### ILLINOIS TITLE TO SCHILLER

Sam Pottle Wins Land of Lincoln Masters Springfield Open to Mark Kaye


on Schiller of Bloomington, Illinois can't drive a car. He's legally blind. In good lighting, Don is barely able to read 5/8" dice. Yet it was his opponent's oversight that became the deciding factor in the 2001 Illinois State Championships.

This year's Land of Lincoln joust, held 19–21 October in Springfield (the Illinois capitol) saw main event attendance double from 35 in 2000 to 69 in 2001. Comfortable playing conditions at the Springfield Hilton, coupled with midwest hospitality and a competent tournament staff led by Sangamon Valley Club director Randy Armstrong is the reason.

Don Schiller, a systems analyst for State Farm Insurance, was playing in only his second regional event. Conversely, his opponent in the Sunday finals, Curtis Lucas of Arlington, Texas had plenty of International experience. The 70-year-old retired aircraft engineer, won recent Intermediate titles at the Las Vegas Open (1st Main—Dec. 2000), the Paris Open (1st Cons.—Feb. 2001), and the Czech Open (1st Main—Jul. 2001).

The 15-point match started as a walkover as Schiller rolled to a 7–0 lead. But Lucas fought back, and trailing 6–7, had an interesting play to make:

Pos. 1. 15point finals. Don Schiller (Black) leads Curtis Lucas (White) 7-6. WHITE TO PLAY 5-1.




Most players would simply make their 5-point and wait for a later shot. Curtis felt that Don had a blot in his home board and the time for action was now. He hit 8/13\*,

and safed up a blot 15/16. The strategy succeeded and Lucas had tied the score 7–7.


The game that effectively decided the match was next. With a positional advantage, Curtis pushed across a 2-cube:

Pos. 2. 15-point finals. Don Schiller (Black) leads Curtis Lucas (White) 7-6. White on roll. CUBE ACTIONS?



Leading the race by 27 pips (113–140), Don had an easy take. The game quickly progressed to the following with Lucas facing the prospect of being redoubled unless he rolled something special:

Pos. 3. 15point finals. Don Schiller (Black) and Curtis Lucas (White) are tied at 7all. White




Lucas quickly entered on the ace point and played 12/14 to take his checker out of "harm's way." He simply *didn't see* that he could have hit! On the other hand, Schiller did see that he had a clear recube to 4. Lucas accepted, and Don ran home to take a big 11–7 lead. Don's doubled gammon in the next game made the final score 15–7. Congratulations, Don on a job well done.

After the game, Lucas was confronted with the play, immediately saw the hit and couldn't believe he had missed it. "That's one of the dumbest things I've ever seen." claimed Curtis. "It was an hallucination."


Lucas's very successful tournament was marred by a costly oversight. Everyone makes them, but because Lucas's opponent was sight-impaired, there's a

### PROBLEMS WITH THE PAYOUT

I had a overall enjoyable weekend at the recent Illinois State Championships with one exception. In the three flight format, I finished in the semifinals of the Main Flight and was paid just 1/29th of the combined prize and Calcutta money distributed in the main draw. That's because the Calcutta Auction only paid four places (1st and 2nd Main, 1st and 2nd Consolation). There is something wrong here. I would have much preferred the chance to compete for the Consolation money instead of losing in the semifinals and going home with money totaling less than my entry and Calcutta outlay. What can be done about this problem?—Ed Bauder, Lexington, Illinois





#### HANDLING THE HORROR SHAKE

Dear Danny: I've been playing backgammon about two years and have enough confidence to play in the dime chouette game at my club. However, last week, I faced a problem that jarred my confidence. I was in the box holding three 2-cubes against three seasoned opponents.

### Money game. BLACK TO PLAY 5-4.



What a horrible roll! I felt like a complete beginner—and the money pressure of holding three 2-cubes didn't help matters, either. I couldn't even find a duplication play and eventually played 23/18, 8/4 hoping for help from my opponents. Help never came. Chalk up minus 12 points on my scoresheet.

What would you have done here, Danny? Can you suggest any guideposts when horror shakes are staring you in the face?—Less Experienced Than I Thought

**D**EAR LESS: I cannot suggest any guidelines for playing horror shakes. "Choose the least of evils" does not help at all. You must examine the particulars of each play in each position. I can offer a couple of tips, however.

(1) So long as you must leave blots and shots aplenty, ask yourself where your opponent's hits will do the least damage and leave you best placed to recover.

23/18, 8/4 virtually guarantees that your opponent will hit (often two blots). His only missing number is 5, and even double-5s play well for him, letting him make his 3-point. When he hits only one man, you will have no chance to make a second anchor. When he hits two men, including the man you have moved to his bar-point, he has three active builders trained upon his open 2- and 3-points, making it difficult for you to make a second anchor. Your opponent's bar-point is not a good place to put a blot in this position, for when he hits there, he becomes a favorite to make his bar-point, a key point for keeping you locked up and stopping you from recirculating back men. 23/18, 8/ 4 offers little hope for you.

(2) So long as you must leave blots and shots aplenty, look for a play that gives your opponent some bad rolls. That's often a hitting play.

Here 8/3\*, 13/9 is such a play, for it creates bad 6s for your opponent. Obviously, double-6s from the bar will not be good for him. When he dances, you'll have builders poised to cover your slotted 5- and 3-points. Other 6s (6-4, 6-2 and 6-1) will also play poorly for him. And when he hits, you will still have a good chance to make a second anchor, while the hit will not come on his pivotal bar-point.

I hope these small tips can help you, but I would be derelict in my duty if I didn't ask you this pointed question:

What are you, who have been playing for only two years, doing in a "dime" (by which I suppose you mean \$10 per point) chouette with three seasoned opponents?

