outcome was (I simply outrolled White ending with a set of doubles to win the race on the last roll), I would be curious as to your analysis of the position.—Steve Robinson, Langhorne, PA

**DEAR STEVE:** What shall we do with the drunken sailors?

That is the toughest question raised by your letter, for it is clear that those who argued with your play must have been three sails to the wind. The second toughest question is why the Box hadn't doubled with the strong position he undoubtedly had before his last roll. The third toughest question is, "Why quarrel with success?" (You did win the game, after all, being only five pips behind even after your opponent's double-5s.)

Now for the easy question: your play of the double-6s.

It is almost axiomatic to cover inside blots when your opponent is on the bar. There are exceptions, of course: when playing a back game and needing to improve your timing, when trying to pick up an extra man after hitting a blot during your opponent's bearoff, when playing a priming game and needing to keep a strong prime.

Here none of the exceptions apply. Though you could over none of your blots and keep your 4-prime with 24/18\*, 18/6, 12/6, that 4-prime means nothing if White hits any of your blots, for (barring reentry and escape with 6-1) you won't be able to take the cube that will surely be coming next. Covering no blots is out.

How about covering only one or two? That is hardly better than covering none, even though it leaves fewer shots, for it breaks your 4-prime. There is little to be gained by keeping a 3-prime or broken 4prime here.

Just look at your opponent's board. Can it possibly be right to leave extra shots when your opponent has his five best inside points and you have multiple blots? Absolutely not.

Though the prospect of an untakable cube focuses the issue here, covering all three inside blots would be right even if White had doubled earlier and you already owned the cube. Making all three points creates 16 dancing rolls for White and gives him only 11 combination shots. Making only two points (obviously the most important are your 3- and 2-points) creates only nine dancing rolls and gives White from five to seven combination shots in addition to 11 direct.

The extra dancing rolls are important; they give you another roll in which to clean up your blots, and perhaps even make the 4-point (seven numbers work).

With the cube already turned, leaving unnecessary shots would be the short road to gammon.

Oh, I just got a call from Stan, the gifted guitarist who accompanies me when I sing lead vocals in public performances. He tells me that the best answer to the toughest question raised by your letter is, "Lock 'em in a cabin with the Captain's daughter."—Yours, Danny  $\Delta$







Is that what makes us women the "inferior" players? Or is it that the female mind has less capability of comprehending playing strategy, mathematics or just plain logic?

Men always have, and always will fear losing to a woman—most of all, to a superior woman. For male BG players, it's something in their *prime*-all instinct that allows their ego to get hurt by losing to a "fragile being."

True, there aren't many women playing high-level, competitive backgammon. But this is not a factor of intelligence, as many men like to think. Most women are by nature, less interested in competitive games; they don't have huge egos that need constant feeding. Therefore women in the

I would patiently wait until the games thinned out. Then they didn't have an option. They would have to let me play or close the table.

In backgammon, I have never actually being barred from entering a chouette because of my sex, but there have been many frowns directed my way. How do you change someone's mindset?

On an individual basis, when I see new women players at tournaments, I try to make them feel welcome by offering encouragement and playing advice in an effort to boost their egos. My desire is to awaken their self-confidence so that they are more likely to come back—win or lose.

Should there be separate prizes and/or jackpots for women in backgammon? (e.g.: lady's prizes for those advancing furthest in their division, or women-only events.) Viewed from a narrow perspective, it could be interpreted as sexism. But with the world of backgammon as male-dominated as it is, these actions place the public eye on a group of players who really can benefit by extra motivation and more self-esteem.

A few events specifically set up for women-only is a way to build interest among the female players (and male players, for that matter), to help them gain more confidence, and who knows, one day to be thought of by both sexes as a respected *master player*.

Let's focus the spotlight on all women backgammon players in 1999. Let them feel welcome and give them the respect that they deserve.



#### MYSTERY SURROUNDS MICHAEL VALENTINE'S DEATH

Las Vegan Michael Valentine, original owner of the New York Ace Point Club, is dead. The 75-year-old died from a gunshot wound to the head on 8 December. However, there was no gun found in the apartment, and police Lt. Wayne Petersen believes that Valentine's death was probably an assisted suicide.

