

3-AWAY AT MYSTIC LAKE First Person Minnesota State Report

I was fortunate enough to attend the Minnesota State Backgammon Championships at the Mystic Lake Casino in Pryor Lake, Minnesota. The Oct. 31–Nov. 2 tournament was well-run by Twin Cities Club director Steve Brown and staff with the hotel/casino providing a great venue. This event also served double-duty as my wife's family all live in the Minneapolis area.

I had a hot hand this weekend, winning the Masters Jackpot and placing second in the Championship. Winning the Masters on Saturday night was a huge thrill. As Sunday morning evolved my hot dice continued as I was able to defeat the excellent Ilia Guzei (WI), and then top international giant Neil Kazaross (IL). This put me in the finals as the one-loss player in the double-elimination format. I was already assured of taking over fourth place in the 2003 ABT race, but an outright win would move me into second, just behind Malcolm Davis.

In the 11-point finals against Wisconsin's Brad Andersen, I got off to a very slow start. Things changed with Brad leading 8–3, as I fought back to reach DMP. It was an exciting final game with a large throng of spectators enjoying the big swings. In the end, I had to run from my final outpost on the 15-point, Brad hit me with double-1s, remade his 6-point


with double-3s and went on to claim the state title. It was very exciting to appear in my first regional finals against Brad Andersen, a worthy opponent and a deserved winner. Well done, Brad!

In round 2 of the Masters, Dana Nazarian and I got to this position that generated a lot of discussion amongst the kibitzers:



CURSED BY THE DICE, OR BY YOUR OPPONENT?

D ear Danny: There always used to be some unsavory characters in backgammon, but at least most of us knew who they were. Nowadays, though, it seems it's the quiet, unassuming people that you have to watch out for.

I was playing in the semifinals of a regional Masters event. Leading 9–6 to 11, and holding a

4-cube, there were two rolls left in bear off. I had four checkers on my deuce point, and my opponent had three on his ace and one on his 3point. Barring any unfortunate consequences, I was about to

guarantee myself at least a few thousand dollars in equity.

Now we all know that sometimes you sit there and silently pray for your opponent to throw his bad numbers. But not this man, who I had been told was a professional person, and a "nice guy." Right in the middle of my shake and roll, he loudly calls out: "Let's see if you can roll a f***ing ace!"

Note that he didn't just say, "Perhaps you can roll an ace here." He used the most profane adjective possible, and said it loudly enough that all the kibitzers could hear (one old woman almost fainted). And of course, nobody was too surprised, least of all me, when the dice landed on the board showing 2-1.

Immediately I tossed the dice cup towards my opponent. I know that was wrong, but it was a knee-jerk reaction to what was clearly the most underhanded of all tricks. What he had done had totally broken my concentration. I have been playing this game for a long, long time, and tournament directors all over the world know that although I am a pretty good player, it is my being "in tune" with the dice when rolling that has gotten me where I am today.

I asked for a ruling, and the committee said that although my opponent was clearly in error for opening his mouth, the roll would stand. Ha!

There is no room for this kind of behavior in our game. People are given penalty points, and even disqualifications, for similar behavioral infractions in other games and sports. For example, imagine if we were playing tennis, and I'm secondserving at match point. While I'm tossing the ball in the air, my opponent yells across the net: "Let's see if you can serve a f***ing double fault!" and then I slam the ball right into the net. At the very least, the umpire would rule "no serve" and a do-over. Why should this situation be any different?

Of course, what I should have done was just remained calm and thrown a doublet on my last roll to win the game and teach Mr. Rude Pottymouth a lesson. And in my younger days, that's probably what I would have done. But I am older now, and not as mentally strong as I used to be. I just couldn't muster up the force to do it. Naturally, after losing and dropping behind 9–10, I lost the next game and walked away empty-handed.

Maybe the dice gods were punishing me for making a loose initial double at this score. But regardless, my opponent should not have been allowed to get away with his actions unpunished. At the very least, this man's prize money should have been put back in the pool for the other remaining players to divide.

