

JÖRGEN GRANSTEDT WINS 2001 WORLD TITLE

Sallamzy edges Bagai in Super Jackpot by Harald Johanni

Sweden's Jörgen Granstedt joined the ranks of Bill Robertie (USA) and Michael Meyburg (Germany) by winning the Monte-Carlo World Backgammon Championship for a second time. A record attendance of 288 international players converged on the Grand Hotel in Monaco 9–15 July for a shot at backgammon fame and glory. Once again, James Ballié of Switzerland directed.

The number of players who attempt to win the Monte Carlo event is growing every year. Nevertheless, the two competitors paired against one-another in this year's 26th annual finals looked familiar: 2000 finalist Thomas Holm vs. 1999 champion Jörgen Granstedt.

In the semifinals, Thomas Holm of Denmark beat his fellow countryman, Morten Holm by 23–15 and Jörgen Granstedt defeated the German editor of *Backgammon Today*, Mario Kühl 23–18. According to Snowie's analyses, each

match paired two players of equal skill with the Swedish-German duel played at a higher caliber.


Granstedt and Holm met on Sunday, 15 July in the Salon Lacoste. As usual, the 25-point finals was shown on closed-circuit television with Paul Magriel providing commentary in his incomparable way.

In order to better understand the reasons for Jörgen Granstedt's recent success, take a look at these two interesting cube decisions:

Pos. 1. 25-point match. Granstedt (Black) leads Holm (White) 10–2. Black owns a 2-cube. BLACK ON ROLL. RECUBE ACTION(S)? [See Pos. 1 at right.]

Leading 10–2, not many top players would redouble this position. In fact, it is only marginally correct in money game play. Black has only a 2-point board and White can win the race even after being hit by anchoring in Black's home board.



However, if Black dances, things really get interesting when White redoubles to 8. A third of his wins are gammons.





BACKGAMMON WITH THE GIANTS NEIL KAZAROSS

Neil's insightful comments enhance the latest Ortega/Kleinman effort



Backgammon With The Giants: Neil Kazaross © 2001 by Antonio Ortega & Danny Kleinman. Published by the authors. Soft cover, spiral bound, 223 pages. Price: \$40 plus shipping. Available from Backgammon à la Carte (Carol Joy Cole), 810/232-9731 — cjc@tir.com.



Antonio Ortega and Danny Kleinman try to do a lot in Backgammon with the Giants: Neil Kazaross. Like their previous installment featuring Jerry Grandell, they annotate three matches against a variety of opponents.

This edition includes matches featuring Neil Kazaross vs. European expert Francois Tardieu, longtime champion Malcolm Davis, and New York player Charlie Russell. The diversity of opponents is a plus as it allows the authors to show how Neil handles different types of players.



The format is nearly identical with the "Grandell" book, as it shows clear diagrams of a position followed by authors comments and finally an equity chart showing whether the cube action or checker play was executed correctly over the board.


The icing on the cake are Neil Kazaross's comments. He takes you inside


his thought process and emotions. This valuable insight alone is worth the price of the book. Neil speaks about how he attempts to capitalize on his opponent's aggressiveness or timidity and honestly reflects on his own errors, be they tactical, strategic, or mental.

It's true that Ortega/Kleinman try to do a lot, and for the most part, they succeed. However, there are a few instances in which they advocate a play as "best" when it is either an error or equivalent with one or more choices.

I'm not sure who the target market is for this book, but the authors are in the difficult position of educating some without boring others. An example of this is that the diagrams at the top of pages 60 and 61, which advocate not doubling at two-away vs. many-away when two-away has any reasonable gammon chances. This is obvious enough to all but the most uninitiated that a single example would have been more than enough.

The two positions from pages 60 and 61. 15-point match. Black leads White 13–3 and is too good to double in each case. Analyzing both positions is repetitive.






A final criticism is that in both editions, the "expert" wins all his matches. To best learn from a world-class player's expertise, we should study them in all types of match situations including losing ones. If we only see the experts win their matches, how can we learn from them if they rarely struggle with tough decisions resulting from bad dice; and positions and match scores that result in inevitable losses for all backgammon players?

