

And while it is true the grid works great for Chicago and Pittsburgh, it's because they are used with 50-64 players.


There is another problem when having 33-47 player. The players who did not get a bye in the Main Flight, also did not get a bye in the Consolation. But some players who did get a bye in the Main, also got a bye the Consolation.


I know your grid was used in Springfield and do not want to degrade the help you provide. We all need help to put on a good show. I volunteer to help if you would like me to.—Butch Meese, director, Hoosier Backgammon Club, Indianapolis, Indiana

The equity at the Springfield Open was very reasonable (85% return). The prize money structure was the problem and the Springfield directors have promised changes in 2002.

With regard to byes in a 3-flight tourney, they are randomly drawn in the Main Flight. Players then enter the Consolation based on when they lose in the Main and the chips fall where they may. The value of a player's bye should not be taken away in the Consolation when he loses in the Main. The same player might also receive a bye in the Last Chance event, but that is the luck of the draw.

We are always happy to to accept help and review new methods in an effort to give the player a better tournament. Sean Garber (IN) has sent us two drawsheets for 33-40 players and 41-48 players that offer [Continued on page 4]





# PROTECTING YOURSELF FROM A SUSPECTED DICE MECHANIC

Dear Danny: What rights do I have when I am playing a tournament match against a particular opponent who many strong players suspect of being a dice mechanic? Do I have the right to say, "Dice check" after he shakes and before he rolls to ascertain that both of his dice are actually in his cup?

I am suspicious of this player because of what I've heard from reliable sources: About six years ago, a well-known dice mechanic visited his home town for a few weeks and the two apparently became friendly. I believe that during this time, Mr. Suspect was trained by the experienced mechanic and that he probably uses a technique of holding one die outside the cup in his hand or fingers prior to rolling the dice.

More suspicions: Mr. Suspect's Snowie<sup>TM</sup> error rate in his recent matches places his skill level well below the average Championship player. In spite of his lack of checker play and cube skills, he enters the Open and Masters divisions of major tournaments and does quite well.

I realize that my case against Mr.

very equitable ways of feeding the semifinalist losers into a progressive Consolation. The problem is time. The losing Consolation finalist (who receives no money) must first play five Main and three Consolation matches before he can be sent to the Last Chance. That's a tall order for one day of play if you are going to hold a fresh draw for the Last Chance of non-winners on Sunday morning.

The alternative is to conduct a progressive Last Chance that starts on Saturday. The downside occurs when some players get knocked out of the entire event prior to the first day's dinner break.

Butch, if you or anyone else has a Main Flight drawsheet for 33–48 players that progressively feeds losers (including the losing Main semifinalists) into the Consolation and still allows time for a Last Chance event, we would love to see it.—Ed. Suspect is entirely circumstantial, and would not hold up in a court of law; however, the feelings I have are still distracting. What should I do the next time I face him over the board?—Very Suspicious

**DEAR SUSPICIOUS:** I'm afraid you have no rights other than to cease patronizing the tournament and the organization that permits players you suspect of cheating to play. I say this from sad experience.

Those who cheat at bridge tournaments, where no money is at stake, are merely despicable. Those who cheat at backgammon and at high-stakes gin rummy, where substantial money is at stake, are criminals who would have no scruples about breaking your legs, killing you, or using their mob connections to put out a "contract" on you, if they thought you jeopardized their money-making. Paradoxically, the only ones you can safely accuse of cheating are honest players, who will confront you with protestations and proofs of their innocence, not death threats and the cheaters' queries "Who told you?" and "Who else knows?"

At the Cavendish West Club (now long defunct) in the 1970s and 1980s, I was warned by a friend with Mafia connections not even to walk by a certain backgammon table, lest I observe things that might get me killed. Eventually I noticed that certain patrons of the club simply stopped coming, whispering to me privately that they realized they had been cheated at gin rummy and complaining could get them killed. Just a few days after a club employee told me

Sorry to lose you, Torkil. Although we haven't raised the subscription fee to CHICAGO POINT since 1996, we can understand your priorities.—Ed. how the cheaters operated and cautioned me against complaining, one victim did complain and did get killed (a murder never "solved" by police and prosecutors with mob ties).

I'm not saying that all clubs and organizations that tolerate cheating are in cahoots with the cheaters. Some directors and other officials fear for their own lives, some merely fear the defamation lawsuits with which lawyers for cheaters threaten them. Ask officials of the American Contract Bridge League about the multi-million dollar lawsuits the ACBL has faced from those accused of cheating (including some who were caught red-handed and confessed). So no matter how well-founded your reputation for honesty and accuracy, nor how strong the evidence you might gather against Mr. Suspect, a director to whom you complain may say, "It's your word against his," (as I've been told) or find some other pretext to take no action.