The lost equity is not even the issue here. These days, I play more for fun than for money. But the whole situation so annoying that it took most of the fun out of the rest of my weekend. I think the tournament committee was weak for not taking more aggressive action against this person, and I will refuse to attend any more tournaments where this type of behavior is allowed to go unpunished.—1980 WABC

DEAR WABC: In order to make a fair judgment on this situation, I really need to hear your opponent's side of the story as to why he reacted the way he did.

For example, here's one conjecture. By you "getting into your rolls," he may have thought, you were taking inordinately long before casting your dice. If so, then your opponent should have summoned a director to forbid you from taking more time than necessary to shake the dice adequately before rolling. Instead he erred by letting his irritation grow.

Your opponent was certainly rude and unsportsmanlike in exclaiming anything while you were rolling, and he earned a warning for this behavior. His use of the word "f***ing" was offensive not because

of the obscenity per se, but because of the hostile tone that he undoubtedly used in saying it. You figure to win from the position you describe slightly more than half the time, and whether he said "f***ing" or "abracadabra" had no effect on the dice, despite your superstitious belief that it did. So your roll stands.

Hurling the dice cup at your opponent, being violent rather than merely oral, was a worse offense than what your opponent did. However, because of the provocation, I have some sympathy for your action and would let you off with a warning, just as I would your opponent.

Your analogy to tennis is inept. A tennis player is supposed to try to produce a powerful and accurate serve, not a random placement of the ball in his opponent's court. Any action of his opponent that disturbs his concentration while serving justifies letting him serve again. A backgammon player is not supposed to try to produce any roll but a random roll. Because you cannot produce anything but random rolls however many mental gymnastics you try, you are not a cheater.

Paradoxically, if we were to believe in the theories you espouse, we would consider you a cheater, convicting you by your own words.—*Yours, Danny*

Which are the Good Doubles?



When should you make an initial double? When you can gain equity by cubing whether your opponent takes or drops, then it is right to double. In matchplay, score considerations critically effect your decision. For example, when you're ahead 2-away/4-away, handle the cube with care. If you double, your opponent doesn't need much (just over 17% winning chances) to take and recube for the match.


In match-play, sometimes its right to leave the cube in the center and play on for a gammon. In money games, the Jacoby Rule (no gammons unless the cube has been turned) precludes this consideration.

Here's some good advice that even Snowie doesn't know about. In both matchand money-play, if you think there is some chance that your opponent may drop, then it is proper to double with slightly less than you need. Equitywise, you lose a little when the double is accepted, but you gain a ton when it is incorrectly passed.





Trailing 0–2, Dana quite rightly turned the cube to 4 and let me try to "figure out" if there is a way to take this. He's favored to make a 6-prime with me on the roof and then stroll home to a gammon, scooping up blots on the way. On the down-side his 6s and 2s are duplicated and he's not certain to cover his 2-point blot or later release his two back men. I saw some difficult problems if he rolls some 4s and 3s, so I took.

A Snowie rollout has it as a small pass at 1.060 if I take, which Dana vindicated by rolling one his worst with 4-3, correctly playing 8/1. I tossed a 2-3, played bar/23*, 8/5. Dana then rolled 5-3, making the right play with bar/22, 7/2*. I responded with the super-joker 2-2 hitting on the 23-point, making my 3-point, and leaving him with two men on the roof. I eventually won a redoubled gammon to reach 3-away.

In my semifinal Masters match against the always-tough Ray Fogerland (CA) we reached this position:


Pos. 2. 11-pt. match. Gregg Cattanach (Black) leads Ray Fogerlund (White), 8–4. Black on roll. **CUBE ACTIONS?**



For money, this is a solid double and easy take. At 3-away, 7-away it is quite different for several reasons. First, I don't get full value from any gammons won. Most importantly, Ray can redouble as a substantial underdog, canceling my gammons and putting 4 or even 8 points at stake when I only need 3. It is quite an error to double at this score—Snowie shows it about a 0.130 mistake to give up the cube. My thoughts were, "I'm winning by a lot, the timing is all my way and I have only one man back to his two," so I turned the cube. My thoughts were wrong for the given match score.