All in all, the analysis is concise and organized, mostly accurate and educational. I look forward to the next Ortega/ Kleinman "Backgammon with the Giants," and if our "expert" doesn't lose at least one of his or her three matches (a more than fair ratio for even the best players), look for "Steve Sax's Least Important Matches" at a Barnes and Noble near you.— $Steve Sax \Delta$





Longtime Chicagoland backgammon player Henry Schwartz died 20 April 2001 in Pompano Beach, Florida. He was 87.




HENRY SCHWARTZ 1913–2001 (1999 photo taken at his home in Florida)

A KAZAROSS KIND OF WEEKEND


Neil wins Indy Open, 2nd in Masters

The An-Neil-ator is back . . . in a big way. Although his job has kept him busy and off the circuit for a few years, Neil Kazaross (Chicago) returned to ABT tournament competition winning the 49th Indiana Open. Hoosier Club directors Butch & Mary Ann Meese staged the Swiss movement format at the beautiful Sheraton Hotel over the Labor Day weekend (31 Aug.–3 Sep.). An impressive crowd of 143 players attended, many of whom enjoyed a Friday afternoon seminar by Bill Robertie.

Neil's 6-2 record in the Swiss format qualified him (along with 11 other players) for Open playoffs where he eventually met Jeremy Bagai (*Classic Backgammon Revisited* author) in the semifinals. With Jeremy leading 8–6, it looked like a gammon win in a racing position would put him over the top. But Neil had other ideas, tossing multiple large sets to save the G. In the next game, Jeremy took command and in the following position, again appeared ready to claim victory:

11-point semifinal. Jeremy Bagai (Black) leads Neil Kazaross (White) 10–6 Crawford. **BLACK TO PLAY 4-1:**

Bagai kept things even on the back points by playing 5/1, 5/4. With Black on the bar, 5/off seems slightly better yielding fewer subsequent shots and more ways to make the 2-point.

Kazaross danced and Bagai rolled 3-2 moving 4/1, 3/1. (Neil later said he would probably have left a voluntary blot with 5/2, 4/2.) An eventual shot developed which Neil hit. With skilled play and good fortune,


he was eventually able to close Jeremy out and win the incredible game.

Brutally denied victory two games in a row seemed to take the wind out of Bagai's sails. Neil continued his rally, winning the match 11–10.

In the finals, Kazaross faced Chuck Stimming, a perennial top 10 finisher at the Hoosier Backgammon Club. Chuck had edged Chicago's Mary Franks to reach the finals. Although a big favorite over Stimming, Kazaross didn't take him for granted. Leading 7–3 in their 13-point finals, Neil had this interesting doubling decision and follow-up play:

13-point final. Neil Kazaross (Black) leads Chuck Stimming (White) 7–3. Black on shake. **CUBE ACTION(S)?** After double/take, **BLACK TO PLAY 6-4.**

Neil doubled. According to Jake Jacobs, it's a powerful double. Neil has a lead against a weaker opponent. Many experts would take a shake, but Neil opted for increasing the stakes now. Chuck correctly accepted and Neil rolled 6-4. After a thoughtful study, Neil pointed on Chuck's ace-blot (7/1*, 5/1) and volatile action ensued with the cube eventually reaching 16! In the final bearoff, Chuck needed two sets to win. He rolled one of them, but Neil closed the door with a set of his own.

NEIL KAZAROSS failed in his bid for a sweep of the two major events losing 13–2 to David Hochron (CA), in the Indy 300 Masters, but it was still a great weekend. The Open win moves him to within two points of Art Benjamin in the All-Time ABT master point leadership. And two other people also were thrilled with Neil's win: Antonio Orgeta and Danny Kleinman. Their brand new book, *Backgammon with the Giants: Neil Kazaross* couldn't ask for better publicity.

T wo of the articles that caught my eye this week involved airports. One said that O'Hare (from my perspective, the "home team") had reclaimed its title "World's Busiest Airport" from perennial challenger Atlanta/Hartsfield. Some might argue that "World's Most Pleasant and efficient Airport" would be a more worthy goal, but they don't five out titles for that, so each is striving for what is in reach.