Playing in tournaments, or with your peers for lower stakes, will give you a lot more "confidence."—Yours, Danny  $\Delta$

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

For those who snubbed Springfield as not sufficiently "big time" to include on the circuit, try your hand at these little beauties, if you dare.—Jake Jacobs



#### **SLAPGAMMON**

I recently purchased the SlapGammon backgammon program for my Handspring Visor Prism palm device and must say that it is an excellent product. It is far and away the best BG program for the Palm OS platform. The program can play in money game or match mode (up to 25 points in length), and it plays a championship level game.

But the best feature is the ease of inputing positions for study and computer analysis. SlapGammon's analysis engine does interactive rollouts and although it's not at the level of Snowie, it's quite accurate. Additionally, the recorded positions (you can store well over 20,000 should you desire) can be downloaded into your PC for later analysis in Snowie or JellyFish.



### PROBLEM #276 ANALYZED

by Kit Woolsey

Tournament double match-point. **BLACK TO PLAY 6-5.** 



Black has a strong position, but he isn't quite able to put White away. This 6-5 roll is fair, but whatever Black does White will have some counterplay. Black's choice must be the one which holds this counterplay to a minimum.

One obvious possibility is to simply make the 3-point. This gives Black a strong four-point board which will be staring

White in the face for the rest of the game. The problem with this play is that now White gets her chance. If White rolls two small numbers to point on Black's head on the 5-point, White will be in pretty good shape in a priming battle. White has plenty of other good rolls. 6-5 makes the defensive bar-point, 6-2, 6-1, and 5-2 hit the blot on Black's 9-point, and just rolling an ace gives White an anchor on Black's 2-point. 6-6 and 5-5 also play fine for White.

Even if White rolls a bad number, she can afford to hit loose on the 5-point and hope to get lucky. With gammons not mattering, White will be able to take some chances. It appears as though making the 3-point is too passive.

A different positional approach is to make the 8-point and jump out with 20/15, 13/8. Leaving the double-shot isn't too costly, and the 8-point is a good blocking point. The problem here is that Black may lose the initiative. White's checkers aren't hemmed in because the bar-point is open, and White has a chance to get something going for herself.

Black does have the stronger inner board, and that argues for playing tactically rather than positionally. One approach which comes to mind is to double-hit with 8/2\*, 6/1\*. This would certainly be the choice if gammons counted, since the play is quite likely to lead to a gammon if it succeeds. At double match-point, however,

it is not so clear. Black is short on ammunition for a full blitz, and if White hits back as she will more often than not, Black will find himself spread pretty thin.

A quieter tactical approach is 20/15, 8/2\*. This seems more consistent with Black's goals. It doesn't commit to a blitz, but the hit keeps White off balance and takes away half of White's roll. Also, getting off the 20-point prevents White from counterattacking there. The extra outfield control from the checker on the 15-point is valuable. White will pretty much have to roll two small numbers to get anything going. This play looks like the right sort of compromise to me.

One of the features which makes backgammon interesting is that we don't know what the future dice rolls will bring. For this reason, we want to avoid a play which commits us to a particular plan until we are reasonable sure that the plan will be a successful one. This position is a good example.

The positional non-hitting plays commit to a priming sort of battle, which might not work out well if White rolls well. The double-hit commits to a blitzing approach, which could backfire if White hits back. 20/15, 8/2\* isn't as committal. If White flunks we can switch to a blitz, while if White hits back we can play a positional game with a good advantage.—*Kit Woolsey*  $\Delta$

### ILLINOIS STATE QUIZ ANSWERS

[The quiz appears on pp. 6–7]

- 1. **13/10(2), 6/3(2)—3 points.** Getting hit here is not recommended. I switched points, but he rolled 6-6!
- 2. No double—6 points; take—2 points. I passed because of the open 5-point, but it isn't even a double!
- 3. **7/1, 7/4—3 points.** Fives are good for him anyway.
- 4. **Redouble—1 point; take—6 points.** But have your checkbook handy!
- 5. No redouble—2 points; take—4 points. At the table, both players thought White had less than 9%, and it went double/pass. White wins 14%.
- 6. Redouble—4 points; take—2 points. A money beaver, but at the score, a strong redouble.
- 7. No redouble—2 points; take—2

- **points.** Black is in his window, but does better to bring one home, then cash. As easy take.
- 8. Redouble—2 points; take—6 points. You did notice that Black had three men off?
- 9. **Redouble—3 points; pass—5 points.** White wins not quite 20%, which is not quite enough.
- 10. **(D)** All of the above—10 points. After a rollout on the highest settings, this is, depending upon whether you trust Snowie's live cube function, a small pass, or even a skinny take!
- 11. 8/2\*, 6/2—6 points. He has the prime; you should to for the attack.
- 12. Double—5 points; take—1 point. 11/7, 9/5, 8/4(2)—5 points. At the score, the double is proper, but the take is trivial. Slotting is slightly better than the attacking 7/3(2), 9/1\*.
- 13. **Double—4 points; pass—4 points.** The things we do for the score!

14. Double—6 points; pass—6 points. On the cutting edge of backgammon theory. This one will be in my book. Knowing this to be an easy money take, you would be hard pressed to find an expert who would pass this, or even double it, at the score. however, taking is predicated upon one's ability to use the cube efficiently. It seems that in this position, good redoubling opportunities don't arise often enough, and without them, the takepoint is quite high.

## As always, scoring is based upon my own questionable methods:

81-100 A capitol score, governor!

61-80 You are qualified to represent us.

41–60 Not quite a winner. Where'd they add your score, Florida?

21–40 Someone has to be a Senate page.

0-20 There ought to be a law against it!

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