Two shakes later we were here and I rolled my worst:

Pos. 3. 11-pt. match. Gregg Cattanach (Black) leads Ray Fogerlund (White), 8–4. **BLACK TO PLAY 5-5.**



So much for my timing. I also compounded my bad roll by making a large blunder playing 13/8(2), 8/3, 7/2. This looks pure and clever and actually wins slightly more single games. However, it ups my gammon losses from 8% to 12%. This may seem like a small amount, but with a 4-cube coming my way and Ray winning the match with a gammon, the simpler 13/3(2) is dramatically better.

Ray then properly turned the cube. He only wins 39% single games and 12% gammons, but at this score he can double as a decided underdog, especially with gammons to be won. It is right by 0.053 to redouble to 4. Because of powerful recubes, this is a great demonstration of how hard it is to give an initial cube from the center in a volatile position at 3-away, many-away. A trivial take, of course.


The dice had no punishment for my bad 5-5 play. Ray brought a 5-3 played 9/1*, I rolled 6-1 played bar/24*, 8/2, Ray fanned and I rolled another 6-1 to leap his 5-prime and come around, leaving no shots in the bearoff and winning the match. Clearly if Ray is the one rolling 6-1, he often wins a gammon and the match. (I had room 610 in the hotel. Maybe that helped!)

Director Steve Brown and I got to play our Masters final match just after midnight on Saturday. What an effort by Steve: run a successful event and reach the Masters final! We had a see-saw match and again I got to 3-away! The score was 3-away, 9away, but Steve had other plans and scrambled back to make it 3-away, 4-away. I announced to the room in general, "I'm sick of being 3-away!"

I found a new solution for this problem in the next game. I got a good blitz going with the cube centered and eventually had four of Steve's checkers stuck on my ace point. I never left a shot and we got to the position with me having three checkers left on my 2-point and Steve with a single blot on my 1. I rolled 6-2, and Steve found the ultimate anti-joker 3-2 to let me win a backgammon and the Masters title.

IN THE FINALS with Brad Andersen, he was the fortunate player with the 3-away score and I had another 5-5 to play:

Pos. 4. 11-pt. match. Gregg Cattanach (Black) trails Brad Andersen (White), 5–8. **BLACK TO PLAY 5-5.**



With me needing six points and Brad only getting partial credit for his gammons, the super aggressive 20/5*, 13/8 is right by a small margin, only because the extra gammon losses aren't as costly. If it was 6-away, 4-away, the more solid but less gammonish 20/10(2) would be right. My play was rewarded, but I still lost the match at DMP.

THIS WAS BY FAR my most exciting tournament to date, and I want to thank Steve Brown, Fred Kalantari and their staff for putting together a most enjoyable event. The casino is lots of fun, the full-time coffee/soft drinks/water service was great, and a good time was had by all. We're definitely returning next year!—Gregg Cattanach Δ



last month's position

PROBLEM #292 ANALYZED by Danny Kleinman

Match to 7 points. Black trails White 2 to 5. **BLACK TO PLAY 4-4.**



[Editor's note: Special thanks to Danny Kleinman who fills in for Kit Woolsey this month. Kit was in Monte Carlo for a bridge tournament.]

A t this score, with the cube already turned to 2, losing a gammon costs Black nothing but winning a gammon brings Black to Crawford-odd, a very favorable score indeed. Black can afford to play with nearly reckless abandon in an attempt to gammon White. Hitting two men is essential. Maintaining an anchor on White's 4-point is not as important as it is when losing a gammon costs something, but is still desirable, for it keeps White from making that valuable fifth inside point.