The second article concerned Malaysia's main airport in Kuala Lumpur. It seems that prostitutes are infesting KLIA, greeting arrivals, and whisking them off to short-time hotels. The government is against this. Perhaps it takes business away from the shuttle busses? At the end of the article, in what was, I think, not intended to be ironic juxtaposition,k it was noted that tourism in Malaysia is up 445 this year. If either O'Hare or Hartsfield, is really interested in keeping the lead, I have a suggestion for them . . .

Of course, I might not have paid attention to the article on Atlanta/Hartsfield (I would still have paid attention to Malaysia and it's unofficial greeters) were it not for the fact that I was flying out of there, on the way back from the Georgia Championships (Aug. 9–12 at the Atlanta Hilton). And since I have nearly exhausted my fund of fresh airport lore, I think I'll talk about them.

You readers, by the way, are quite lucky. I was planning, with a witty combination of name of the Masters' event, and a nod to the use of chess clocks in several events, to title this article, "The Peach Pit and the Pendulum." Then director Dave Cardwell told me a story, and so I used the above title. From the title, you might guess that a ghost story is coming, and you would be right. So send the kiddies to bed, bolt the doors and keep your guard dog close. I'm about to spin a tale, just as it has been handed down in Georgia lore these many years.

13 years, to be exact. 13 years ago, in the great state of Georgia, there lived a group of backgammon-playing friends. Now these were all paragons, possessed of great potential, not only as players, but as people. Of all the young stars, the most luminescent was a man named Frank Blades. Frank was, in the timeworn phrase, "universally beloved." A brilliant surgeon, he chose to sacrifice the big money that might have been his, and opened his practice back home in southern Georgia. In doing so, Frank was a happy and fulfilled man.

In 1988 (13 years ago, for those not up to the math), Frank was invited to be best man at his friend Matt's wedding. After the rehearsal, the friends spent the night chouetting. Near morning, Frank announced that he had to fly home. "Don't do it," his friends pleaded. "It's foggy out."

But Frank had an early surgery scheduled and his patient needed him. Coming in for a landing at his small local field, piloting his private plane through the fog, Frank hit the control tower and did not survive the crash. Since then, the Georgia Open has been known as the Frank Blades Memorial Tournament. Since then, they say, Frank has haunted the event.

I know what you're thinking. The event is held in Atlanta, Sure, down in the swamps they have haints, and geechy women, and all manner of weirdness. Why, the ectoplasm is so thick down there they have to hack through it with machetes on their way to the general store. But ghosts in suburban Dunwoody? In the "New South"? There can't be ghosts; Jane Fonda lives there!

Well I say, "Why not?" As long as Frank brings his credit card, I'm sure the Hilton will let him in.

One of the friends of Frank's that I mentioned without so far naming, was a young lawyer named Jim Hall. Since the accident, Jim has given up backgammon. Except that every year, if possible, he attends one tournament and tries to win the Frank Blades Memorial trophy in honor of his departed friend. This year Jim was scheduled to try a murder case at the time of the tournament. At the last minute, a plea bargain was entered and Jim came up from Valdosta for the tournament. Unfortunately, the event was full. Knowing how much it meant to Jim, Dave Cardwell asked around and found a player willing to drop down to the Advanced bracket. Two days later, Jim was in the finals, and that is where I found myself as part of the story.

Having not lost a match, I was in the enviable position of only needing one win to Jim's two. Two hours after we began the first of our 13-point matches, my position was not quite as enviable. I lost 13–4, but the score is deceptive. It wasn't that close. Put it this way: if Jim's dice were a cat, then I was the squeaky toy it was playing with.


The next match, Jim again grabbed a big lead, going up 7–2. I won a few points, but then he again pulled ahead 10–6. I won three more points to trail 9–10. Meanwhile, the spectators, who know about Frank, noted an ominous fact. Night had fallen, and a storm had brewed. Brewed, and boiled right out of the teapot! Every time I narrowed the gap, lightning flashed outside the windows, thunder rattled the panes, and torrents of water drummed angrily on the roof.