Unless and until backgammon players, directors, promoters, club owners, and yes, even publishers of backgammon newsletters, lose their understandable fears of lawsuits, violence, and death, it's cheaper and less life-threatening simply to walk away when you suspect cheating.—Yours, Danny  $\Delta$

Open, place 2nd In Georgia, and cash in Consolation events at the Indy Open and Illinois State. Jake's 66.41 points was the second best annual total ever just behind Neil Kazaross with 72.98 in 1994.

The race was closer for 2nd and 3rd. Rick Todd won the biggest ABT event of the year, Michigan Summer Championships, earning 28 points. It was just enough to capture 2nd place. And Richard Del Furia edged out Neil Kazaross for 3rd by taking the Minnesota State Championships in November. Richard also earned points at the MBC (1st LC) and the Chicago Open (2nd) to bring his final 2001 total to 25.67.

The slate is wiped clean for the kickoff 2002 ABT event, the Carolina Invitational in Charlotte, NC 18–21 January. Then come to the Pittsburgh Championships 15–17 February for the ABT Awards Ceremony where the 2001 winners will be honored.  $\Delta$



Player of the Year Fred Kalantari. A big winner at the Vegas Pro-Am event in February, Kalantari had defeated Brazil's Armando Balbi to get his chance at the \$23,000 payday.

Both the dice and skill level favored Barabino who jumped out to a 14–6 lead. But Freddie was not about to roll over and play dead:


A close choice, but most experts felt that Kalantari's action of taking and reshipping to 8 was correct. The roll-off was not what Freddie had hoped for and Rick won 17–6.

#### The Championship

117 players paid the \$500 entry fee to take their chance at the title of Las Vegas Open Champion–2001. Saturday's semifinals paired Torben Hasseriis vs. expert Dennis Culpepper (VA), and Rick Barabino vs. Douglas Zare, a math professor at Columbia University (NY). Hasseriis, who captured the Last Chance at the EBN Spain tournament earlier this year topped Culpepper to earn a seat in the finals. The Barabino/Zare match would decide his opponent.

A relative newcomer to the big-time tourney scene, Zare played well up until the following cube decision in the 15-point semifinals [See position above].

If the score were 11–11, White should redouble because the cube would be dead and White wins from this position slightly more than half the time. But at the given match score, White's recube is wrong. That's because of the efficient 8-cube



Black can offer after White rolls something-deuce.

In the actual game, White redoubled to 4, Black accepted, and White rolled 4-2. Black redoubled to 8 and the cube eventually reached 16 with White failing to roll double 2s or better on his last shake. Final score: Barabino over Zare, 15–2.

Hasseriis was behind most of his 17point final match vs. Barabino. But trailing 14–11 and holding a 2-cube, things changed. Torben gammoned his opponent to go ahead 15–14.

With Torben now leading 16–14 Crawford, Rick appeared ready to force a final game to determine the victor. However, some fancy rolling gave the Dane a first place trophy and \$22,000 in prize money.

It was a great win for Torben Hasseriis who according to two-time World Champion Michael Meyburg, has a bright future.

Congratulations to Chicago's own Brian Barber. Barber, a relative newcomer to the national tourney scene, won the Limited Jackpot and was a semifinalist in the 143-player Intermediate tournament.







"Where's the suspense Alex? Wait and see. Besides, he was playing a very tough guy. A very tough guy."


"Who was that, Uncle Jake?"

he had a free shot at playing for a gammon." "Did he roll almost anything?"


Did ne fon annost anything?

trains. We'll call it his two-two point. And about now Mr. Mike was

feeling like a caboose! Then Rick B. rolled 2-1, and made his 5-point."

"So Mr. Mike was in trouble?"

"Not really. It was like shooting a rhino

with a bow and arrow—it just made Mr. Mike mad!"

"So what did he do?"

"He doubled."

"Did Rick B. run home crying? That's what Kevin, in my class, always does."

"Intergalactic Super Novas don't cry. Besides, Rick B. is also a pretty smart guy. He saw that Mr. Mike had lots of bad 5s and 6s, so he took. Mr. Mike rolled a bad six, a 6-2. Rick B hit with 4-1, and Mr. Mike fanned."

"Did Rick B. redouble?"

"He sure did, Nick!"

"And then did Mr. Mike try sacrificing a virgin?"

"What's a virgin?"

"No he didn't, Nick. That's a later story Alex. Anyway, it turns out to be a very close decision. He wins about 29%, with nearly 5% being gammon wins, but he loses around 4% gammons, so it really is a tossup. Anyway, he took, and he lost four points."

