# CORBETT WINS THREE EVENTS IN VEGAS

Magriel & Wheeler Also Win Big

Tom Wheeler, Mike Corbett, and Paul Magriel shared the spotlight at the 9th Worldwide Twin Backgammon Championships 11–16 June in Las Vegas, Nevada. The event, staged by the Nevada Backgammon Association and organized by Howard Markowitz, drew an ultra-strong crowd of 250 players to the Riveria Hotel's beautiful penthouse playing room.

#### 19TH NEVADA STATE TOURNAMENT

Dallas Backgammon League director Tom Wheeler enjoyed a \$12,000 payday (biggest of his life) winning the prestigious Nevada State Tournament. Wheeler rallied against New Yorker Rick Barabino (down 5–11 to 13) and then against California's Ray Baker (down 0–11 to 13) to reach the penultimate match against Chicagoan Herb Roman. A thrilling double match-point victory sent Tom into the finals.

On the other half of the drawsheet, veteran player Ed Bennett from New Mexico was busy shocking Ray Fogerlund (CA) and then Ed O'Laughlin (FL) in the semifinals to guarantee his best tournament finish ever.

Wheeler was a big favorite in the 15-point Championship match, but Bennett fought valiantly. Then with the score tied at 8-all, Tom took command eventually finishing with a doubled gammon to make the final score 15–9.


#### 9TH INTERNATIONAL CUP

The International Cup was the equity event of the tournament boasting \$10,000 added prize money. The format required players to win a round-of-8 to qualify for the playoffs. When the dust settled, the final-four were Mike Corbett (FL) vs. Bill Robertie (MA) and Brian Barber (IL) vs. Diane Haley (TX). Exciting victories by Corbett and Barber set the stage for the 15-point championship.

Barber, an up-and-coming player fought toe-to-toe with the his experienced competitor building up an 11–7 lead in the 15-point finals after 12 games. Then in pivotal game 13:


A very risky double by Brian which Mike correctly scooped. Barber then tossed a 3-2 opting to cover his ace rather than hit. Mike rolled 4-1 playing 14/9. Next Brian tossed a crushing 2-2, completing his closed board on Corbett's head.

But it wasn't over. With Corbett dancing on the bar, Brian was forced to leave a back door shot which Mike hit. An awkward

bear-in forced the following position:



Corbett played the very risky 4/off leaving an extremely awkward spare on his 6-point. His 3-2 next let him play 6/1. Then Mike doubled giving Brian an easy take. Mike survived one more blunder in the bear-off to tie the score at 11-all en route to a 15–12 victory.

Corbett made no excuses for his mistakes, but one explanation could be the number of matches he played throughout





#### ODDAGE, STRIPPAGE, AND GAPPAGE


ear Danny: I've lost a number of games in the final bearoff recently determining which point (if any) to break. The first example was in tournament play at double match-point where I was uncertain whether to break the 6-point, 5-point, or take two off. I opted for bearing off two, but ended up leaving a back door shot to lose the match.

Example 1. Tournament double matchpoint. **BLACK TO** PLAY 3-2.



I've faced the second example a number of times and I'm still not sure what to do.

Money game. **BLACK TO** PLAY 3-1.



Is there a hard and fast rule for positions of this type?—Baffled in the Bearoff

DEAR BAFFLED: You should note two peculiarities of Position 1.

- 1. Because it is double match-point, gammons are meaningless, so maintaining your board longer while bearing off quickly is not as important as in positions where you could use the extra point, and bearing off safely becomes paramount.
- 2. You'll be breaking from the rear eventually, so you may as well consider when it will be more dangerous to break your 6-point: now or later.

If you play 6/3, 6/4 now, you leave

yourself with two men on your 5-point and three men on your 4-point. The rolls that force a blot on your next shake are only the three large doublets.

If you play 5/2, 5/3, you leave yourself only two blotting rolls (6-1 and 5-1). However, the gap you create may lead to further jeopardy in the form of dangerous oddage (three men on your outermost remaining point combined with stripped points next) on 6-2 or 5-2 next and may widen on 4-1 next.

If you play 3/0ff, 2/0ff now, you leave yourself with a stripped board except for a useless spare on your 1-point. Though you'll have no immediate blotting rolls, you'll have pernicious aces (6-1, 5-1, 4-1 and 3-1) that force you either to leave a gap in your board or create oddage next turn; most of your deuces will play poorly too, generating positions that are harder to clear safely than the one you can achieve by playing 6/3, 6/4 now.

Though it would have been nicer to have rolled a larger number, e.g. 4-3, you should recognize that the 3-2 you rolled allowed you to clear your 6-point with relative safety. Given the uselessness of gammons, you would have done better to have taken advantage of this opportunity to clear your 6-point.