Nine points was as high as I reached. As Jim won three more, and with it, the match, the storm subsided. By the time he was posing for pictures, holding the Frank Blades trophy high and proud, if it hadn't been 10:00 at night, I swear the sun would have come out from behind the clouds. Only when we were en route to a bar afterwards did it resume drizzling on us, just to show who was boss. It was in that bar, over beers, that Dave explained about Frank's ghost.

To which I say, "Poppycock!" I have three problems with crediting Frank Blades with my loss. First, it isn't fair to Frank. I mean, it's been 13 years. Any self-respecting spirit intending to help his friend could have won it for him the first year. Two years, if he needed a practice throw.

Second, it's not fair to me.

I was the one who decided to play 10/1* instead of making my barpoint because I wanted to "make something happen." Frank had nothing to do with that.

Lastly, it isn't fair to Jim. I mean, Frank has been lolling around in heaven drinking mint juleps all these years, and heaven is supposed to be a pretty nice place, if you



The scenario after a redouble is too tough for me. Jörgen Granstedt is tougher. He redoubled . . . Holm passed.

The other situation was in game 20:

Pos. 2. 25-point match. Granstedt (Black) leads Holm (White) 21-12. BLACK ON ROLL. CUBE ACTION(S)?



Jörgen Granstedt doubled this position. It's a cube that not many experts would offer. By owning the 24-point anchor, White has almost a 30% chance to win. Black's big advantage is that his gammon-winning chances are higher than White's game-winning chances. However, White will negate the gammon threat by redoubling to 4. Therefore, Black shouldn't double (in theory, marginal).

Jörgen Granstedt didn't worry about a recube to 4. He doubled. Again, Granstedt read his opponent correctly. Holm passed the double.

In the end, it could be said that Holm refused to take the tough cubes and quietly lost by 25–16.

One month after his big win, Jörgen Granstedt told me: "I'm pretty sure that my game was stronger when I won 1999, compared to this year. Two years ago I decided to try to raise my game level and worked two to three hours a day. I really tried to understand the cube action and checker plays at different match scores. It all paid off, I think I played on a very high level that year.

"The last year I didn't play much at all. Before Paris in February, I entered only one tournament in nine months. I think it's impossible to stay away from backgammon for a long time without losing sharpness.

"My error rate is higher now compared to 1999—but my joker rate is higher! For sure skill is an important factor in back-

gammon, but luck also plays a large part. The dice I had this year in Monte-Carlo were amazing. I have to keep up with the hard work to keep my game sharp, because I can't expect to have such good dice in the future."

Humble words of a great player.

But now the facts: Jörgen Granstedt's error rate wasn't higher than in 1999. Additionally the Swede improved his skill in playing humans! No computer program is able to learn from the opponent's errors. Top players like Jörgen Granstedt do! The Swede finds his opponents' weaknesses, reads their emotions and profits from this information. Jörgen recognized Holm's conservative, money game-oriented cube handling and tailored his doubling strategy accordingly. This is the one way for humans to achieve a better tournament performance than computer programs.

The \$100,000 Super Jackpot Finals


In the other top event of the World Back-gammon Championship 128 players paid \$1500 to get into the biggest Super Jackpot field ever. The discussion about using chess clocks at backgammon tournaments arose, when in the 13-point round-of-16, the first game needed more than one hour to complete! At this point, Jerry Grandell insisted on a chess clock and got one. With both players on the clock, the entire match was completed in less time than it had taken to play the opening game.

Many players voted to use clocks. However, I didn't see any players using them except Grandell in the aforementioned match. So it came as no surprise that the Super Jackpot finals were not completed until 3 a.m. Monday morning.

The 13-point match between Jeremy Bagai (USA) and Najib Sallamzy (Germany) was more exciting than the main final as it went down to one double matchpoint game to see who would win \$100,000.

Bagai, the author of *Classic Backgammon Revisited*, trailed the race by 17 pips (114–97) and was on roll. [See above right.]