As Black would greatly like to make his own 5-point and to keep White from anchoring there, the thematic play is B/21, 13/5*, 18/14*. Its only drawback is that it leaves an inside blot, and if White counters with a 5, Black's attack will be slowed by having to reenter against a four point board. That would be a serious drawback at a score where gammon losses were costly and gammon wins less valuable to Black. Then, as in money play, the prudent B/21, 18/14*, 21/17*(2), which maximizes overall winning chances while reducing gammonloss danger greatly but sacrifices some gammon-winning chances, would be best.

It has become *de rigueur* for backgammon problem-solvers to cite Snowie rollout results in support of their solutions. I do not use (or own) Snowie, but editor Bill Davis reports that his 720 Snowie rollouts (3-ply) yield these results:

- 1st. B/21, 18/14*, 13/5*: 0.358 (53.5% total wins including 18.9% gammons.)
- 2nd. B/21, 21/17*(2), 18/14*: 0.356 (56.2% total wins including 15.5% gammons.)

A virtual tie! That this play comes so close to being best surprises me.


3rd. B/17*, 13/5*: <u>0.350</u> (53.0% total wins including 19.1% gammons.)

I'm not surprised that this play is nearly as good as the best play, for maintenance of an anchor isn't as important as usual.

Well behind the three best plays, but not as far behind as I expected:

- 4th. B/17*, 18/14*/10: 0.338 (54.1% total wins including 17.0% gammons.)
- 5th. B/17*, 18/14*(2): 0.324 (55.4% total wins including 14.5% gammons.)
- 6th. B/17*, 18/14*, 13/9: 0.321 (53.2% total wins including 17.0% gammons.)

I must confess that in practice, I wouldn't consider any but the first two plays. The first play *dominates* the third, as keeping White's 4-point is surely better than keeping his bar-point. The second play *dominates* the fourth, fifth and sixth, as it creates a useful outpost on White's 8point that the others do not. Computer programs may operate by evaluating *all* possible plays, but human beings do best to conserve their brain power and time by examining only the *best play of each kind.—Danny Kleinman* Δ

"Good Doubles" Answers...

One of the doubles is illegal and the rest are improper. Let's review the findings of Snowie's 720 game full rollouts (3-ply, percise). Remember that Snowie classifies a move as an "error" when it differs from the correct action by 0.030 or more.

<u>No 1.</u> This is no double by a margin of 0.047. No Double (0.647), Double/Take

(0.600). Snowie says you can win 65.9% of the games including 15.7% gammons. Your opponent wins 34.1% with 5.4% gammons.

No. 2. Although very fine at first glance, this double is not legal until June 13, 2004.

No 3. This is not a double by a margin of 0.065. The score is a factor with undoubled gammons winning the match for you.

No Double (0.798), Double/Take (0.733). Snowie says you can win 71.5% of the games including 15.4% gammons. Your opponent wins 28.5% with 2.9% gammons.

No 4. This position is too good to double by a margin of 0.026.

No Double (1.026), Double/Pass (1.000). Snowie says you can win 73.1% of the games including 54.2% gammons. Your opponent wins 26.9% with 5.5% gammons.

No 5. Following 2160 full game Snowie rollouts played 3-ply percise, data showed that this is not a double by a slim margin of -0.009. However, we recommend a double, giving your opponent a chance to blunder by passing.


No Double (0.723), Double/Take (0.714), Double/Pass (1.000). Snowie says you can win 61.4% of the games including 30.3% gammons. Your opponent wins 38.6% including 7.1% gammons. Δ



Joe Wollick's backgammon poem puzzle received solutions from as far away as France. Bruce Haight of La Mesa, CA wins the random draw extending his Chicago Point subscription by one year.

A careful reading of the puzzle found that:

- 1. Player one had two checkers on the 3point.
- Player two (narrator) had a checker on the 4- and 2-point, or a checker on the 5- and 1-point.
- 3. Player one rolled 3-1 or 1-1.
- 4. Player two rolled 1-1. Δ