Backgammon is too complex a game to be governed by hard and fast rules, but there are some principles for positions like Position 2. Though you won't go far wrong by counting the immediate blotting rolls left by each of your blotless plays and

letting yourself be guided thereby, you may invoke the following priorities to spare yourself the work of counting, and must invoke them when the numbers of blotting rolls are equal.

- a. Fear oddage most of all.
- b. Fear strippage second most, but only when bearing off against an anchor.
- c. Fear gappage next. The deeper the gap, the more you should fear it, for the more trouble you ll have clearing the points beyond it.
- d. Fear semi-oddage (two men on your highest occupied point, three on your next highest) less than the other blotting-prone conditions.
- e. When all else is nearly equal, choose the play that bears the most men off. That will increase your chance to salvage the game if you get hit later in the bear-off, and your chance to win a gammon if you don t get hit.

In Position 2, you have four nonblotting plays from which to choose. 6/3, 6/5, which creates oddage, leaves eight blotting rolls. 5/2, 5/4, which creates both gappage and semi-oddage, leaves seven blotting rolls and is virtually as bad as 6/3, 6/5. Reject these bad plays.

4/1, 4/3 and 3/0ff, 3/2 each create gappage while leaving only two blotting rolls. Between these good plays, choose 4/1, 4/3. Even though 3/0ff, 3/2 bears a man off, the gap it creates is deeper and therefore more pernicious.—Yours, Danny Δ


In the early game, when your opponent has split her back checkers with an ace (24/23) or a four (24/20), it may be correct to hit two checkers, only one, or perhaps none with 4-1. All twelve positions have these three options.

When a Snowie rollout of sufficient sample size indicates that the difference in equity of two checker plays is less than 0.01, then I will say that the plays are "very close." In such a case we probably cannot know for sure which of the two plays is better.

When the the rollout indicates that the difference in equity of two checker plays is between 0.01 and 0.02, I will say the plays are "close." If the difference is greater than 0.02, I will call it a "clear margin."

Assume that all positions are for money with the cube in the center.

Pos. 1. Roll sequence: 4-1, 4-1




White opened with 4-1 in Position 1 and played 24/23, 13/9. Black's 4-1 response should be played 6/2\*/1\*. With only eight checkers in the zone, he should not expect to successfully execute a blitz. Black's objective in hitting two checkers is to minimize the chance of White's establishing a key point on her next roll.

If White had opened with 2-1 (24/23, 13/11), then 6/2\*/1\* would once again be the correct play by a clear margin for Black's 4-1.

When White opens with 5-1 (24/23, 13/8), she has fewer good numbers on her next shake if left alone, and Black therefore has less motivation to attack. 6/2\*/1\* and 13/8 were exactly tied in my long rollout.

Pos. 2. Roll sequence: 5-4, 4-1



White opened with 5-4 and played 24/20, 13/8 in Position 2. If Black does not hit White, then 30 of her numbers (all but 2-1, 3-2, and 5-1) make an advanced anchor or key offensive point or escape a checker to at least her midpoint. Black must hit to impede White's progress.

After hitting on his 5-point, Black has an option in Position 2 that he did not have in Position 1. He should leave his 5-point slotted, hoping for the parlay that White will miss and he will cover. After correctly playing 6/5\*, Black must choose 24/20 or 13/9 with the 4.

In Position 2 White, on her side of the board, has added only one checker to her 8-point from her starting position. Black therefore feels no pressure to split. He can use the 4 constructively on his own side of the board. After playing 13/9, 6/5\*, if Black is missed, the builder on his 9-point will give him 30 covers instead of 24 for his 5-point.


13/9, 6/5\* beat 24/20, 6/5\* by a very close margin in the rollout. 6/5\*/1\* was close but wrong.

Assume that White opened with 4-3 (24/20, 13/10) instead of 5-4. Mentally

move White's fourth checker on her 8-point in Position 2 back to her 10-point. This builder improves White's offensive potential enough to give Black more motivation to split with his 4 than in the original Position 2. He can split in relative safety while simultaneously putting White on the bar.

24/20, 6/5\* is correct. Both 6/5\*/1\* and 13/9 6/5\* are close.

Pos. 3. Roll sequence: 3-1, 5-1, 4-1




Although White cannot anchor with 4-3 in Position 3, she still has enough point-making numbers for Black's 4-1 to be a close choice.

13/8 beat 6/2\*/1\* by a very close margin in the rollout. In playing 13/8, Black brings a welcomed ninth checker into the zone, hopefully to be used in the near future for either priming or attacking. Both 13/9, 6/5 and 13/9, 24/23 leave too many shots for too little gain.

Assume now that the sequence is 3-1, 4-1, 4-1 or 3-1, 2-1, 4-1. Mentally move White's fourth checker on her 8-point in Position 3 back to her 9-point or 11-point. In either case, this new builder gives White several more constructive numbers than she had in the original Position 3. Black must play 6/2\*/1\* to prevent White from developing her position. No other play is close.