Pos. 3. 13-point Super Jackpot finals. Jeremy Bagai (Black) vs. Najib Sallamzy (White). Double match-point. **BLACK TO PLAY 5-2.**



With one eye on Najib's five point board, Jeremy played the passive 8/3, 8/6. Not hitting on the 4-point (6/4*, 8/3) cost him almost 8% game-winning chances. Even in a money game, the hit right. At DMP, gammons don't count. Therefore 6/4*, 8/3 is clearly the best play. Najib Sallamzy punished the man from the States by rolling 5-5 and easily won the race.

Gammon Village Is a Roll Ahead

Some players won trophies, some won a lot of money, but the top performance at Monte Carlo came from Canadian Michael Strato, the editor of Gammon Village (www.gammonvillage.com). Each day, Strato worked hard to finish the daily reports for the backgammon community and then post them on the Internet. Strato either recorded, or paid to have recorded, the most important matches of the week. Then he made them available on the net the following day (or earlier) and provided website visitors with a special "Match Viewer" for replaying the matches. Well done, Michael!

All in all, year by year, the World Championships get more attractive. See you next year.—Harald Johanni Δ


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



PROBLEM #274 ANALYZED

Tournament double match-point. **BLACK TO PLAY 4-1.**



Our game plan is very easy to see. It is as follows:

- 1) Get a shot.
- 2) Hit the shot.
- 3) Contain the hit checker.
- 4) Win the race.

That part was easy. Now, all we have to do is carry it out.

There are three ways we can position

our back checkers. We can leave them where they are, we can make White's 6-point, or we can run the lead checker. We shall first find the best way to follow each of these themes, and then we will examine the three candidates.

If we choose to leave the back checkers alone, I believe the best way to do so is the odd looking 5/1, 2/1. Normally, such a play would be absolutely repulsive. Here, however, it fits in with our game plan. We don't need to complete our home board and close out a checker. We merely need to hit a checker and detain it. If we break our 6-point, White merely needs to enter with a 6 to be on her way. However after 5/1, 2/1, White needs both to enter and then roll a 5 or a 6.

If we make the 19-point, we might as well play 6/2 with the 4. We can't expect to make the 2-point if we play 5-1, and we don't want to leave the blot sitting there to be hit. It is better to leave no gaps, so we can lift from the 6-point if we hit next turn.

Running from the 19-point is another story. Now we do have hopes of making the 2-point, so we should leave the blot alone. 19/14 looks best.

So, our candidates are narrowed down to:

- a) 5/1, 2/1;
- b) 20/19, 6/2; and
- c) 19/14.

Now we have to dig in and do the dirty work: count shot numbers. For simplicity

we will worry only about direct shots—the indirect shots are a minor consideration.

If we play 5/1, 2/1, White leaves a direct shot on: 6-1, 6-2, 6-3, 6-4, 5-1, 5-2, and 5-4. That's 14 numbers. However 6-1, 6-2, 5-1, and 5-2 leave double shots. We can (almost) count them as double—counting 7 out of the 8 gets us up to the equivalent of 21 shot numbers.

If we play 20/19, 6/2, White leaves a direct shot on: 6-1, 6-2, 6-3, 5-1, 5-2, 5-3, 4-1, 4-2, and 4-3, which comes to 18 shot numbers.

If we play 19/14, White leaves a direct shot on 6-1, 6-2, 6-3, 6-4, 5-1, 5-2, 5-3, and 5-4, which comes to 16 shot numbers.

20/19, 6/2 is clearly inferior to 5/1, 2/1. Not only does it get us fewer shot numbers, but it also gives up the blocking 6-point.

19/14 has two things going for it. It is better for the race, and it keeps open the possibility of making the 2-point. However, these are minor considerations compared to the extra shot numbers. We are very unlikely to win the race without hitting a shot, and we don't need to make the 2-point to win the game if we do hit a shot. 21 shot numbers vs. 16 shot numbers is quite significant. The ugly play of 5/1, 2/1 is the winner.

This problem shows the importance of forming the right game plan and sticking with it. Get a shot, hit the shot, contain the checker, and run home to win—that's the game plan. 5/1, 2/1 is the play which follows that game plan.—*Kit Woolsey*. Δ