"Then Mr. Mike wasn't so tough after all?"

"Let me tell you a story ..."

"I thought you were telling us a story." "This is another story! Do you think I only have one story?"

"No Uncle Jake. We never think that!"

"Harumph! There was a married couple. They were in Las Vegas. The wife tells her husband she just lost \$100 playing the slots. He's really upset. He says, 'How could you lose \$100? What's the matter with you?' She says, 'But honey, last night you lost \$4000 playing craps.' He says, 'Yeah, but that's because I know how to gamble!'"

"I don't get it, Uncle Jake."

"It's simple, Nick. Look at the first position I showed you. Any beginner could win one point there. It takes a really great player to lose four!"—*Jake Jacobs*  $\Delta$ 

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
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Match to 9 points. White leads Black 8– 7 Crawford. **BLACK TO PLAY 4-2.** 



There are five reasonable moves to consider here, representing four different approaches to this problem.

One approach is to split the back checkers and let White play, hoping she'll be forced to open up another man for you to hit and possibly gammon her for the match. For money, the best play along these lines would be 22/18, 4/2, since the "double split" of 22/18, 22/20 would give White a few too many hitting numbers that could lead to you being the one getting gammoned. The double split also takes away your defense, however tenuous, on the 22point, quite possibly for good.

However, the double split deserves a longer look at this can't-get-gammoned score. It does have the key advantage of maximizing your chance to make a 6prime, which would practically lock the game up without eliminating your chance to get a second checker, either with a shot from the back now or by later recirculation. Another factor in its favor is that the ace you need to complete the prime is a number you can't use either to re-enter if you're hit or to leap if you're not.

Another approach is hit White on the ace point, hoping to freeze her on the bar but keeping some options with the back checkers if that fails. 5/1\*, 4/2 is the safest play toward this end. This doesn't give up completely on the gammon, but with the 4-point open, little wood in the zone, and a buried spare, you'll probably need a second checker to win one.

Along this same line is the all-out hit-

and-split approach, 5/1\*, 22/20. This play would be insane if White's gammons mattered and yours didn't, but with the opposite being the case, it has to be worth some serious consideration. If she rolls badly and you freeze her, then close her out and place your spares well, you can get about 20% gammons without ever bagging a second checker. Even if she rolls well, you may be able to get some kind of defense back together on the 22- or 20-point. Since she has to be more cautious than usual about leaving numerous blots around in an effort to create builders, your chances of anchoring after being hit have to be better than for money at this score.

A little digression here: This last play gets interesting quickly if you try it for money. The rollouts show the money equity is with the clearing the 6-point, but your opponent might try this play instead if she's the sort who thinks stratospheric cubes are one of life's greatest thrills. Can you then (legitimately) double from the bar? Certainly not if you own the cube already, but with the Jacoby Rule in force, cubeful rollouts suggest a marginal center cube that could actually be that former Blarney Stone of BG, the correct center double/beaver! The rollouts show White winning 20-21% gammons when Black owns the cube, and his market loss with unanswered 4s is serious. With the cube centered, if White doesn't double, Black will do so if White fans, not because of the Jacoby Rule but because of his big market loss on covering 3s.

What about Black's recube? JellyFish 3.0 1-ply cubeful full rollouts show a marginal recube, better than holding by 0.042 equity. I set the settlement (recubeout) limit at 0.490 instead of the default of 0.550 because of the sharp-edged nature of the position and hence the likely recube-ins that the bot won't find, and also because JellyFish had been consistently evaluating these positions a little lower than the rollout equities. A concrete example of this settlement limit in action is the parlay Black 6-1: 20/14, 2/1; White 4-3: bar/21\*, 9/6; Black 5-1: bar/20, 14/13; White doubles. The 2-ply evaluation says +0.501, double/take, so the rollout wouldn't double at all with the default settlement limit of 0.550. However, a 720-trial full 2-ply rollout shows the equity is actually 0.594 at 0.008 sd, indicating a mandatory double and a somewhat close pass.

Enough of that; now back to the main problem:

Finally, if you don't care for either hitting or splitting, there's always the conservative 6/2, 6/4, good for generating shots at a second checker as long as the opponent doesn't roll a 5. This play might be best for money, especially if the cube is still centered. White has many rolls that spring a second checker loose, giving you a center double with a bit of bluff potential in some cases, such as following a 2-1 by her. (A recube would still be a peach or two short of a pie because of your missing 6point.) If instead White does roll a 5, in most cases you'll have enough remaining equity in your stranded 22-anchor game to take a cube from her next turn. At the actual score, this approach has the shotproducing benefit noted above plus the preservation of your remaining race equity, which isn't negligible even though you're still eight pips behind after your play.