Pos. 4. Roll sequence: 6-1, 5-1, 4-1



When Black opens with 6-1, his position is much less conducive to attacking than after opening with 3-1. However, he is only one point away from turning his anemic 3-prime into a powerful 4-prime. Black should not change his game plan from priming to attacking without a good reason.

Although the attacking play (6/2\*/1\*)



with 4-1 was close in Position 3, the quiet 13/8 is best by a clear margin in Position 4. 24/20, 24/23 is second best, and 6/2\*/1\* is third.

Assume that the sequence was 6-1, 4-1, 4-1 or 6-1, 2-1, 4-1. Mentally move White's fourth checker on her 8-point in Position 4 back to her 9-point or 11-point. In either case, this new builder gives White more numbers that make key points, and the attacking play becomes more reasonable.


6/2\*/1\* beat 13/8 by a close margin in 6-1, 4-1, 4-1 and by a very close margin in 6-1, 2-1, 4-1.

Pos. 5. Roll sequence: 6-5, 4-1, 4-1



Sometimes you have to be man enough to play the checkers like a wimp. In Position 5, Black has escaped a checker and has a modest lead of 11 pips after playing safely. The correct play with 4-1 is 13/8, although 6/2\*/1\* is close.

Pos. 6. Roll sequence: 3-1, 6-5, 5-4, 4-1




In Position 6 White, if left alone, has 30 numbers that make an advanced anchor or key offensive point, or escape a checker to

at least her midpoint. Black has a lead of only 3 pips if he plays his 4-1 without hitting.

Even though White now has her 5-point, the case for Black's attacking is stronger in Position 6 than in Position 5. 6/5\*/1\* is correct by a clear margin over 13/8.

Pos. 7. Roll sequence: 3-1, 3-1, 5-1, 4-1



When White has her 5-point, Black should be much more reluctant to attack. In Position 3, with White lacking her 5-point, the attacking play was marginally wrong. White owns her 5-point in Position 7; therefore, 6/2\*/1\* is wrong by a clear margin.


13/8 is best with 4-1 in Position 7, 13/9, 6/5 is a close second, and 6/2\*/1\* is a distant third.

Assume that the sequence was 3-1, 3-1, 2-1, 4-1. Mentally move White's third checker on her 8-point in Position 7 back to her 11-point. This modification slightly improves White's offensive potential. With Black's 4-1,13/8 is still correct, and 6/2\*/1\* is now a close second.

Consider the sequence 3-1, 3-1, 4-1, 4-1. Mentally move White's third checker on her 8-point in Position 7 back to her 9-point. This modification gives White more numbers that make her 4-point or 3-point than she had in either 3-1, 3-1, 5-1, 4-1 or 3-1, 3-1, 2-1, 4-1. She has additional numbers that cover her 9-point, a part of her potential prime.

Black therefore has more motivation to attack in 3-1, 3-1, 4-1, 4-1. 6/2\*/1\* is correct by a clear margin over 13/8.

Pos. 8. Roll sequence: 6-1, 5-4, 4-1




Compare Position 8 to Position 2. Once again, 13/9, 6/5\* and 24/20, 6/5\* are the

two candidates.

After Black hits with 6/5\* in Position 8, White will have some bad entries from the roof (1-6 and 2-6) that she did not have in Position 2. Splitting with the 4 will enable Black to better exploit these awkward entering numbers.

24/20, 6/5\* beat 13/9, 6/5\* in the rollout by a very close margin.

Pos. 9. Roll sequence: 5-2, 5-4, 4-1




Black opened with 5-2 and played 13/11, 13/8 in Position 9. White responded with 5-4 and incorrectly played 24/20, 13/8 (correct was 13/8, 13/9). With 4-1, Black for the first time has the option of making a new point.

Although making the bar-point is tempting, it would make White's life too easy. 28 of White's numbers (all but 2-1, 5-1, 3-2, and 6-2) would either anchor on Black's 5-point, escape to at least her midpoint, or make a key offensive point. Black must hit with the ace.

The blitz will have a greater chance of success when Black has ten checkers in the zone instead of eight. 6/5\*/1\* is correct, with 11/7, 8/7 and 24/20 6/5\* both close.

Pos. 10. Roll sequence: 5-2, 4-1, 4-1



Black opened with 5-2 and played 13/11, 13/8 in Position 10. White responded with 4-1 and played 24/23, 13/9 (13/9, 6/5 is a very close alternative). With 4-1, Black again has the option of making his 7-point.

White's two back checkers on Black's 24- and 23-points in Position 10 do not pose the same threat that they did in Position 9 on the 24- and 20-points. The double hit is therefore unwarranted.

11/7, 8/7 is correct in Position 10. No other play is close.