Valentine, who as a young man sneaked out of his native Bulgaria after repeated run-ins with Russian solders who had taken over the country at the end of World War II, worked for years as a management consultant until 1988.

Then he started the successful Ace Point Backgammon Club in New York, which was taken over by Alan and Lourdes Steffen when Valentine moved to Las Vegas in 1997 due to failing health. Neighbors and police said he suffered from advanced emphysema, and in

r e c e n t months his condition became so severe that he had to rely on the help of neighbors to complete r o u t i n e tasks.

In January 1998, Valentine o p e n e d "The Oasis of Las Vegas," The game club

failed miserably, and friends said that devastated Valentine.

But there is another twist to the story. According to American Chess Association's Tom Klem, "Valentine had recently made business commitments to guarantee \$15,000 of the American Chess Association's \$21,000 US Summer Open, to be held in Laughlin, Nevada August 10, 1999. The only serious business competitor to the ACA is the United States Chess Federation.


Klem continues, "On the same day that Valentine may have been murdered, officials of the Nevada State Chess Association were informed by the principal of St. Joseph's Elementary School that individuals had threatened her in an attempt to prevent the school from hosting the ACA-sanctioned 1999 Nevada State Scholastic Middle School Chess Championship to be held there on Feb. 27, 1999." The school refused to accede to these threats.

A resolution to subtitle the 1999 US Summer Open as the "Michael Valentine Memorial" has been received by NSCA for consideration at January board meeting.  $\Delta$

Match to 7 points. No score. BLACK TO PLAY 2-2.



Double-deuces again. So many choices. Black can hit, with either 24/18\*/16 or 24/18\*, 24/22. The latter is probably a bit better since it keeps all his checkers in communication. Non-hitting plays involve making the defensive 5-point, making the bar point with 24/22, 13/7, or even making the 4-point with 8/4, 6/4, 24/22. How can we decide between all these choices?

The plays which make offensive points

just leave White too many good things. 4s and 2s to hit, and a lot of other numbers which make the bar point or a good inner board point. In addition, Black risks getting the worst of a priming battle, with his own ace point made and at least two checkers stuck behind White's growing prime. These just can't be right.

Making the defensive 5-point is more reasonable. Black will be able to hold that point for quite a while, so White can't do too much damage. In addition, having the advanced anchor guards against a priming battle, so Black's offensive ace point will be more of an asset than a liability.

Still, making the 5-point pretty much assures taking the worst of it. White has a lot of hitting numbers, and these hits will leave Black well behind in the race. Black will probably wind up with a decent holding game, but will still be at a considerable disadvantage.

Now let's look at the hitting plays. Hitting has a lot of advantages:

1. Hitting puts White on the bar. This means that White can't use her full roll to best advantage, since she must use half of it to enter. So unless White rolls doubles, she won't be able to make any new offensive points. Also, there is always the possibility that White will flunk against the two-point board, which would be great for Black.

- 2. Hitting gains in the race. While the race may not be everything, the basics of backgammon are that the first player to take all his checkers off wins. Therefore you must at some point get ahead in the race in order to win.
- 3. Hitting halts White's offense. Unmolested, White is well-placed to make a new offensive point, either the bar point which is slotted, or a good inside point. Hitting rips away a vital builder.
- 4. Hitting starts getting Black's back checkers moving with relative safety. Black would like to make an advanced anchor and possibly move into a favorable mutual holding game.
- 5. Hitting sends another White checker back. Right now White has only one back checker, and this checker may be difficult to contain. It is much easier to contain two checkers.

It is true that the hitting play leaves a lot of blots and return shots. However, Black shouldn't mind that too much. It is Black who has the stronger inner board, so he should welcome a blot-hitting contest. It really isn't a close decision. Hitting is by far the best approach. I would choose 24/ 18\*, 24/22.

It is often said that in the early stages of the game, when in doubt hit. There are exceptions, of course, but it is a fine guide-line. This position is no exception.  $\Delta$