My first impression was that clearing the 6-point would be best for money, but that  $5/1^*$ , 22/20 hit-and-split was best at the score. This was JellyFish's first impression also. For money, its 3-ply evaluation gave first place to clearing the 6-point by 0.048 (+0.020 versus -0.028 for 22/18, 4/2). At the score, it moved  $5/1^*$ , 22/20,

which it had rated a blunder for money, into first place by 0.015 (+0.153 for 5/1, 22/20 versus +0.138 for 22/18, 4/2 and +0.137 for 6/2, 6/4). At the score, the double split came in fourth at +0.111.

I felt that rollouts for a position with differences this fine needed to be handled with caution, so I ran 2880 full cubeless 2ply trials for each of the five serious candidate plays. I then calculated the match equities at the score the same way I would try to do over the board-by adding the gammons to the win rate and dividing by two, which is equivalent to adding up the equity components separately but requires less mental arithmetic. Finally, since the differences among the three leading contenders were still quite small, I ran some signal cases to see whether the bot would play key positions that might arise in such a way as to maximize equity.

In a photo finish, the conservative 6/2, 6/4 with 28.15% match equity edged out the double split 22/18, 22/20 with 28.0%, based on the 2-ply rollouts. Close behind in third place was all-out hitting play, 5/1\*, 22/20, which gave 27.85% match equity. Trailing all of these were the two plays that tried to hedge by saving the blot on the 4point: 22/18, 4/2 gave 26.6% match equity, and 5/1\*, 4/2 gave only 25.95%. For money, the conservative 6-clearing play was clearly best, with all other plays being blunders, despite the potentially profitable immediate cube actions we saw above following 5/1\*, 22/20. Clearing the 6-point play was also best at double match-point (49.8% wins versus 47.4% for the next contender, the all-out 5/1\*, 22/20), and in gammon-save situations.

Do these numbers show the conservative play to be better than the next two contenders at this gammon-go score also? Maybe, though with 2-ply rollout standard deviations all in the 0.004–0.005 range, the significance of these small differences leaves plenty of room for doubt. If it can be shown that the bot makes signal errors in the play of the games following any of the top plays, this could swing the equity enough to widen, eliminate, or even reverse these small differences.

The play for White following 6/2, 6/4 is quite straightforward, and I can't see where JellyFish would have any problems with it. I did, however, spot a glitch in the followup to the double split, and occasionally the hit-and-split as well. The bots are wellknown to close their boards quickly after forming a full prime, rather than try to recirculate and get a second checker. This turned out to be true here when I ran cases where Black made his prime, hit on the ace, then had to choose between covering the ace point with a 6, or leaving it slotted in an effort to pick up another checker White had left open in his board. JellyFish covered at the first opportunity on its 1and 2-ply play levels, but "found" the waiting play on 3-ply. Since the rollouts are 2-ply, I have to assume it made this error every time the situation arose.

Though it doesn't happen a great deal, and the error isn't huge either, it doesn't take much to swing a match equity difference of only 0.15%. Since I don't perceive any canceling effects favoring the other play, my conclusion here is that within boundaries of our uncertainties, 6/2, 6/4 and 22/18, 22/20 must both be considered equally good solutions to this problem.

Given how close a contender the thirdplace play, 5/1\*, 22/20, turned out to be, is its concept completely wrong? Does Jelly-Fish make any signal errors comparable to those we found with the double split? Or does that dillied builder on the deuce point leave you just overextended enough to make it a little too hard to bring the game home? I'm not aware of any repeating errors in the bot's follow-up play, other than once in awhile closing the board too soon, as with the double split. To see the effect of the dilly builder, I tried a few cases where the builder from the 2-point instead starts on the 5-point with the other one. This makes it much easier for Black to cover his 4-point next roll if the slot survives, plus it opens up the possibility of his getting an immediate full prime after the hit-and-split as well as after the double split play. This change makes the hit-and-split clearly correct at this score (gammon go) and also double match point, since it wins the most games and also the most gammons. However, the gammons it loses keep it from being best for money, where 5/1\*, 4/2 (hit-and-hedge?) now comes out in front, or at gammon save, where the blotfree 6/2, 6/4 is best once again.

The concept may be reasonable, but it seems the third-place play remains slightly worse than the top two choices. The correct answer is a tie between two very different approaches—the waiting play of 6/2, 6/4 and the more volatile and forcing double split, 22/18, 22/20. Much of the skill in backgammon involves deciding whether potential gains are commensurate with the risks involved in attempting to achieve them, and here it appears they are in perfect balance.—*Mary Hickey*  $\Delta$