## PROBLEM #282 ANALYZED

by Kit Woolsey

Match to 11 points. Black leads White 8 to 7. **BLACK TO PLAY 6-1.** 



For once we have limited candidates. The only two legal plays are Bar/18\* and Bar/24, 8/2.

If this were normal money play or if it were early in a match, it wouldn't be a contest. Bar/18\* would be very clear. This play will get gammoned more, but the increase in win percentage is significant. Black does have a four-point board, and if he can keep White on the bar for a roll, Black will have a decent chance to barrel the position home via brute force.

If Black plays Bar/24, 8/2, he will have to hit a later shot and win after hitting the shot, which will be a lot more difficult. Since Black is risking only an additional two points by getting gammoned (from -2 to -4) in order to gain four points if he wins (from -2 to +2), he needs only to get half as many extra wins as he loses extra gammons in order for Bar/18\* to be correct. It seems clear that he will get these extra wins.

At the match score, it may be another story. All points are not of equal value. Four points puts White out exactly, so losing a gammon is more costly than usual. Let's see what kind of odds we are talking about:

- Black wins: Ahead 10–7 (1-away, 4-away) Crawford, 83% equity.
- Black loses single game: Behind 9–8 (3-away, 2-away), 40% equity.
- Black loses gammon: loses match, 0% equity.

Thus, Black is risking 40% in order to gain 43% by making the big play. Of course Black will win a few gammons also which will give him 100% equity, but that

won't happen too often. Black will need to find almost as many extra wins as he has extra gammons in order to justify Bar/18\*.

How dangerous is Bar/18\*? White hits back with all 2s, as well as 5-4 and 4-4. Black will have a chance to survive if he can reclaim his anchor quickly, but if he doesn't, he is in big trouble. On the other hand, Bar/24, 8/2 isn't exactly gammon-free. If White rolls an ace and hits the blot, Black will still be in plenty of gammon danger, although he will always have the ace point game in reserve. Even if White misses, Black is far from out of gammonland.

How much does Black's winning chances improve with the hit? If White flunks, Black is definitely alive and kicking. His 6s are duplicated, which is unfortunate, but if he can cover the blot on the 2-point he will have a decent chance of scrambling the other back checker out before White is able to enter. If White enters without hitting, Black can get right in the game if he can roll a 6 quickly.

Can Black win after playing Bar/24, 8/2? Yes, he definitely can. White's next play may be very awkward if she doesn't roll an ace. 6-2, 6-3, and 6-4 all force White to break off the anchor and leave multiple blots, giving Black a chance to scoop up these blots and escape while White is stuck on the bar. White can play safe on other rolls, but she may be squeezed off the anchor soon. Of course even if Black gets something going he will still have a lot of work to do, with an open 4-point and two checkers stuck behind a five-prime. Also,

Black will at least wind up with an ace point game when things go badly. The ace point game won't be the greatest since Black has been forced to make his own ace point, but Black can still win or scramble off the gammon from the ace point game.

So, what's the bottom line? I'm not really sure, but at the table I would play Bar/18\*. It is risky, but at least I can see a direct path toward winning the game. After Bar/24, 8/2, the route to a win is going to be far slower. My play will get gammoned more, but it is easy to get gammoned after Bar/24, 8/2. As long as both plays are going to lead to plenty of gammons, it is best to make the play which gives Black something for his money if it works.

This is a difficult decision due to the match score. It is always scary to make a play or cube decision which will cost the entire match if it backfires. Many players will tend to take the conservative path and live to see another day. Here, however, the conservative path has no guarantees of surviving. In this case, it is best to assume that the cup is half full, not half empty, and to go directly for the win.—*Kit Woolsey*  $\Delta$



Pos. 11. Roll sequence: 4-2, 5-4, 4-1




In Position 11, Black has an excellent chance of making his strongest 3-point board (his 6-point, 5-point, and 4-point). Playing 13/9, 6/5\* is the best play to execute this priming game plan.

Another viable game plan for Black is blitzing with 6/5\*/1\*, taking advantage of his 2-point board.

13/9, 6/5\* beat 6/5\*/1\* in the rollout by a close margin. 24/20, 6/5\* was a distant third.

Pos. 12. Roll sequence: 4-2, 4-3, 4-1



The presence of White's builder on her 10-point gives Black a stronger case for attacking with 4-1 in Position 12 than in Position 11.

After Black initiates a blitz with 6/5\*/1\*, White may be kept occupied trying to enter from the bar for the next few rolls. In this event, Black will have additional chancesto hit White's outfield blot before she can cover it or use it as a builder.

In Position 12, 6/5\*/1\* is best, 13/9, 6/5\* (going for the strongest 3-point board) is a close second, and 24/20, 6/5\* is a distant third.—Paul Weaver  $\Delta$
